As she turns round, her own axis in the same time that our earth turns upon her's she alwaysexposes the same side to us. Our earth appears to the Lunarians, one of the most spiendid orbs in the heavens, shewing to them faces similar to those she shows to us. As the Moon's axis is almost perpendicular to the Ecliptic, she has no such variations of seasons as we have. To one half of her inhabitants, our earth is never seen, unless they take a journey of about 1500 miles, where we shall appear direct overhead, turning round at the rate of 240 miles per minnte.

I The annual Pension of this establishment credit. is two hundred and twenty dollars; but for children under twelve years of age, only two hundred dollars will be required. Those Students who continue their Education through the Classes of Philosophy shall, on account of extraordinary expences, an i some particular indulgencies allowed them, pay two hundred and fifty dollars per annum.

The pension is to be paid half yearly in advance.- A deduction of fifty dollars per annum will be allowed to those Parents who may choose to charge themselves with the detail of clothing their children. The College will furnish washing and mending, but will not keep particular accounts, or become answerable for clothing provided by parents.

II. In lieu of bed-linen, table-service, school books, and other articles usually required on entering establishments of this kind, each

pensioner shall pay ten dollars entrance mon"y. III. The Sunday or Holiday Dress is uniform, and consists of a plain coat and pantal ons. of blue cloth, with yellow buttons, and red cloath or kerseymere waistcost. The use of silk is not permitted. Every Student shall. bring with him his uniform dress, besides a suit for daily wear, six shirts, six handkerchiefs, six pair of stockings and three pair of shoes, all new. Any deficiency in the above will be charged to the parents.

IV. On the above terms the Students are furnished with clothes, linen, washing, mende ing, lodging, heard, fire, candles, table, schoolbooks, pens, ink, paper, amusements and school rewards; so that nothing will remain to the charge of Parents, but medical attendance and medicines, postage, and such extra lessons of Drawing, Dancing, Music, &c. as they may choose to order for their children.

V. The Religion, uniformly practised by the Students living in the College, is the Roman. Caiholic, but for Students of other religious persuasions, there are boarding houses conveject to the same rules (religion excepted) and enjoythe same advantages for their improvement in Literacure, as the Pensioners of the College.

VI. Out-Boarders must be furnished by their Parents with the uniform of the College, and pay annually for tuition, fire, candles, schoolbooks, pens, ink, paper, amusements, schoolrewards, &c. fifty dollars, always half yearly in

VII. The Students are taught English, French, Latin, Greek, and all the branches of Glassical Education, sacred and proface History, Geography, the use of the Giodes, Arithmetic, Algebra and Geometry, with all other parts of the Mathematics, in the respective Casses. Four times a year the Students are called to a public examination of what they have been taught, before Parents and the Triends of Literature. I hose who have made extraordinary progress, are honored and rewarded. The idle, for punishment, are confined in the vacation to certain extraordinary hours of study during play time, in order to repair what they have neglected to learn in schools; therefore if they are found deficient in the last and most important examination of the year, before the August vacation, they will not be allowed to goliome during that time.

VIII. The age of admission is from eight to For Fredericksburg or a place on the Rappahane fourteen-When children are not sufficiently advanced to begin a regular course of classical education, they are placed in an elementary class, attended by a particular teacher, from ! whom they learn to spell, read and write. Special care is taken that they learn to read well, and write a good hand, and that they speak and write French with accuracy.

IX. If the children sent to this College have been before at any other house of education, an attestation of their morals and docility will be required.

X. The greatest care is taken to instruct the children in the duties of religion and morality ; and they are constantly under the cye of one or more of the Professors, who see that those duties are practised, and that the rules of civility are not violated.

XI. Cleanliness, exercise and whatever contributes to health, are attended to with particu lar care XII. All the pensioners dine anti sup with

their professors, and have the same table which they have. No distinctions are allowed in diet or clothing. XIII. As long experience has convinced the

Directors, that a profusion of pocket-money is very prejudicial, not only to good order, but even to study and application, they therefore request, that Farents will not be too indulgent to their children in this particular.

XIV. No allowance is made for absence during the vacation, which begins on the 15th of August, and ends on the 15th of September. To these terms, Parents are desired to be particularly attentive, in case they choose to call their children home, as the absence of a few weeks at the opening of schools, is seldom repaired without very great difficulty.

XV. When children are removed from the College, whatever new linen or clothes are furnished them on that occasion, will be charg. ed to their Parents. After entering on a new quarter, no deduction will be made for the remaining part thereof."

The College is a large building, capable of lodging two hundred persons conveniently. The garden and court adjoining, where the young gentlemen play, are very airy and spacious: The situation is very pleasant and healthy.

It will contribute much to the advantage of the children, if Parents, on sending them, will inform the President how long they propose to leave them at the College, and for what employments in life they are designed. The regular course of education is properly classical but such as are destined for the commercial line, have a lesson of Arithmetic and Book-Keep. ing, under a particular professor appointed for that purpose.
