Mr. PECHIN, I beg leave, through your useful paper, to propose Samuel Schaeffer, Esq. as a fit person for one of the representatives of this city, in the ensuing assembly.

PLEASE to re-publish the following act of the Legislature offered last session, for the mature consideration of the citizens; it is probable much conflicting opinion will be expressed with respect to its merits, and it is more than likely, that its rejection or adoption, by the candidates for the first branch of the city council, at the ensuing election, will support or defeat their attempts.

An additional amendment to an act, entitled, An act to erect Baltimore Town, in Baltimore county, into a city, and to incorporate the inhabitants thereof.

WHEREAS, it is represented to this General Assembly, by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, that certain alterations in the charter of that city would be productive of considerable advantages, and they having prayed that the following amendments may be made thereto; and the same appearing reasonable, therefore—

- 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the mode of voting at the city election shall hereafter be by ballot, in the same manner as delegates to the General Assembly now are elected, and that such elections shall commence and close at the same times of the day as other elections do now open and close.

6. And whereas by the act to erect Baltimore Town, in Baltimore county, into a city, and to incorporate the inhabitants thereof, certain principles have been established, which are found injurious and inconvenient in their practical operation upon the police and municipal regulations of the said city; therefore, this legislature, willing to remove such obstructions, to the advancement of the general welfare, by enlarging the range of selection, without impairing the public security, and by giving more full and complete effect to the elective franchise in the choice of the constituted authorities of the said city, ordain and establish the following amendments and alterations, as calculated to remedy the inconveniences which are now experienced; therefore, be it enacted, That on the first Monday in October eighteen hundred and seven, and on the first Monday in October, in every year thereafter, the Mayor shall be elected by a plurality of all the ballots given in by the voters qualified to vote in the respective wards of the said city, for delegates to the general assembly; and the judges of said election, in the several wards, shall conduct the same in the manner and form prescribed by the act to regulate elections, passed at the present session of the legislature, and shall make return, under their hands and seals, of the person so elected Mayor, and lodge the said return with the register of the city; and in case two or more persons shall have an equal number of ballots for the office of Mayor, the said judges shall determine by lot, before they separate, which of the said persons so having an equal number of ballots, shall be appointed to the office of Mayor, and shall make their return accordingly.

7. And be it enacted, That the Mayor shall not continue in office more than five years successively, nor be eligible as Mayor until the expiration of three years, after he shall have been out of office; and in case of vacancy, by the death, resignation, disqualification or removal, of the said Mayor, the members of the first and second branch of the city council, shall immediately convene, upon the notification of the register of the city, whose duty it shall be to make such notification, and the members of the said first and second branches of the city council, when so convened, shall proceed, by this joint ballot, to fill up the said vacancies for the remainder of the year.

8. And be it enacted, That the voters in the several wards of the said city, having the requisite qualification to vote for delegates to the general assembly, shall, on the first Monday in October, eighteen hundred and seven, and on the first Monday in October, in every year thereafter, assemble at the usual place of holding the elections in their respective wards, and shall elect by ballot, two members, to represent the said ward in the first branch of the city council, and the persons so elected, shall be residents of the ward for which they are elected, and shall be proprietors of leasehold or freehold property in the said city, to the value of five hundred pounds current money.

9. And be it enacted, That the voters in the several wards of the said city, qualified as aforesaid, shall, on the first Monday in October, eighteen hundred and seven, and on the first Monday in October, in every second year thereafter, assemble at the usual place of holding the elections, in their respective wards, and shall elect, by ballot, one member to represent the said ward, in the second branch of the city council, and the person so elected, shall be a resident of the ward for which he is elected, and shall be a proprietor of leasehold or freehold property in the said city, to the value of five hundred pounds current money.

