POLITICAL REPROSPECT.

From a Liverpool Paper of the 3d of September. We are still without any intelligence respecting the state of the conserences at Paris. Up to a late hour on Saturday night no messenger had arrived, nor could we learn that dispatches from the earl of Lauderdale had been transmitted through any other channel.

If I'r slia, as is considently believed, be a bar to the conclusion of l'eace, on the ground of reluling her affect to the reftoration of Hanover, a measure, in which it is not at all improbable that Bon parte has acquiesced, the prospect of the speedy terminition of the treaty would be greatly ffrengthened. Notwithstanding the imm, nie preparations for war e rried on by his Prussian majesty, we cannot reconcile ourselves to the opinion that he will hazard his crown, by undertaking hostilities against France. The loss of one battle would be the immediate forerunner of his ruin; and the conqueror would, by a fecond victory, erafe Prussia from the map of Europe. Neither by her internal force and resources, nor by her local situation, is she formed to sutlain the vicissitudes of a long war. She is undoubtedly a great military power; but, as in the times of Frederick the Cireat, she must have at her head a superior military genius. If the conflict Roulogne" had encomp don the coasts of conce commences, Bonsporte will not suffer her to breathe, and his arts and frauds will be tried in every direction, and by every means to spread detection among her allies, and to corrept her dependents. His Prussian majesty n'ay have made up his mind for the refult. : eprived of Bayreuth and Anspach, required to cede East Friesland and Embden, and imperiously called upon to restore Hanover, he may icel that uniess he makes a stand now, the endiess encroachmen s and demands of Bonaparte will terminate n his complete vassalage on France, or his extinction as a powerful monarch.-We shall indeed be surpized if he displays a courage, a resolution and perseverance of which he has not hitherto afforded the flightest proof. But, on the contrary, should he yield to the d'Etates of Napoleun, we apprehend that important points, besides the restoration of Hanover, will remain to be adjusted. We should not be surprised were the discussions suspended by common consent until the arrival at Paris of the expected dispatches from l'etersburg.

Letters were received on Saturd y from Hamburg, which mention, that hostilities had actually commenced between Prussia & France. General Rucher, a very old gener I in the Prussian service, is said to have been killed. It is added, that the French had croffed over to Embden, where the engagement is reported to have tiken

Consider, ble progress is supposed to have

been alre dy mide in the formation of the new Northern Confederation. This union is to be under the protection of Russia. & is likely to prove, in some degree at least. a counterpoile to the Feder tion under the protection of France. It is doubsful, however, whether Bonaparte will ollowathis part of his own plan to be carried into effect withoutderanging it by some new ambitious enterprize. He is believed to have made a demand on the court of lietlin, for some surther cessions in favor of the kingdom of Holland. The greatest activity prevails in the military depattment in all the Proffian states; and the movements that are made, and the politione that are taken, indicale a determination of resistance, from which better hopes might have been ehtertained if it had been displayed at that more auspicious and more essential period when 'all liurope looked to Frusse for its deliverwe do nor believe that the emperor of tance-but looked in vain.
