Wyou are not ignorant, gentlemen, that as long as you attend to your commerce and your own affairs only, you will enjoy every consideration of the goernment, and in future I desire that I posed to be may hear no more of these complaints. Dissipate there ore your fearts, rest easy, and never again call into question our fidelity.

" I have the honour to be, &c. "HENRY CHRISTOPHE," To which the following answer was

immediately returned. " To his excellency Henry Christophie, General in Chief of the Armies of Hayti. " CAPE, M.y 15, 1806.

We have just had the horour of receiving your excellency's letter from Milo of this date, wher in you state that you have been informed that the Americans have evinced fears relative to the late measur s pursued by government We must beg leave to mention to your excellency that you have been misinformed.