10. And be it enacted, That in all cases the names of persons voted for, and the offices to which they are respectively elected, shall be designated in each ballot, and the judges of the said elections, shall conduct the same in the manner and form prescribed by the act to regulate elections, passed at the present session, shall make their return accordingly, and deposit the same, with their polls, in the office of the register of the city, and it shall be the duty of the said register to notify the persons so elected, and in case of vacancy or vacancies in either branch of the city council, the same shall be supplied by election in the same manner as vacancies in the first branch are directed to be supplied by the original act.

11. And be it enacted, That no person shall be eligible to the office of mayor or register, or as a member, or as a clerk of either branch of the city council, who holds an office of profit or trust, under the government of the United States, the state of Maryland, or the corporation of the city of Baltimore.

12. And be it enacted, That the first and second branch of the city council shall, in the first week of their annual session, by their joint ballot, recommend two persons to each office now existing or which may arise under any ordinance of the said corporation, and the mayor shall appoint and commission one of the persons so recommended to fill the respective offices during one year, and may also fill up all vacancies, which shall happen in any office during the recess of the city council.

13. And be it enacted, That so much of the said original act, or any supplement thereto, as is inconsistent with, or contrary to, the provisions of this act, be and the same are hereby repealed; provided nevertheless, that the changes and alterations ordained and established by this act, in addition to those prayed for by the corporation, shall be assented to at the time and in the manner herein-after mentioned.

lished by this act, in addition to those prayed for by the corporation, shall have no effect, or operation unless the same shall be assented to by a majority of all the members of the first branch of the city council, after a new election of members, in the first session after such new election, but in case the members of the first branch of the city council, or a majority of them should determine to adopt a part of the said amendment, and reject the remainder, then it shall and may be lawful, for them so to do, and the amendments so assented to, shall be valid and obligatory to all intents and purposes, as a part of the charter of the city of Baltimore.

The subject of the Quebec turnpike is again before the public. As this City is north of us directly, great advantages are proposed by a direct intercourse. Quebec is commonly placed in 46 deg. 55, north latitude, and not many minutes from our meridian. The road from Albany to Montreal is not only contemplated, but the plan is ready for execution. It is to commence at the bend of the Hudson near Glen's falls, and to run westward of Lake George and Lake Champlain to latitude 45, at which is the boundary line of Canada. Montreal is commonly reckoned by the river St. Lawrence, and the usual route of travellers, 170 miles from Quebec. Montreal is not so high as latitude 46, and about 2 degrees more westerly than Quebec. We have not before us the tables of the latitudes and longitudes. Albany is in latitude about 42 and 1-2 degrees, and probably but few minutes from the meridian of Montreal. This will open a communication to the North similar to that which is opened with the Ohio, while the navigable waters, and the many turnpikes in the Genessee and its neighbourhood, will be sure to open a communication with all the intermediate countries. These early communications will contribute much to accelerate the settlements in these countries, and in the benefits the Northern States must necessarily share.

By the maps it is about 5 degrees due west from Albany to Lake Erie and as the Canals at Niagara, will probably be completed, the greatest advantage for the internal commerce will be secured by land & water as far as the Michigan. The prospect before us will not require greater efforts than have been already made in such parts of the plan as are already executed. And the increasing resources from population and wealth are known from the history of the settlements made within a few years. It has been wondered that nothing more has been done in Maine to open a free communication with the Connecticut river, which observes a course very inviting to the commercial intercourse of that flourishing district, and promises to supply its rich harbors with the ample means of industry and prosperity.

Receipt for Pickling.

After cleansing your cask, put first a layer of white oak leaves, and then a layer of cucumbers, or whatever your pickles consist of, and so on to fill your cask; interpose between each layer dill seed, mustard seed, horse radish, &c. and to every twenty cucumbers one ball of pepper. From a composition of clear salt and water, not hardly sufficiently strong to bear an egg, to every gallon and one quart of good vinegar; scald and skim this pickle, and after cool to a degree of blood warmth, add it to your cask and cover it tight. If rightly performed, this method will preserve pickles the year round, and forms a very agreeable sauce.
