FROM THE LONDON GAZETTE OF JULY 22
Queen's Palace, July 21

James Monroe, esq. minister plenipotentiary from the United States of America, having received new letters of credence, giving him, jointly with William Pinckney, esq. the character of ministers extraordinary and plenipotentiaries from the United States, they had this day a private audience of his majesty, to deliver their said credentials.

M. D. Oubril, the Russian envoy, actually arrived here yesterday, at three in the afternoon. He alighted at the hotel, Orange Bateliere.

VIENNA, June 29.

We are positively assured that M. D. Oubril's full powers and instructions relate not only to the affairs of the Russian prisoners, but that this minister is authorized to open negotiations for concluding preliminaries of peace.—Some days before this minister's departure from Vienna, M. Anstetter, counsellor to the Russian legation, set out from this city for Petersburg, with important dispatches.

HAMBURG, July 12.

We are assured that Bonaparte has ordered marshal Bonaud to march his corps into the country of Hesse Cassel. The elector having refused ten months ago to lend five millions of six dollars to France, and Napoleon being in want of that sum, Talleyrand has advised that measure as the only means to exert it from that Prince. However its success is not quite certain, as it is very well known that the elector, who has never been a friend to Bonaparte, has guarded against his rapacity, by sending his treasure to Berlin.

In the same manner, the elector of Saxony has been summoned to lend six millions of the dollar to the French emperor; and as he has also refused the loan, it is apprehended that Bonaparte has been directed to pay a visit to the Grue Gewelb, who is now at Dresden.

The new constitution of the German empire is daily expected at Ratisbon. It is already known that the three Imperial cities of Hamburg, Lubbeck and Bremen will be under the immediate direction and absolute control of Bonaparte.

Mr. Bonaparte has given notice to our venerable senate, that the political superintendance of the French theatre, in Hamburg, belongs to him in consequence of orders to that effect, that he has received from the same prince, who has sent him as his minister to the circle of Lower Saxony.

Loss of the Scher Comfort.—Of the afflictive incidents which it is our business as public journalists to state to the public, that of the loss of the scher. Comfort stands among the foremost, and is little if at all less distinguished for its claims upon the sympathy of every humane bosom than the disastrous affair of the Rose-in-Bloom. As yet we have received no particulars respecting the melancholy business, but we know enough of the general circumstances of that vessel, to think it likely that many of the lost, and the mourners for them are persons of high esteem and value to the community. Should Capt. Drummond himself be the number, his loss will be greatly deplored by all whose occasional demand frequent passages between Charleston and the ports which open on the Bay of Chesapeake. As an active sailor and intrepid seaman, calculated for the hour of danger and the tempest, or man that stands upon an American or British deck surpasses him. His vigilance was indefatigable as his spirit was bold; and though the rough tar in manner, he was unsurpassed for imparting security and satisfaction of every kind to his passengers. His vessel was consequently in such great request that passengers would wait beyond their time to go with him. Indeed he and his vessel had got so rooted in the opinion of the public that their shipwreck was among the last things the people of Charleston, Baltimore or Norfolk would think of. But it has pleased God to order it otherwise; and all that is now left is patient acquiescence in the divine dispensations which no man can foresee, and if he could see is unable to prevent.

New-York paper.

Capt. John Miles jun. late master of the sloop Mary, of New-Haven, has arrived at this port, after an absence of nearly 14 months. Capt. Miles sailed from New-Haven on the 18th of July, 1805, on a voyage to the river Oronoke, on the Spanish Main, where he arrived the 1st of October following. The governor, on examining his papers, immediately took possession of the vessel and cargo, consisting of 500 barrels of flour, (worth 30

dollars per barrel) some beef, butter, &c. The reason alleged was, that she had no sea-letter. At the time of his sailing there were no blank sea-letters signed by the Secretary of State, in the office, and the Collector of the port, gave Capt. Miles a certificate to that effect, which was produced, but to no purpose. After some months, the owner of the vessel having got information of Capt. Miles's situation, obtained a sea-letter in form, with a certificate from the Collector, that the Mary was entitled to that sea-letter on her sailing; also, the deposition of the owners, as to the citizenship of captain and people, the ownership of the vessel, her sailing, &c. &c. and in addition, a consular certificate, and forwarded; all of which were received by Capt. M. in May last, and laid before the governor. These papers made a momentary impression upon him; but finally, he told Capt. M. that the papers were all forged, and he could not give up the property. In the meantime, the people, some of whom had attempted to escape and get home, to give information of their situation, had been taken up; their money, (about 600 dollars) taken from them by the Governor, & they thrown into prison, where they remained several months; but at length, on the repeated solicitations of the captain and others, liberated; but they, as also the captain were ordered not to leave the place. They remained some months in this situation; till, finding the vessel and cargo ruined, no hope of release, or of redress, and suspicious that the governor, to secure himself from responsibility for the property thus wantonly destroyed, might find means to take care of them, & prevent any information getting home to their friends; they determined at the hazard of their lives, to attempt their escape, which, by the providence of God, they happily effected, and arrived safe at Trinidad in July last, leaving every thing behind them in the hands of the governor.

CHRISTOPHER CLARK, Esq. Representative in Congress for the District composed of the Counties of Bedford, Franklin, Patrick, and Henry, has, we are informed, resigned his seat in our national councils. To fill this important station, writes for a new election, will, doubtless, be soon issued. There are, we hear, two candidates—William A. Burwell, and Henry Callaway, Esquires, both of Franklin County, and both representatives in the last General Assembly of Virginia.

This is the same Mr. Burwell who in that session, so ably supported the petition of the citizens of Patrick & Henry, on the all important question of calling a convention for the revision and amendment of the state constitution. Mr. B's arguments and observations on the subject were deemed pertinent and interesting.
