sign; the constitution of the Germanic Empire, such an extraordinary nature that it requires considerable reflection to ascertain precisely the magnitude of the alterations effected by Bonaparte. The constitution of Germany, which, with some innovations, has existed ever since the year 919, when the princes of the Empire, rejecting the Carlovianian race, exalted Courade (the Duke of Frantou) to the throne, has been completely overturned.

Ever since the death of Lewis III, one of the heirs of Charlemane, the monarchy of Germany has been elective, until the year 1805, when the present Francis the second declared the right to the Imperial crown to be hereditary in the house of Austria. The arch duke of Austria, Albert the second, was elected Emperor of Germany about the year 1438; and the dignity was continued in the male line of the same family until the year 1740, when the daughter of Charles the sixth, the empress-queen Theresa, inherited in virtue of the Pragmatic Sanction, (the elector of Bavaria having enjoyed the title of emperor for about five years during the wars of that period) and her husband, the duke of Lorraine, was elected Emperor; and bore the title of Francis I. On his death, Joseph (the son of the empress-queen) succeeded him in 1765. To Joseph succeeded Peter-Leopold; and to him in the early part of the French revolution, the present Francis the second, whose destiny has "shone of its beams" the sun of his illustrious house; and degraded his title and his dignity, from the splendor of Emperor of Germany, to the feeble lustre of Emperor of Austria; thereby reducing himself and his posterity to the same grade from which they originally sprung—simply, and in fact, to the station of Archdukes of Austria. Such is the fate of princes; subject in truth like the meanest of mankind to all the changes of fortune.

In the weakness of Francis the second, in the treachery of the princes of the south and west of Germany, and in that formidable military force which he wields at pleasure, Bonaparte has found the means of instituting the confederation of the Rhine; and of placing himself at its head as protector. Europe, astonished at the boldness of his plans, my complacency in his innovations; but reflection will tell to the crowned heads of that continent and of the island of Great Britain, that they have been the true cause of the concentration of that tremendous military and civil power which now rests in the hands of the Emperor of the French and King of Italy. If Bonaparte was a First Consul, the gold of England and the soldiers of Germany made him one; the same cause exalted him to the Imperial dignity, and in addition to those achievements which (if not in virtue yet in power) make him as a sovereign the complete parallel of Charlemane.

What will be done with the principalities of the north of Germany is uncertain. Whether the king of Prussia is to be rendered the protector of a confederation in that quarter, or whether any arrangements have been made with Russia on the subject, time will develop. These surprising revolutions on the continent of Europe, must awaken in the minds of the princes of England the most fearful sensations; lest, in the jumble and confusion which Bonaparte occasions, among kingdoms and crowned heads, the degenerate descendants of the house of Este, the profligate and sottish Gu-lips, might share a worse fate than the descendant of the house of Lorraine. But what should chiefly attract and fix the attention of the American reader, is the lamentable fate which has attended the constitution of Germany. The great outline of that constitution resembles, in many respects, the constitution of the U. States of America. Like the latter, the former consisted of a confederation of states; their diet resembled our Congress; their emperor (in prerogative) our president. What has occasioned the dissolution of the Germanic confederation? What! Why, the local broils and squabbles of the individual states or principalities of which it was composed. Those internal disagreements gave rise to the introduction of foreign influence, which, by dividing the members of the confederacy, finally overthrew the empire.

Such, indeed will be the end of all confederacies, where local distinctions are excited and give rise to national animosity. Gen. Washington clearly saw the danger of such distinctions, and wisely warned his countrymen to avoid the evil. "One of the expedients of party to acquire influence, within particular districts, (says the Gen. in his farewell address) is to misrepresent the opinions and aims of other districts. You cannot shield yourselves, so much against the jealousies and heart burnings, which spring from these misrepresentations. Too much of the spirit of local dissention has already prevailed in America. The people should recal their wandering thoughts from petty personal animosity, to the contemplation of national interests; and not suffer the enemies to their happiness and freedom to undermine their affection for the Union, at large, by means of local distinctions. No time is better for contemplating the evils resulting from such distinctions, than the present, when the Germanic constitution, that great source of states, has just been dissolved, and the power of a neighboring potentate, is
