An additional supplement to an act, ontitled. An act to erect Baltimore Town, in Baltimore county, into a city, and to incorporate the inhabitants threof,

WHEREAS, it is represented to this General Assembly, by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, that certain 31terations in the charter of that city would be productive of considerable advantages,. and they having proyed that the following amendments may be made thereto; and the same appearing reasonable, there-

2. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the mode of voting at the city election shall hereafter be by ballot, in the same manner as delegates to the General Assembly now are elected, and that such elections shall commence and close at the same times of the day as

other elections do now open and close. 3. And, whereas by the act of incorporation of said city, the corporation are to provide for the tale keeping and preservation of the standard of weights and measures fixed by congress, and for the regulating thereby all weights and measures used within the city and precincts, and Inasmuch as. Congress have not yet: fixed any standard of weights and measures, and as much fraud and imposition may be practised from a want of such standard, Be it engeted, That the Mayor and City Council shall have and exercise L'e right of regulating all weights and :Kimessures within the city and precuicis ploresaid, by the present, standard mitil one thall be determined on by congress. 4. And be it enacted, That this act shall stake effect and be in force on and after the first day of Pebruary next.

3. And beit enacted, That all and every provision of the act to which this is a

supplement, be and the same is hereby t blished by this act, in soldition to those prayed repealed. 5. And whereas by the act to erect Baltimore Town, in Baltimore county, into | branch of the city council, after a new election a city, and to incorporate the inhabitants of members, in the first session after such new

thereof, certain principles have been established, which are found injurious and inconvenient in their practical operation upon the police and municipal regulations of the said city; therefore, this legislature, willing to remove such obstructions, to the advancement of the general welfare, by enlarging the range of selection, without impairing the public security, and by giving more full and complete effect to the elective franchise in the choice of the constituted authorities of the said That on the first Monday in October a plurality of all the ballots given in by the voters qualified to vote in the respectire wards of the said city, for delegates to the general assembly; and the judges of said election, in the several wards, shall conduct the same in the manner and form presbribed by the act to regulate elections, passed at the present session of the legislature, and shall make return, under their hands and seals, of the person so elected Mayor, and lodge the said return with the register of the city; and in case two or more persons shall have an equal number of ballots for the office of Mayor, the said judges shall determine by lot, before they suparate, which of the said persons so having an equal number, of ballots, shall be appointed to the office of Mayor, and shall make their retera. ccordingly.

7. And be it 'enacted, That the Mayor shall not continue in office hore than five years successively, nor be eligible as Mayot s or untill the expiration of three years, I after he shall have been out of office; and in case of vacancy, by the death, resigpation, disqualification or removal, of the said Mayor, the memoers of the first and second branch of the city council, shall immediately convene, upon the notification of the register of the city, whose greater efforts than have been already duty it shall be to make such notification, and the members of the said first and secould branches of the city council, when so convened, shall proceed, by this joint ballot, to fill up the said vacancies for the remainder of the year.

8. And be it enacted, That the voters in the several wards of the said city, having the requisite qualification to vote for delegates to the general assembly, shall, on the first Monday in October, eighteen hundred and seven, and on the first Monday in October, in every year thereafter, assemble at the usual place of holding the elections in their respective wards, and shall elect by ballot, two members, to represent the said ward in the first branch of the city council, and the persons so elected, shall be residents of the ward for which they are elected, and shall be proprietors of leasehold or freehold property in the said city, to the value of five hundred pounds current mo-

9. And be it enacted, That the voters in the several wards of the said city, qualified as aforesaid, shali, on the first Monday in October, eignteen hundred and seven, and on the first Monday in October, in every second year thereafter, assemble at the usual ; lace of holding the elections, in their respective wards, and shall elect, by ballot, one member to represent the said ward, in the second branch of the city council, and the person so elected, shall be a resident of the ward for which he is elected, and shall be a proprietor of leasehold or freehold property in the said city, to the value of five hundred pounds current money.

