RATISBON, August 9.

Null and authentic extracts of the treaty of confederation signed at Paris, July 13 and 17, 1866.

Experience has shown that the German Confederation is by no means sufficient for securing foreign and domestic peace to the south of Germany.

Article I. The above German Powers

separate themselves for ever from the league of the German Empire, and form an union by the name of the Confederation of the Rhine.

Article II. All proceedings of the Empire

are henceforth null and void, in so far as respects the above parties.

Article III. They renounce all the officers

and titles of the Empire. Declare their separation as from the 1st of August, at the assembly of the Empire at Ratisbon.

Article IV. The Electoral Arch Chancellor

receives a new title, "Prince Primat and most Serene Eminence."

Article V. The Electoral Prince of Baden,

the Duke of Berg and the Landgrave of Darmstadt, receive the titles "Grand Duke and Royal Highness," accompanied with royal honors.

Article VI. Frankfurt on the Mayne is the

seat of the confederation. The members form two colleges, the one royal, and the other princely.

Article VII. The members, in order to

break off all dependence upon foreign powers, shall not remain in any foreign service. Whoever will not renounce such foreign service or dependencies...

Article VIII. No one can limit his

sovereignty in any other manner than as a confederated one.

Article IX. All quarrels shall be

decided by the meeting of the confederation at Frankfurt.

Article X. The Presidency thereof

belongs to the Prince Primat. When divided into two colleges, he shall be President of the Royal one, and the Duke of Nassau of the princely.

Article XI. Four weeks after the

Declarations at Ratisbon, the Prince Primat shall propose a Constitutional Statute, which shall fix the time and manner of the Convocation, the order of the Delegation, and the form of the Assembly.

Article XII. The Emperor Napoleon

shall be proclaimed Protector of the confederation. In this quality he shall appoint the Successor to the Prince Primat as often as one dies.

Article XIII and XXIII. inclusive,

point out the cessions and acquisitions of the Confederates. Thus Nassau cedes to Berg, the town of Deutz and its territory. Darmstadt acquires the Burgh of Friedberg. The Prince Primat the Imperial city of Frankfurt.

Article XXIV. The Members of the

Confederation shall divest of their sovereignties all the Princes, Counts and Lords in the district of the confederated country. [Here follows the detail of the divisions, by which several of the considerable principalities are to be parcelled out, under two, three, and more new sovereignties.]

Article XXV. Also, all possessions

of Knights, companions of the Empire are deposited. Should there be any property lying in the middle between two of the confederate states, such property is to be divided into two equal parts between the two sovereignties.

Article XXVI. Definition of the

rights of sovereignty. They comprehend the legislation, the highest jurisdiction, civil policy, military conscriptions and contributions of the sovereignties.

Article XXVII. The deposed Princes and Counts retain their domains and their rights as landlords, &c.
