Captain Field, who arrived at Boston on Saturday last from Baltimore, on the 25th of Aug. C. Charles bearing WSW. 8 leagues distant, picked up 25 puncheons rum, with the following marks:—B. W; A S F M C C; I T; I A; II; which appeared to have been several months in the water.

Some time since the sloop Falmouth was condemned at St. Johns, N. Brunswick, for receiving on board a cargo in certain waters of Passamaquoddy Bay, adjudged by the court of vice admiralty to be subject exclusively to the British jurisdiction. This seizure, we understand, was made by Mr. Leonard, a British officer of the customs, &c. without the concurrence of the superior officers of the customs; but he has since been requested by the President of the council, in the absence of the lieutenant governor of the province to abstain from seizing any American vessel, that should be found under those circumstances, until further instructions respecting the matter should be received from the government of his Britannic Majesty. No doubt is made of Mr. Leonard's compliance with this request, which will afford time for an explanation. We further learn, that our government has directed the matter to be stated to that of Great Britain with a view to prevent any future seizure. Nat. Intel.

The schr. Luke, Capt. Mars, arrived here on Saturday from Washington, N. C. Mr. Thomas Bowen, a passenger on board said vessel, informs us that on the 21 of September a most tremendous gale was experienced at Ocracoke. He arrived there on the 3d, and was an eye witness of that destructive day. A pilot informed him that of 34 vessels riding in the harbor, 29 drove on shore, among which was the brig Jupiter of New-York. She was nearly high and dry, and believed her irrecoverably lost as to getting her all at. Two vessels were drove out to sea, masted, and three rode out the gale 25 Protests, were issued from the notary's office on the morning of the 4th. Post.

MIRANDA.

Captain Turner, of the brig Resolution, informs, that he left the city of Carracas the 21st, and Lagaira the 22d August.—At that time there was nothing known of Miranda, but that he had landed at Coro, taken the fort and entrenched himself there. The governor had marched against him with a considerable body of troops, and dispatched an expedition by sea, hoping to inclose him, between two fires. In this he probably would be disappointed, as captain T. was boarded shortly after leaving Lagaira by an English frigate, who was apparently cruising to prevent any attempt of this nature. The people at Carracas appeared to be perfectly tranquil, and no way inclined to favor Miranda. (U. S. Gazette.)

Captain Turner, of the Resolution, informs, that accounts were received at Lagaira, of Miranda's having effected a landing at Coro, where he had been joined by between 1000 to 1500 of the natives. It does not appear that any action had taken place. Two thousand Spanish troops had marched from Lagaira, to oppose him. (Philadelphia Gazette.)

The last accounts from Lagaira, received by the brig Resolution, captain Turner, arrived at this port, confirm the landing of Miranda at Coro, and mention that all the mules were impressed for the use of the troops that were ordered to march against him. (Philadelphia Register.)

Captain Talco, arrived at New London on Monday last, from Turk's island, informs, that on the 20 h of Aug. was brought too by two privateers, or rather pirates, under French colors; one of 3 guns and 60 men, the other 1 gun and 40 men, apparently of all nations; at first, said they were from Point Petre, Guad. afterwards from Barracoa. They very insolently ordered the captain on board one, whom they detained sixteen hours, while two of the brig's people were on board of the other in irons, from whom they endeavored to extort information of money being concealed, assuring them that the captain and supercargo should be hung at the yard-arm in the morning; in the mean time their boats were passing to and from the brig, laden with whatever they could find that pleased them. Finding no information was to be got from the captain or men, they sent them on board—but despairing of finding much money they again turned too, and robbed us of all our small stores, hawser and some clothing, and took from Mr. Birea, a passenger, a purse of 30 guineas, which was nearly all the money they found, and then had the pleasure to get into our boat, after robbing us of 4 or 500 dollars worth of property, to wish us a good passage, assuring us at the same time, that our cargo wanted nothing but value to make it bon prize.

More effects of the late gale.—The schooner Paragon, Mitchell, has returned to New London, in distress. The Paragon sailed from that port on the 29th ult. in company with brig Commerce, and light variable wind and very pleasant weather, till Tuesday 2d inst. in lat. 29 21, long. 70, when, at 8 P. M. says captain M. the wind began to blow fresh at S. S. E. shortened sail immediately, at 10 P. M. found it necessary to hand all sail but the two reefs fore and aft, which we scudded under till it; lit wind & sea increasing very much, called a council of the mate and people, and all concluded it was best to clear the deck immediately, or she would certainly founder—hove all our hay and a major part of the stock over, when the vessel broached too—a bout fifteen minutes after there came a tremendous sea, which washed over the mate, Elijah Avery, and Win. Moore, scum n (who were drowned) with the residue of the stock Wm. Gault a boy, was forward's found snatched in the cabin with oats. Next day, it blew a fresh gale at S. W. all day—lay too, and spoke a schr. from Guadaloupe for Kennebec which had been brought to by a French 84, dismasted, kept in tow a day or two and rob bed of her boats.

From the Georgetown S. C. Gazette of August 20.

On, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday last, we were visited by one of the most severe tornadoes within the recollection of the oldest inhabitants. For violence and duration it surpasses the September storm of 1805.—Fortunately for those residing on the islands and in this town, the wind was in opposition to the waves, and prevented the rising of the tide to so destructive a height as we have experienced. The wind began to rise about 11 A. M. on Thursday, and continued freshening from the N. N. W. until 1 A. M. on Friday, at which time in blew a perfect gale, attended with an incessant fall of rain, until Saturday 3 A. M. when shifting to N. W. and N. W. by W. it increased in fury, and spread destruction far and wide. Houses, shipping, trees, fences, gardens, and we are sorry to say lives were lost—every thing that was exposed to its fury, suffered greatly. We have not yet been able to obtain a full account of the destruction occasioned by it, but fear every day will furnish some melancholy intelligence of its devastating progress. The following particulars are all we have collected at present.

The Light House on North Island overset from its foundation, and destroyed. A new store belonging to George Heriot, Esq. blown down, and totally demolished. A new dwelling house erected by Mr. Lizar Joseph, had the top taken off. Some out houses, the chief part of the trees, and a number of fences blown down, and all gardens in town laid waste. Two venches, belonging to Mr. Cassels, killed, and some wounded by the falling of a house. A prime negro fellow of Mr. John Taylor, and drowned in attempting to
