

those whom a ward may best know, and most respect, may be disqualified from being members of the city council, by holding some other office, whereas such would be eligible for election.

The new charter enacts that all officers shall be an irrevocable re-appointment, than which nothing can be more unwise or unnecessary.

It is extravagant and ridiculous to pretend that the citizens do, or will have by the present charter, odious and obnoxious officers imposed upon them. Public sentiment fairly and distinctly expressed must, and ought to triumph; and I am so much attached to the principles of representative democracy, that did I believe the old charter violated those principles, no one would raise his voice louder against it, nor be a more decided advocate for an alteration, than myself. But I deny that there is in it any departure from those principles, and affirm that it is in concordance with them; and is a happy imitation of the wise and beautiful organization of the national and state constitutions.
