

but the mechanic was too hasty—there were means, and not dishonorable, in his power, by which he might have known who was not the author; and I should now leave him stung by the demon of infidelity, to batter his uncultured scone against the ruins of his own creating—I should leave him to plunge and wallow amidst the untouched filth & mire which in his electioneering mania, he has thrown out and gathered around himself; did there not lay festering under the load of his base and malicious publication a most serious charge? He asks "whether it is not more the principle than the person he wishes to oppose? Are not the seeds of federalism lurking beneath the thin covering of hypocrisy, ready to spring up, when the distraction of the public mind will increase its growth and give it daily strength?" I will reply to these interrogatories by declaring, that measures & not men, that principles & not persons are what I stand forward to support. The measures are of the present administration, contra-distinguished from the administration of Mr. Adams.—The principles are the liberty of the press, universal suffrage, a judiciary, speedy without committing wrong, impartial without favor, and freely without sale; equal laws & equal justice.—These are the rights of the people, in opposition to alien and sedition laws, property qualification for voters and an expensive, dilatory and midnight judiciary—against which I have entered my firm and solemn veto: these republican principles have grown up with me, have commingled with my nature & have become ingrafted in my constitution; they are axioms of government, which, with me, as long as partial reason shall hold the reins of action, or debate will guide and rule—and if the voice of my country shall doom me forever in the position of a private station, they shall irradiate undiminished the western as well as the eastern tract of my existence, and I shall always, I hope, with becoming dignity and uprightness, discharge whatever duties my God and my country shall impose upon me to exercise.

This is the first time I have troubled the attention of the public, and if I had not been so ungraciously and unfairly attacked, the election might have passed over and I should not have taken up my pen. The fear of dividing the republican interest, was what made me forego the solicitations of my private friends, to be proposed in the papers, whose names if requested I should feel bound to give to the press, and I trust they will not blush in being mentioned. I wished some system adopted that two men might be nominated; that might coalesce and cause the political engine to play with energy and effect. I would not be named unless openly by the majority of a public meeting from that part of the city where I reside, and wished similar means to be adopted in general; in conformity I was nominated by a large majority, and I stand my election. Now judge my principles and measures, and the part I have taken. As for Mr. Robert Stewart, I have not the pleasure of his acquaintance; and if it were in my power, I scorn to build my pretensions and success upon the fallen fortunes of another; but if Mr. Stewart and his friends do take these ungentle means to injure me, I will retaliate upon his public character, by inquiry and promulgation; and I hope the result may be to his advantage:—Yes, I will trace him thro' the glorious revolution, recount every drop of blood he shed in the battles of Brandywine, Germantown, and Cowpens—review his upright and economical conduct as a commissioner for establishing a place for our Court House, and his open and candid dealing towards his friends of the Mechanic's Bank!—I will do him justice, I will not extenuate or set down aught in malice, but speak of him as he is. His private virtues or foibles I shall leave unapproached, for his friends to admire or deplore.

As for myself, if nature in her bounty has endowed me with some talents, and if my conduct in life has not been marked with violations of rectitude, I shall not be disgusted with my circumscribed situation nor arrogant of it. To be a great lawyer, or a great statesman, would be the height of presumption in me to claim; but to be a good citizen and an honest man, I have the vanity to suppose, they who know me well, will feel a pleasure in affirming. Consider that the citizens of Baltimore will consider the unfounded assertions and wild reveries of anonymous scribblers, only as proceeding from want of sense, from private pique, unmanly design or diabolical gratification; that they will not mistake such impudence for truth, and such assertions for proof of it—I will bid an eternal adieu to "A Rough Mechanic."

I trust that such delegates will be chosen as the calm and unbiased judgment of the citizens of Baltimore shall approve; that the mist and clouds which discontented demagogues and juggling electioneers, may have rolled around the orb of political light, will be dissipated & dissolved by its effulgence; its genuine heat and unpolluted expansion.

The French frigate La Guerriere, mounting 50 guns and 317 men, was captured on the 19th of July, in lat. 62° off the Ferro Islands, by the English frigate Blanche, of 38 guns, after a sharp contest of 45 minutes. The Blanche had only four men wounded; the Guerriere had 50 wounded, and 20 killed.

Capt. Whitney, from Bordeaux, which place he left the 3d and the River the 7th of August, informs, that it was reported the day he sailed, that a Peace was concluded between France and Great Britain, and that the Treaty was to be made public on the 15th August, the day appointed for the Grand Fete. Captain Whitney is the bearer of dispatches from our minister at Paris, to the Secretary of State.