10. And be it enacted, That in all cases the names of persons voted for, and the offices to which they are respectively elected, shall be designated in each ballot, and the judges of the said elections, shall conduct the same in the manner and form prescribed by the act to regulate elections, passed at the present session. shall make their return accordingly, and deposit the same, with their polis, in the office of the register of the city, and it shall be the duty of the said register to notify the persons so elected, and in case of vacancy or vacancies in either branch of the city council, the same shall be supplied by election in the same manner as vacancies in the first branch are directed to be supplied by the original act

11 And be it enacted, That no person shall be eligible to the office of mayor or register, or as a member, or as a clerk of either branch of the city council, who holds an office of profit or trust, under the government of the United States, the state of Maryland, or the corporation of the city of Baltimore.

12. And be it enucted, That the first and second branch of the city council shall, in the first week of their annual session, by their joint billot, recommend two persons to each office now existing or which may arise under any ordinance of the said corporation, and the mayor shall appoint amit commission one of the permins so recommended to fill the respective offices during one year, and may also fill up all vacarcies, which shall happen in any office during the recess of the city council.

13. And be it enacted, That so much of the said oritinal act, or any supplement thereto, as arazinconsistent, with, or contrary to, the provisions of this act, be and the same are horeby repealed; provided nevertheless, that the charges and alterations ordained and established by this act, in addition to those prayed by the corporation, shall be assented to at the time and in the manner, betein-after mention-

14. Proviled always, and be it enacted, That the several amendments, and alterations, esta-

by the corporation, shall have no effect, or operation unless the same shall be assented to by a majority of all the members of the first election, but in case the members of the first branch of the city council, or a majority of them should determine to adopt a part of the said amendment, and reject the remainder, then it shall and may be lawful, for them so to do, and the amendments so assented to, shall be valid and obligatory to all intents and purposes, as a part of the charter of the city of

The subject of the Quebec turnpike is again before the public. As this City is north of us directly, great advantages are proposed by a direct intercourse. Quebec is commonly placed in 46 rdeg. 55, north altitude, and not many minutes from our meridian. The road from Albany to Montreal is not only contemplated, but the plan is ready for execution. It is to commence at the bend of the Hudson near Gien's fails, and to run westwurd of Lake George and Lake Champlain to latitude 45, at which is the boundary line of Canada. Montreal is commonly reckoned by the river St. Laurence, and, the usual route of travellers, 170 miles from Quebec .- Montreal is not so high as latitude 46, and about 2 degrees more westerly than Quebec. We have not before us the tables of the latitudes and longitudes. Albany is in latitude about 42 and 1-2 degrees, and probably but few minutes from the meridian of Movreal. This will open a communication to the North similar to that which is opened with the Ohio, while the navigable was ters, and the many turnpikes in the Gennessee and its neighbourhood, will be sure to open a communication with all the intermediat & ountries. These early communications will contribute much to accelerate the settlements in these countries, and in the benefits the Northern States must necessarily share.

By the maps it is about 5 degrees due west from Albany to Lake Eric and as the Canals at Niagara, will probably be completed, the greatest advantage for the internal commerce will be secured by land & water as far as the Michiegan.

The prospect before us will hot require made in such parts of the plan as are already executed. And the increasing resources from population and wealth are known from the history of the settlements made within a few years. It has been wondered that nothing more has been done in Maine to open a free communication with the Connecticut river, which observes a course very inviting to the commercial intercourse of that flourish. ing district, and promises to supply its rich harbots with the ample means of in dustry and prosperity.

### Receipt for Pickling.

After cleansing your cask, put first a layer of white oak leaves, and then a layer of cucumbers, or whatever your pickles consist of, and so on to fill your cask; interpose between each layerdill seed, mustard seed, horse raddish, &c. and to every twenty cucumbers one bell of pepper. From a composition of clear sait and water, not hardly sufficiently strong to bear an egg, to every gallon and one quart of good vinegar; scald and skim this pickle, and after cool to a degree of blood warmth, add it to your cask and cover it tight.

If rightly performed, this method will preserve pickles the year round, and forms a very agreeable sauce.
