

of ballast which they may be so deficient in furnishing to the colony. It is furthermore directed that the said gravel ballast is to be brought on shore and discharged by the masters or other persons having the command on board the ships or vessels herein before alluded to on a spot near the river side, which will be made known in proper time, and the said gravel ballast to be employed for the keeping in repair of the public roads or such other purposes of public utility as we may hereafter direct.

We have also thought fit to forbid and hereby do expressly forbid the throwing overboard any ballast from ships or vessels lying in this harbor, on pain of a fine of one thousand guilders, to be forfeited and paid by the captain or person having the command of such ships or vessels, and to be applied one third for the use of the colony, one third for the use of the Fiscal, and the remaining third for the informer or informers.

And we require and enjoin the harbor-master and all others whom it may concern, to attend to the strict execution of this ordinance.

And that no ignorance may be pretended of this ordinance, the same is to be published, posted up and printed for general information.

This enacted in our ordinary assembly held at the court-house in Stabrock, this 31st of July, 1806, and published the 16th of August the next following.

Such is the alarming increase of the poor's rates in England and Wales, that the total amount for the last twelve months, was 5,248,607l. The average rates of the levies, for the counties of England, was 4s. 5d. in the pound, on the rents. The average rate in Wales, was 7s. 3d. in the pound.

Extract of a letter from a gentleman at Detroit, to his friend in New-York, dated Sept 24th.

"You will remember I wrote you of the fraud which occurred here in December last—viz. two British Officers, aided by some officers and citizens of the United States, attempting to take away a detainer from Detroit. Their trial came on this Court.—Capt. Muir, one of the British Officers, is fined 10l. sterling and 17 days imprisonment.—Lieut. Lundy is fined 2000l. sterling and 6 months imprisonment; and Lieut. Brevort, an American officer, 100l. New-York currency and 75 days imprisonment. There are two other individuals still depending against Lundy and Brevort, for assault and battery committed at the same time, on each person. These decisions create great warmth in the minds of the people."

Extract of a letter from Capt. Olcott, late of the brig Nancy, of New-York bound from thence to Havana, dated Nassau, N. P. September 26th, 1806, to his owners.

"Gentlemen, I am sorry to inform you of our misfortune. After leaving New York, we experienced nothing material until the 13th, when we were brought to and boarded by the privateer sch'r Favorite, captain Byrnet, of New-Providence, within one mile of the Berry Islands. After detaining me three hours, took all my letters and ship's papers, manned us with six men and ordered us for Providence. A few days after, it began to blow a hurricane, and continued till we went on shore which was at about 6 o'clock on the 14th. When we first struck the Bank, I expect every soul would have been lost, but fortunately for us, we cut away both masts which eased her immediately, and the gale abated in a few hours after. The privateer which was in company hove over all her guns, cut away her foremast, and by that means weathered out the gale. Two days after she came to our assistance and landed a great part of our cargo on Stimp's Key, together with myself, passengers and crew. She has not nor can she give any plausible reason for detaining me. I have entered my protest, and am taking legal steps to make them pay the damages I have suffered."

A daring attempt was made last evening to rob the *Mechanic's Bank* in this city... We learn that the villains entered the house by opening one of the windows in the back part of it, and succeeded so far as to break a hole through the partition and get into the banking room; but not finding what they were in search of, they decamped with precipitation. People who feel interested in the welfare of the institution, and contribute towards paying a Centinel for doing his duty, seem inclined to ask the following simple question—*Where was the Watchman at the time this happened?*

Three Friends, Harvey, for Baltimore, uncertain; brig Sally, Brown, for Philadelphia in all October; Louisa, Clark, do. do. ship Alfred, Bell, of Salem, discharging; Washington, Drew, Boston, in a few days; ship Packet, Philadelphia, performing quarantine; brig Harriot, of Beverly, for Alexandria, (Egypt); Argo, Kempton, of Duxbury, for Sicily in a few days. 23th, spoke brig Benjamin, from St. Thomas, for New York, reported that the day before he sailed St. Thomas was half burned down, had not time to receive any particulars. The U. S. schooner Enterprize, was at quarantine repairing. Passed in the bay, ship Bacchus, from Hamburg; Carlisle, from Amsterdam; brig Newton from Antwerp, and a number of others bound up.

Also, sch'r. Wolf, Jones, 13 days from Charleston—Rice—the master. Four days since off Haiti was, spoke the British brig Avon, from England, last from Bermuda, with Mr. Erskine, the British minister, on board, bound to Annapolis. Passed a number of square rigged vessels in the bay, did not speak them.
