MIRANDA.

Captain Turner, of the brig Resolution, informs, that he left the city of Caraccas the 21st, and Laguira the 22d Aux Bust. At that time there was nothing known of Miratida, but that he trad land. ed at Coro, taken the fort and entrenched himself there. The governor had marched against him with a considerable body of troops, and dispatched an expedition ! by sea, hoping to inclose him, between two fires. In this he probably would be disappointed, as captain T. was boarded shortly after leaving Laguira by an English frigate, who was apparently cruizing to prevent any attempt of this nature. The people at Carraccas appeared to be perfactly tranquil, and no way inclined to

avor Miranda. (U. S. Gazette.) Captain Turner, of the Resolution, informs, that accounts were received at Laguira, of Muanda's having effected landing at Coro, where he had been joined by between 1000 to 1500 of the natives. It does not appear that any action had taken place. Two thousand Spanish troops had marched from Laguira, to oppose him.

(Philadelphia Gazette.) The last accounts from Laguira, received by the brig Resolution, captain Turner, arrived at this port, confirm the landing of Miranda at Coro, and mention that all the mules were impressed for the use of the troops that were ordered to march against him.

> More effects of the late gale.—Tho schooner Paragon, Mitchell, has returned to New London, in distress. The Paragon sailed from that port on the 29th ult. in company with brig Commerce, and light variable wind and very pleasant weather, till Tuesday 2d mat. in let. 19 21, long. 70. when, at 8 P. M, says captuin M. the wind began to blow fresh at S. S. E. shortened sail immediately, at 10/P. M. found it necessary to hand all sail but the two reefed foresail, which we soudded under till it splits wind & sea increasing very much, called a council of the mate and people, and all concluded it was best to clear the deck immediately, or she would certainly sounderhove all our hay and a major part of the stork over, when the vessel broached too -a bout kiteen minntes after there came a tremendous sen, which washed over the mate, Elijah Avery, and Wm, Moore, scam n (who were drowned) with the residue of the stock Wm. On Thursday, Friday, and Saturday last, we were visited by one of the most severe tornadoes within the recollection of the oldest inhabitants. For violence and duration it surpasses the September storm of 1805.—Fortunately for those residing on the Islands and in this town, the wind was in opposition to the waves, and prevented the rising of the tide to so destructive a height as we have experienced. The wind began to rise about 11 A M. on Thursday, and continued freshening from the N. N. W. until I A. M. on Friday, it which time in blew a perfect gale, attended with an incessant fall of rain, until Saturday 3 A. M. when shifting to N. W. and N. W. by W. it increased in fury, and spread destruction far and wide. Houses, shipping, trees, fences, gardens, and we are sorry to say lives were lost-every thing that was exposed to its fury, suffered greatly. We have not yet been able to obtain a full account of the destruction occasioned by it. but sear every day will surnish some melancholy intelligence of its devastating progress.