New-York Commercial Advertiser.

By the Enterprize, Capt. Packwood, from London, we have received papers to the 1st of August. These dates, however, have been already anticipated. The ship is still at the Hook, and may possibly bring loose papers some days later than those contained in the letter—viz. Respecting Mr. Fox, the Times of July 31, observe—"It was yesterday very generally rumored, that Mr. Fox, had resigned his situation in the government of the country. The lamentable state of his health certainly renders such an event not improbable. He was rather better yesterday, but by no means in a state to satisfy our wishes respecting him. Report has already named several distinguished persons to succeed him; but we shall leave conjecture to its usual avocations, without venturing any opinion of our own on the subject."

The same paper of August 1, states that the accounts of the preceding night were very unfavorable.

The Thalia frigate had arrived at Portsmouth from the East Indies with dispatches. She sailed from the Gauges on the 21st March, and from St. Helena on the 9th ult.

The peace in India (says the Times of the 26th) we fear, has been but of short duration. Letters, we understand, have been received by the Thalia, which mention, that apprehension were entertained of the war being renewed, both with Scindia and Holkar. Indeed, a letter received by a gentleman of the first respectability advises him of the death of his brother who, it is stated, fell in an assault made on the 21st of February, upon the fort of Gohud, occupied by Scindia and his troops. Scindia, in consequence of the late treaty, was put in possession of Gohud about six weeks previous to the time when this attack upon it is stated to have been made.

Mr. Comyns, in the court of King's Bench, moved for a Habeas Corpus to bring up a seaman, who had been imprisoned, upon the ground that he was an American-born subject. The court asked what proof there was of his being an American? The counsel replied, that he had the affidavit of two persons who knew him to have been born in America. The court, upon this granted a rule.

The report that lately appeared in some of the papers, that Mr. Mungo Park, and the other African travellers had been cut off by the natives, there is every reason to believe is without foundation. It is the opinion of Sir Joseph Banks and other gentlemen personally acquainted with Mr. Park, and deeply interested in the success of his mission, that it is the old report of the death of part of the soldiers and carpenters newly received, and greatly exaggerated.

Resuscitation. On Monday week two persons were bathing in Jackson's Dam, a little above the Queens Dock, in Liverpool, one of them slipped into a hole, and was supposed to be drowned. The body after remaining under water nearly half an hour, was taken out and was conveyed to the South shore Coffee House. A medical gentleman who happened to be in the neighborhood at the time, opened a vein, no doubt from the best intentions, and though the blood appeared, there was no hopes of returning life. Another medical gentleman was sent for, who merely applied hot salt, but left him, declaring there was no chance of recovery. In half an hour, his assistant also left him, expressing the same opinion. Fortunately however, Dr. Stephens, of Low-hill, happened to be in the neighborhood, and humanely offered his assistance. On examining the body, he declared his opinion that life might be restored, provided perseverance was exerted. He instantly sent for a medicine of his own preparation, which he had just before sent to a patient not far distant, and which he applied to the breast, nostrils, head, feet, &c. In the space of ten minutes, although two hours had now elapsed since the body was taken up, symptoms of resuscitation were observed; the heart beat, the pulse became full and respiration was restored. In the course of an hour the most encouraging proofs of recovery manifested themselves, and in three hours the poor unfortunate man, who had been too precipitately doomed the victim of an early death, recovered his speech, and is now we understand, restored to his friends and society. We conceive it to be of great importance that cases of this nature should be made as public as possible.

Arrived Danish brig Friendship, former, 21 days from Halifax—Ballist—Hazelhurst, Brothers & Co. Left several American vessels brought in by British cruisers, names unknown. 30 miles eastward of the Capes, fell in with the wreck of an English schooner deserted, took 15 puncheons of Rum and one of her masts and could have saved much more had the weather been favorable. The Friendship was from Teneriffe for this port, with a cargo of wine and was captured within sight of the Capes and sent to Halifax, where her cargo has been detained.

Also, schr. Fanny, Hill, 26 days from Trinidad, (Cuba) sugars, bark, cotton, Furtic and hides—Chas. Deshon. Left ship Isabella, of and for New York, uncertain; schooner Martha Crawley, Fate, for Charleston. 19th inst. spoke brig Two Brothers, for Baltimore. 16th brig Mars, of Portland from Havanna for Boston. Off Hatteras, saw a large ship under jury masts, standing to the Southward and Eastward, supposed for Charleston.

