We may enact some laws to promote the foreign consumption of American produce, in order that the means of remittance in goods of pur own growth m.y be afforded, and that we may have the opportunity to partake in carrying them abourd. We have no redundance of wool, flax, hemp, silk or leather to export, because we manufacture more than we produce and all we can import. Let us suppose, therefore, that our duties, ad valorem, upon all goods, made of those raw materials were (for mere example) at 25 per cent at a medium. We now grow forty or fifty millions of pounds of cotton wool, and can easily produce much more. Let us suppose, therefore, our duties, ad valorem, upon all goods made of that raw material from Europe were fixed (for example also) at 15 per cent. The difference of 10 per cent. would operate as a premium for the consumption ofpiece goods made abroad of our own cotton in most instances, in preserence to goods made in Europe of foreign wool, flax, hemp, silk & leather-articles which we never produce for sale abroad. The duty of 25 percent. up n foreign linens and woolens would be in favor of our own manufactures of flax, hemp and wool, One more example will be afforded,

cautiously premising that it is perfectly novel, and for that and other reasons should be carefully examined. It is proposed for consideration, that every duture injury, either in person\* or property, unlawfully done to any American citizen by any foreign power, officer or agent, shail be a subject of investigation and decision before a standing board of commissioners, to be created by law, and sitting in foro conscientiz; that every such future injury shall be estimated in the form of an indemnification in money to the suffering citizen or his representatives; that evidences of the sums due therefor shall be isued, hearing interest from their respective dates; that the claim for which they shall be respectively issued shall be assigned to the government of the U. S. that an application for just compensation shall be made by our government, thus placed in the situation of the sufferer, to the government of the injurir, that if the demands of this nature, ascertained in any half year, shall not be satisfied within one year, the President of the U.S. shall be authorized to direct , the collection of an additional duty upon the produce and manufactures of the injuring country to cover the same, and he shall be requested to cause the same to be reported to the legislature: and that alike process shali be pursued half yearly, in order to indemnify the injured vicizens of the U. S. out of the industry of the spoliators.

. These remedies for the various commerci I injuries we sustain, are cautionaly suggested for timely consideration. They are merely intended to exemplify the nawhile excleptinciples on which we may proceed in cousequence. If no such injuries were in existence, or in contemplation, we need not thus act for the indemnification and protection of our citizens, nor to secure our just share in the commerce of our country and of the world. We probably should not think of adopting these or any other measures to force manufactures, but for such weighty reasons as the necessary support of our agriculture, and the employment of the injured merchants, mariners, and sea a long time, omitted to use the best defence of navigation, commerce and manufactures-well provisioned laws. The great object of this limited sketch is opensuggestion, that the whole circle of our commercial rights and merests, internal. and external, can be more cheaply, in ore safely, and more effectually defended by wholesome statutes, than by a dangerous \* Including our seafaring citizens of

course, and with a particular eye to their interesting case.

† It is respectfully conceived, that the case of SEAMEN might be immediately put upon this footing, including ad under contracts, made as prescribed by our national laws.

Aew Orleans, Aug. 22. "By a letter which arrived in town this day, we are informed, that 900 Spaniards have passed over the Sabine river, and stationed themselves within 12 miles of Nachitoches. The American troops are now making preparations to meet them."

Extract of a letter from a gentleman of high respectability, in Wilkinson's countu, Mississififit Territory, to his f. iend in this city, dated Aug. 13, 1806.

"I have only time to state to you briefly, an express has just passed to Natchez, from Nachstoches, with disputch s to governor Chiborne, General Wilkinson or our own governor, (perhaps to all of them) he (the express) avows that a Spanish force of ignt nundred soldiers, and nearly as many Indians, were on their march for and within a few miles of the Adais, a post eighteen miles from Nachitoches, far within our limits, and from which they were last year driven by a party of our troops, under captain Turner. It this is true, and of which there is not a doubt, we shall have a brush; for port artizans and laborers. The U.S. fer surely our government will not submit to their occupying a post, from which they have been once driven: Of this, more by the next mail.

" Eight days ago, a dueł was fought ly to submit to the country a respectful mear Fort Adams by Nathaniel Evans, Esq. and capt. Richmond, of the United Stat's army, in which the latter fell: he was shot dead. Mr. Evens is a worthy man, respected by all who knew him and although I have not heard the particuand costly establishment of naval power.
