

employed in the general service; who have been chosen in all parts of the Germanic empire, and many of whom have quitted other profitable places, looking forward to an honourable subsistence for life, and which should not be wanting to them on account of their fidelity, and the integrity and capacity with which they have executed their functions.

We have, therefore, taken the resolution of preserving to those of our imperial servants, who have hitherto drawn their salaries from our chamber, the same appointments, reserving to ourselves to place them in employments in the service of our hereditary states, and we hope, with so much the more confidence, that the Electors, princes, and States will provide for the Imperial Chamber of Justice of the empire, and the Chancellor of the Chamber of Justice, by charging themselves voluntarily with this expense, as it will be trifling in amount, and will diminish every year.

As to the Chancellor of the Aulic Council of the Empire, the funds destined for its support, will be employed to provide for the wants of those individuals who have hitherto drawn from thence their salaries, this will serve them until other measures may be taken.

Berlin, 4th August.—The Swedish frigates blockade every Prussian port, and molest without discretion all neutrals who may fall in their way; but upon land they have not committed a single act of hostility, although the two armies are within pistol shot of each other.

They write from Petersburg that all the individuals of both sexes known to have co-operated in the accession of Russia to the last coalition against France have successively quitted the court.

14. Every thing here breathes activity.—The king is returned from Charlottenburg; and we observe a great movement in the cabinet and in several of the military offices. Generals who have been absent are recalled, and estafettes have been forwarded to the several military governments.

13. The negotiations between Sweden and Prussia have taken such a turn as to induce us to believe that peace and good understanding will speedily be re-established.

FRANKFORT, August 7. The following details respecting the changes which are taking place in Germany, are given as authentic. All the Prince, Intermediate Courts and other States of the Empire, who are not named in the act of Federation, and whose possessions join, or are included within those of the Princes preserved, are wholly to lose their territorial superiority; that is to say, the right of having troops, of having tribunals dependent on them, the privilege of a mint, of having political Agents; in one word, they are to be deprived of sovereignty according to the true meaning of the word.

It is said, that the King of Prussia, in recognizing these changes in the constitution of Southern Germany, reserves to himself a power of establishing a similar league (in the North) of what was formerly called the Empire. Thus will this constitution, which has been so long invaded, wholly disappear, and the decline of which is only so gentle, because the measures which are taking at this day were preceded by the period of its fall.

The Elector of Hesse is about to accede to the Confederation of the Rhine. This Prince will join the force of the union with upwards of 20,000 men.

NAPLES, July 23. The English have taken a position on the shore of St. Euphemia. The division of General Reider occupies Catanzaro, and all the posts in the farther Calabria; and he only waits for the junction of the troops from Aspusia to attack the enemy, and drive them into the sea.

FRANKFORT, 5, 23d August. Yesterday the Governor of our Town addressed a Proclamation to the inhabitants, in which he informed that Mr. Lambert, French Commissary General, had notified to him the order he had received to take possession of the town of Frankfort for H. S. H. the Prince Primat, the former Elector Arch Chancellor.

The different German Princes who form the Confederation of the Rhine, had already made known their accession to the confederation and the aggrandisement of their States, by Patents, and Proclamations. French Commissioners are now arrived at their Courts; charged to take possession of and deliver up to them their new acquisitions.—The definitive constitution of the Confederation will be carried into effect on the 1st September. It is still rumoured that at that period H. M. the Emperor of the French will be in our town in order to open, as Protector, the first assembly of the confederated Princes. This league is already recognized by most of the European powers; and we every instant expect to see it acknowledged in like manner by the Emperor of Russia; and to receive the Declaration which this Potentate is about publishing on this head.—This League augments daily. We have positive intelligence that the Elector of Wurtemberg acceded thereto, about eight days since; that the Emperor of Austria, his brother, whom he had consulted on the subject, gave his formal approbation to the measure. It is not yet known what the

Elector of Hesse will do & the information which has reached us concerning the intentions of that Court being too vague to be relied on.

The ship Thomas Wilson, Joseph Gardner, is in the River, from Mocha.

We learn that our differences with Great Britain were, about the middle of August, the date of the latest advices, in a fair train for adjustment. In consequence of the state of Mr. Fox's health, Lord Auckland and Lord Holland had been appointed to conduct the negotiation with Messrs. Monice and Pinkney. We may, therefore, expect from the appointment of a special commission a prompt attention to our affairs, and from the characters of those who compose it, it is not irrational to indulge the hope of a favorable issue. Lord Auckland, formerly Mr. Eden, is probably well acquainted with the relations between this country and his own, and Lord Holland, in the pamphlet ascribed to him, has too clearly expressed his sentiments to admit of a doubt of his friendly disposition. Our readers will recollect that in that pamphlet the right to impress our seamen is unequivocally abandoned, and that without deciding on the principle of the neutral rights we claim, it is declared to be the policy of Britain, on the ground of expediency, to admit them.

