From the American Citizen.

The fate of Poland is well known. It was annihilated by two neighbouring rapacious monarchs: it is no more. In his chapter on "monarchical or royal Republics," (a) Mr. Adams says— "If there should ever be a people in Poland, there will soon be a king; and if ever there should be a king in reality, as well as in name, there will soon be a people; for instead of the trite saying, "no bishop, no king;" it would be "much more exact and important truth" to say, "no people, no king, and no king no people!" (b)

Sir Robert Filmer has said, and attempted to maintain, that absolute monarchy is the only right and legitimate government. He founds his argument, if argument it may be called, upon the absolute and universal monarchy of our first parent, and upon patriarchal authority. Any one whose curiosity may excite a wish to see the argument at large will find it copiously set down and most ably refuted in Locke's Essay on civil government.

Mr. Adams goes as far as Sir Robert. It is true that there can be no king without a people, but is it true that there can be no people without a king? Mr. Adams contends that there cannot, and therefore, with Sir Robert, for the rightfulness of UNIVERSAL MONARCHY. "Will the aspiring blood of Lancaster descend?" John knew a people without a king, and by this people, since he wrote his book, he has been degraded from his fancied throne.—He felt that there was a people amongst whom there can be no king.

He who never changed an opinion never corrected an error, is a remark made by many with different views and for various purposes; sometimes to screen apostasy. Mr. Adams has the merit of being consistent. On the score of monarchy he never changed his opinion. He separated from the British crown, not as he himself tells us, for the love of innovation, nor from "predilection or choice," but because he was somewhat under the necessity of doing so. When, after a seven years waste of blood and treasure, his country had become independent, we see him sighing for the fish pots of Egypt. I have quoted enough to satisfy every candid man that his book, published in London in 1787, is a defence of monarchy. Let us now see him in his private correspondence!

In 1802 there was published in Boston a pamphlet entitled "Four Letters, being an interesting correspondence between John Adams, late President of the United States, and Samuel Adams, late Governor of Massachusetts, on the important subject of Government." These private letters were written in the year 1790, two years after the adoption of the national constitution, when Mr. Adams was Vice President.—They are the correspondence of two men entertaining different opinions on government. The illustrious patriot under whose name I write, and who is now no more, lived and died a Republican.

LETTER

From John to Samuel Adams. "You and I have seen four noble families rise up in Boston; the CRAFTS, the CORNS, the DAWES, and AUSTIN'S. These are as really a nobility in our town, as the Howards, Somers-sts, Berties, &c. in England. Blind undistinguishing reproaches against the aristocratical part of mankind, a division which nature has made and we cannot abolish, are neither pious nor benevolent. They are as pernicious as they are false. They serve only to foment prejudice, jealousy, envy, animosity and malevolence. They serve no ends but those of sophistry, fraud and the spite of party. It would not be true, but it would not be more egregiously false, to say that the people have waged everlasting war against the rights of man.

"The love of liberty," you say, "is interwoven in the soul of man." So it is, according to La Fontaine, in that of a wolf; and I doubt whether it be much more rational, generous or social, in one than in the other, until in man it is enlightened by experience, reflection, education and civil and political institutions, which are at first produced, and constantly supported and improved by a few—that is, by the NOBILITY. The wolf in the fable, who preferred running in the forest lean and hungry, to the sleek, plump and round sides of the dog, because he found the latter was sometimes restrained, had more love of liberty than most men. The numbers of men, in all ages, have preferred ease, slumber and good cheer to liberty, when they have been in competition. We must not then depend alone upon the love of liberty in the soul of man, for its preservation. Some political institutions must be prepared to assist this love against its enemies. Without these, the struggle will ever and only in a change of impostors. When the people who have no property, feel the power in their own hands, they ever attack those who have property, till the injured men of property lose all patience, and recur to finesse, trick and stratagem; to putwit those who have too much strength because they have too many hands, to be resisted any other way. "Popularity, that has great fortune to dazzle; splendid largesses to excite warm gratitude; sublime, beautiful and uncommon genius; or talents, that produce deep admiration; or any thing to support high hopes and strong fears, will be proud