Also, Louisa Weeden, Kelly, 80 days from Killery, in the Island of Salt—Salt, Wine, Mana, and Oil—Thom's Rutter—Left no American vessels July 13. Off Cape Tunis was boarded by the U. States brig Hornet, from Algiers, bound to Tripoli. 20th, off Cape Palas spoke brig Industry, Robinson, from Maurice Lee for N. York, out 14 days. Left Gibraltar 6th August, ship Morning Star, Bennett, of N. York, discharging; schooner Fame, Woodberry, of Gloucester, discharging; ship Dean, of Baltimore, just arrived. August 29, lat 26, long 67, spoke brig Active, Knight, from Gloucester for Sumatra, out 23 days. Sept. 14, lat. 31. 57, long. 66, brig Betsy & Peggy, from Baltimore, for Trinidad. Off Annapolis saw 3 schooners and a brig astern, bound up. Was run a foul of by a schooner, which carried away his jib-boom and cat head.

New-York, September 26.

Arrived the British ship Union, Bruce, (mentioned in Gazette yesterday) in 57 days from Kingston, Jamaica, bound to Greenock, in company with a fleet of 170 sail. On the 22d of August, in lat. 33, long. 77, in severe gale, lost her fore mast, mizzen-top mast and bowsprit. Two days after saw 4 of the fleet distasted, one of which was the Coverdale of London; she had lost her masts, rudder, & had 5 feet water in her hold. The ship Larkin, Forrester, took off the Coverdale's crew, and burnt the vessel, 8 of whom were put on board the Union. Sept. 1, lat. 37, long. 73, spoke ship U. States, from City Point for Liverpool. September 5, lat. 37. 34, long. 70, 30, spoke ship Reward, 6 days from Norfolk for Guernsey. Next day, ship Hazen, of Boston, 4 days from Norfolk for Glasgow.

The ship Palmyra, Whitney, of Providence, in 45 days from Bordeaux. The brig Ann Maria, Speck sailed the day before for New York. Left brig Sally Tracy, Skiddy, to sail for New York in 4 days; and the schooner Katy-Ann, for do. soon. September 16, lat. 41, long. 65, 20, spoke schooner Hiram, Prentice, 4 days from Marblehead for Bilbao. 21st. lat. 40, long. 68, spoke the ship Cato, 7 days from New York for Liverpool.

The schooner Nancy, Power, in 13 days from Halifax. The brig Hope, Dobel, of this port, was cleared—cargo consigned. The brig Neptune was to sail soon for New York.

Philadelphia 27.

On Wednesday arrived, the ship Andrew, Watkins, from Batavia. And left there, May 21, the ships Juno, and Calicut, of & for Boston; ship Fanny, Smith, and America, Lelar, to sail for this port in a week or ten days; also two ships and two brigs of and from Baltimore, sailed in company with captain W.—The day he sailed he spoke the ship Minerva, from Baltimore, for Batavia, and the next day fell in with the Persia, and passed the Straits of Sunda with her.—The same day (viz May 22) spoke the ship Minerva, Hussey, from Rhode Island, last from Isle of France for Batavia.—Off Angler Point they spoke a boat who informed that the ship Triton, Gibbs had passed there the 16th of May, 98 days from Philadelphia for Canton. September 13 lat. 35, 10, lon 72, 50, spoke schr. Enterprize, Austin, from Baltimore to Leghorn out 3 days.

Same day arrived ship Hannah, captain Yardsley, from the Isle of May, and left there the ship Courtney, Bryan, from London, who put in for salt, not being able to load, the rainy season having come on, was taking in water and was to sail the day after captain Y. for Norfolk; ship Manning, of and for Portsmouth, N. H. and ship Washington, Wicks, of and for Portland, both to sail in about 8 days also, schr. Franklin, of New-York uncertain.

Norfolk, September 22. ARRIVED, Schr. Diana Talbot, Maxwell, 39 days from Madeira.

Left at Madeira, ships True American, of and for N. York, in 8 days; Neptune of and for do. the next day; two brigs, and three schr's. names not recollected.—Spoke August 17, in lat. 31, 19, long 26, ships John Jay, and Renown, of Nantucket, on a whaling voyage, 81 days out—29th, Cape Henry bearing N. N. W. 6 leagues distant, was boarded by H. B. M's. brig Moselle, the Bellona and Bellisle of 74 guns in company.
