

LOSS OF THE QUEBEC FLEET.

Mercantile Chronicle office, Cork, August 25, Four o'clock.

Our Courier has just arrived from Cove, with the following information:—The transport ship Osborne, Capt. Moffett, has arrived in this harbor. Her intelligence is of a very disagreeable nature.—She made one of a Fleet of twenty two Sail, which left Quebec, under Convoy, of His Majesty's ship Champion. Three of that number transports having on board the 6th regiment of foot, consisting of four hundred and sixty seven men; the other ships were merchantmen and masts ships. On the 15th inst. seven of the convoy parted at different periods of the day; and on the same day they fell in with a strange sail, which, when within four miles of the Champion not answering the private signal, it was intimated to the ships of the fleet to disperse. It was shortly discovered that the strange ship was an enemy and a line of battle ship. She was observed to board five sail during the day which were set on fire. A sixth sail was distinguished to leeward, bearing S. by E. which had also the appearance of a man of war, and as a fire was discernible in that direction, she was also judged to be an enemy. From the situation in which the fleet was when the Osborne escaped it is strongly to be apprehended, that the entire of it was either captured or destroyed. We are not specially informed of the fate of the Champion, from the short distance she was from the enemy, her escape was considered impossible. The Osborne has part of the 6th foot on board.

STUTTGARD, 20th August.

Our court has just published a Note stating that at the time of the exchange of the ratification of the Treaty of the Confederacy of the Rhine (which change took place the 27th July and the subsequent days at Munich,) Mr. de Cotthner, Envoy of Wirtemberg to the King of Bavaria, delivered to the Ministers of all the contracting parties a formal protestation against the cessation of Tuttingen; the said Ministers accepted that protestation, which was delivered to them with the instrument of the ratification exchanged, and which is dated from Stuttgart, of the 24th July, signed by the King, and countersigned by the Minister of State. It states in substance:—that the Treaty of the 12th July requires of His Majesty the cession of the town of Tuttingen, and of its dependencies, situated on the right bank of the Danube; but that by virtue of the obligations contracted by His Wirtemberg Majesty at his accession to the Government of his States, he cannot subscribe to the alienation of a part of his ancient domains. His Majesty declares in consequence that, in no case, will he consent to this cession. He further declares, that he is disposed to indemnify the Grand Duke of Baden, relative to Tuttingen and its dependencies, by another district which shall be agreed upon."

The ship Concord, Ropes, cleared at Salem, on the 10th inst. for Baltimore.

A Nantz paper of the 29th August announces that the ship Vetur, commanded by Jerome Bonaparte, arrived in the night between the 26th and 27th of that month at Concarneau, in the Bay of La Torch.

The Russian Emperor, Alexander, has dismissed some of the French emigrants of rank from his service. It is, probably, the prelude to the recognition of Bonaparte, and perhaps to the withdrawing of that protection which he has hitherto afforded: the Head of the Bourbon family.

A late London paper says, "Lord Holland and Auckland are appointed Commissioners to settle all differences with the American Ministers at London."

COUNTERFEITS.

Messrs Yandt & Brown.

Since Yesterday, further information has been obtained relative to the person who passed in this city, a counterfeit note of the Bank of Baltimore. It appears, that he landed in this city about 8 days ago, from on board the ship Sally, capt. Ashby, and not at Norfolk. He calls himself Thomas Jourdan, is about 5 feet 9 inches high, of dark complexion and short dark hair, wears black clothes and is of genteel appearance; he is thought to be an Irishman, and said that his father lived about 8 miles from Baltimore, whither he was going, and would return in a few days. It is hoped that the public eye will be vigilant, in order to detect this vender of spurious bank notes, undoubtedly fabricated in England, and although he give out that he was going to the country, he may yet be in the city.

The democratic citizens of a large number of the wards of the city of Philadelphia, and of some of the districts of the county of Philadelphia, have expressed their opinion in favor of the reelection of Thomas Jefferson, as President of the United States, and have appointed committees to unite in framing an address to him requesting him not to decline being a candidate for the Presidential chair at the ensuing election.

The resolutions adopted at these meetings all evince an unshaken attachment to Mr. Jefferson, and confidence in his administration of the public concerns.

Y. to wait for a cargo; Eliza, Sander, of ditto, ditto; Minerva, Hussey, of Providence sailed on the 20th June, for Manila; Legeria, Russell, of ditto—sailed on the 20th June, destination unknown; Swanwick, Cox, of Philadelphia, from the Cape of Good Hope—waiting for a cargo. Ten days previous to the Ida's sailing, the natives in the neighborhood of Canton and Jacarta had rebelled, and committed great ravages among the coffee and sugar plantations, having destroyed several sugar mills and murdered all the Chinese. At the time the Ida sailed, it was very sickly in the city, but healthy in the harbor. No coffee or pepper market, and sugar very scarce. Specie in great demand.

About, of this port, to sail in 10 days; the schr. Fame, from Baltimore, just arrived, after a passage of 42 days; and the brig Jane, of and for New York.

The schr. Indigene, of and from New York, had arrived and sailed to leeward.

While the John by at Cayenne, the French privateer Victor returned from a cruise, with 2 ships and a brig, prizes, which she fell in with under convoy of the British armed brig Busy, from Halifax. She engaged the Busy for an hour and an half, when she made off, and having the heels of the Victor, made her escape, but her convoy were taken, as above. The Victor lost her lieutenant and several men.
