From the AURORA.

MINISTRE SANS DROIT,

LE MARQUIS DU MARQUISAT. Notwithstanding the incessant efforts made by the character alluded to, by puffing himself off in the Gazette of the U. States, and Philadelphia Gazette, and by the private tricks which he practices to disseminate reports, intended for the moment, to veil his disgrace, and gratify his malice against the executive of the United States; we are disposed from various causes, to question his re-appointment. We do not believe it to be the fact—we believe that he is actually in disgrace, at Madrid, as well as at Washington, and that he is not likely to visit the former any more than the latter in haste.

That he does not possess the confidence of his court is obvious from a single circumstance. When the late stockjobbing intelligence of a peace arrived, so shallow was his understanding, and so utterly unacquainted was he with the diplomatic situation of Europe, that he swallowed this silly news; though there was not an editor of any understanding in the United States, that had not discernment enough to see that it was too marvellous and irreconcilable with the relative circumstances of the powers of Europe, to be believed for an instant.

This ambassador without rights and without respect, had so implicitly believed the news, that he was in treaty to ship himself off—but whether for Spain or South America is not certain. So much for his intelligence, diplomatic and intellectual.

Although he endeavors to have it propagated out of doors, that he is re-appointed and confirmed by "the king his master," in opposition to the express desire of our government, we totally discredit the fact. The agents of the United States, would not remain at Madrid if he was not removed or a promise for his removal given; we have very recently heard of the presence of one of our public agents at Madrid, and of his representations on the affairs pending between the two nations. This occurrence could not take place if Yrujo was any longer considered as the ambassador of Spain; and in fact, we have heard, that his successor is named. Yrujo may have obtained, at his pressing request, permission, under pretence of family concerns, to remain a short time; but really to wind up certain colonial speculations, and to complete certain plans of emolument and monopoly, for which he has been for many months preparing machinery in this city. But it cannot be true that he is re-appointed, and altho' he may have gone to B lumore, to settle a South American account, he will never again present himself at Washington city as a public agent. It cannot be supposed for a moment, if we reflect upon it, that any court in Europe would so far forget its own interest & the common usage of nations, as to insist on another nation retaining an obnoxious character, and whose dismission had been requested on the ground of gross misconduct. The court of Spain cannot be indifferent to our relative situations, and knows perfectly well that we cannot be coerced, and that the want of a minister here must be to her disadvantage and not ours.

There can be no doubt from the malignant character of the man, and his intrigues here, that Yrujo, has endeavored to persuade the ministers of the "king his master," that all his tricks here were played off to serve him; and that the ministers of the court of Spain should believe such things, when there was no means of contradicting them, is not at all improbable; but then the question did not depend on his merit or demerit in the service of "the king his master," but whether he could be forced upon us as a minister with decency, or even with effect. The dispatch which solicited his removal was so explicit to admit of any doubt of the determinations of our executive, and if any thing were wanting, the handsome manner in which his presence at Washington was dispensed with, put the matter out of question for ever.

Indeed, after being dishonored as he has been, and exposed as his intrigues have been, it is very perceptible that Castilian pride is very much fallen, or that it is to be found only at the "Castle in Spain"—for if it was in his veins, the honor of the genuine Spaniard, would have retired from the theatre of its shame long ago.

We repeat it—whatever may be the intentions of Spain, or her designs on the shores of the Gulph of Mexico, be her intents "wicked or charitable,"—her ministers have not been such romancers, as to re-appoint an ambassador who has rather created differences than healed those which exist—and who has excited, rather than soothed, angry passions and resentments.

It is stated through the medium of the federal prints that "his most Catholic majesty has renewed and continued the appointment of the Marquis Yrujo as minister to this country." "This measure of the Spanish court," it is added, "can be considered in no other point of view than as a full and entire approbation of the conduct of the Marquis towards this government." It is most probable that this announcement is from the Marquis himself. If it is, entitled to little credit; for the man, who has heretofore so shamefully
