Thus, notwithstanding the boasted security of her insular position, England is at length made sensible-that she is vulnerable in her most vital part, and in every spot on the Globe."

The French papers afford nothing new; excepting that the English Minister, having been refused admittance to the deliberations of the diet of Ratisbon, had taken his departure for London; and that the Emperor Napoleon had issued two decrees one of them appropriating two millions for augmenting the salaries of the Judges, and the other for prohibiting Gaming Houses throughout the whole extent of the French empire.

Benlin, June 15. The moment approaches, when all the uncertainty of peace or war, will cease. The answer to the dernier disputches of our court to London are daily expected. If this answer is not of a pacific nature, Berlin, of Potsdam, and the troops which o cupy Hanover and Lauenburgh, will immediately march, under the command of Prince Ferdin and of Prussia, against and within two months that their imitations; Swedish Pomerania, and act in concert with the army under the orders of Gener:l Count de Kalkreuth. The prevailing opinion here is that the British government will not relax their pretensions; and elthough Prussia may find herself compelled to declare war, it will be contrary to her pacific intentions.

Yesterday arine here the ship Alexander, Captain Lane, from Amsterdam. On Friday last, 45 leagues E. by S. of Cape Henry, Captain L. discovered a large ship near another on fire, the former came up with him, she was a French 74 gun ship; after having examined Captain Lane's papers she stood towards the vessel that was burning, which was an English one that had been captured We have now no doubt that the fleet of Jerome Bonaparte is upon our coast.

Captain Waterman, of the ship Menior, from Jamaica, was boarded off Cape Antonio by a British Frigate on the 24th of August, off Cape, Florida, saw a fleet of 15 sail of ships, 6 of which appeared to be of the line.

PROSPECT OF PEACE. Extract of a letter from London, dated July 21st, to a respectable Merchant in Bonton.

" We have now to advise, that it is the general opinion, Negotiations are going forward between this country and France of a PACIFIC tendency; and although conducted with the greatest secrecy, our sunds have risen 5 or 6 per cent. in consequence; -as the public are of opinion, our present ministers will consent to great secrifices to obtain peace. What effect that will have upon American produce, you must be well aware of.

The king of Sweden has not accepted the offer of Russia to mediate between him and the court of Berlin. He considers himself as acting in quality of an ally of England, and thus the sid of Russia in the adjustment of the existing differences, is unnecessary. His majesty insists on the evacuation of Lauenhurg by the Prussians, and its re-occupation by Swedish troops.

A correspondent continues to observe, that an insuling answer having been retureed, the commodore ordered two gun-brigs to play upon the town for eight Lours, and that part of it was in consequence reduced to rains.

The letters A. F. I O. U. were engraved upon the key of the vault of the emperor in Vienna. They stood for the words: Austria corum est imperare arti universo. " It is to those of the house of Austria to command the world. Bonnparte ordered the inscription to be eflaced.

July 22. The Constance frigate arrived at Portsmouth, on Saturday; spoke, on the preseding Thursday, an American schooner the Hope, P. Woodward, master; she had just come out of Cherburg. The master of her declared, that he had read in the Moniteur, that a treaty had been signed at Paris, between the Emperor and the Porce, by which the former is permitted to march troops through the Turkish territory to Egypt.

The reports of American musters prove in general so erroneou, that we may tanty question the accuracy of this intelligence. That the new Turkish ambassador might have been wheedled by the French minister of foreign affairs into a renewal of the a cient relations between the Porce and France, is very likely, and was to be expected; but, that with one dash of he pen, he should give up Egypt without some kind of equivalent, is most incredible. If Tolleyrand has been so successful es to carry se important a point, he would scarcely be gulity of the indiscretion of promulgating it at the moment that he is supposed to be engaged in negociations for peace with Russia and England. It possibly might be the subj ci of a secret article; as such, it could never have been read by the American master, for it would not have appeared on the face of whatever treaty has been signed at Paris The concession itself is of little value, except as far it shews the complete influence which France has obtained in the councils of the Porte. If ever Bonaparte shall again penetrate into Egypt, it will be by a much shorter cut than through the Turkish-Asiatic provinces. With all the facilities that the Porte could afferd him, an expedition which should sail from Portsmouth at the same time that he put his army in motion from Dalmatia, would reach Alexandria malry weeks before him. Vast aud astonishing as his enterprises have been, so extravagant a project as this, could have scarcely engaged his making thoughts.

A mail from Gottenburg arrived yesterday. The general opinion in Sweden is, that a war with Prussia is inevitable. The army in Pomerania has taken a new and advanced position; considerable reinforcements were also expected at Stralsund. Notwithstanding this expectation, and whatever hostile remonstrations Prussia may make, we are persuaded she will neveract with vigor against Sweden, -as long as the latter is protected by the alliance of Russia.

An English messenger (not Mr. Basilico) sailed from the Downs on Saturday, for France.