Aat. Intel.

Miranda.—We have been favoured with the perusal of several letters from respectable gentlemen with General Miranda. One under date of August 18th, from the Island of Aruba says—"I am just informed that our brave companions taken in the schooners Bee and Bous, were all safe about 20 days past. I mention this circumstance the more particularly, as it will be interesting to their friends in New-York, and to whom you will be pleased to communicate the same." Another, dated Aruba, August 20th, says—"It was sometime ago reported, that the Governor of Carracas had executed some of our people who were taken in the schooners, but the report is totally void of any foundation, as a man is just come in from Porto Cay who left them there all well, fifteen days ago. He says, they are kept closely confined in a place distinct from the other prisoners, but are otherwise, exceedingly well treated."—And a third letter from Aruba, dated Sept. 3d, says—"I feel happy to have it in my power to assure you that all our prisoners, taken in the schooners, were perfectly well at Porto Cay 12 days ago; they are closely confined, but otherwise well treated, and the Spanish government is afraid to take any harsh steps, as they see the British government are joined with General Miranda, and dread retaliation."

One of the above letters also says—"It affords me much satisfaction to inform you that on the 24th of August the Galata frigate, Capt. S. yre, joined us here having been sent by Admiral Cochrane for the purpose. Capt. S. yre also informs us that the Espire sloop of-war may hourly be expected to join us.—The Bachtant sloop of war, from Jamaica, Capt. Decres, is cruising in this station and frequently at anchor with us. Our naval force is at present sufficient, and we only wait for intelligence from our dispatches to Barbadoes and Jamaica when we shall proceed to our next point of operation; which I am informed is one that will be tenable, and where we shall make a stand until our force is adequate to progress in the country."

We learn by a passenger in the Betsy from Martinique, that there was a severe hurricane at that place and at Dominique on the 10th ult.

The damage at Martinique was not very great. The schooner Harvey of Savannah, a Boston schooner, and nine coasting vessels, were driven ashore and lost.

The calamity at Dominique was great. The town of Rosseau was nearly all washed away, including the fort—700 persons were said to have perished. The plantations were ruined, and the survivors deprived of the means of subsistence. The governor sent two schooners to Martinique for provisions, which were immediately loaded—and permission generously given for the exportation of supplies to that distressed island.

A letter from Martinique mentions that only 200 persons were lost, and that all the vessels in the different harbours of the Dominique were wrecked.

Captain Webber, late of the barque Hope, which foundered at sea, arrived here a few days since, and has requested us to publish the following statement, under his own name.

"On the 7th of August last, I and my mate and one passenger, were put on board of the schooner Father and Son of Norfolk, commanded by John Hipkins, from London, bound to Norfolk, from on board the frigate that took us from the wreck. The officer that went with me on board asked captain Hipkins if he

wanted any thing on account of us? he told him, nothing but water, he had plenty of provisions and bread, and likewise that he would not take but three men; the captain of the frigate sent him 40 gallons of water, a barrel of pork and beef, and told me to take all I could; but the weather being so bad that we could save nothing but our chests and trunks. After parting with the frigate capt. H. began to murmur, and say he had more eaters than workers. I observed to him that we were much fatigued after pumping 15 days, and if we did not work, I would give him pecuniary satisfaction for every favor. This did not satisfy, for the passenger, put on board with me, (Mr. J. Bump, who was mate of a ship condemned in Lisbon) on going below in the morning to get some rest, after having been at work most of the night, was sent for by captain H. to come on deck to work; but he not readily complying with so cruel a command, captain H. went and found him—told him if he did not present himself immediately on deck, he would fish him up by the collar, and if he did not work he would starve him, and if that would not do he would flog him. Soon after, however, we fell in with the schooner, captain Sowle, of Duxbury, from Lisbon, bound to Philadelphia. I requested captain Hipkins to put us on board him, which he complied with, and retained sixty dollars worth of my property in his hands, to satisfy him for our passages, after working my mate in a shameful manner, and requesting me to assist in ship's duty. Captain Sowle, who carried us to Philadelphia, treated us in a friendly manner, and proved to be an agreeable companion, and for his multiplied favors, which to us were a double blessing, he would not take money. We thus publicly and sincerely return him our hearty thanks.
