**NEW YORK, October 29.**  
**FOUR DAYS LATER.**  
Our London Advices now reach the evening of the 10th September—the latest brought by the ship Projection, captain Terry, who arrived here yesterday from Liverpool.  
By the following extracts, it will be perceived, that the state of Mr. Fox's health was such that there was but little prospect of his recovery.  
C. J. Fox was born on the 13th January, 1747, and came to Parliament in 1768. Nothing decisive was probably known in London respecting the negotiations—the public mind was much perplexed with the uncertain state of this all important subject.

At Falmouth, wind bound the 7th September, Lord Hobert Packet, Hamiltion, for N. York.  
LONDON, September 6.  
We received last night some Dutch papers to Monday last, from which we have given several extracts. They show that France has taken alarm at the warlike preparations of Prussia and demanded an explanation. The cabinet of Berlin has answered, that they were for defensive purposes, by which an article under the head of Frankfurt, affects to understand, that they are exclusively connected with the plan of the Northern Confederacy, and do not relate to France.  
We received also this morning The Leyden Gazette of the 21st instant. It has copied from the Monitor of the 26th, August, the orders for the march of the Austrian prisoners to Germany, and the return of the French troops to France before the last of September, but letters from Suabia and Bavaria of a more recent date in the other Dutch Papers, are silent upon the subject. The Leyden Gazette of the 2d contains a pre-test of the King of Wirtemberg, against the cessation of Tuttingen to Baden, according to the 14th article in the Treaty of the Confederation of the Rhine, and offering an equivalent; and also a Proclamation of the Magistrates of Frankfurt, recommending to the people acquiescence in its new change.  
We know that many accounts equally authentic, were received in town yesterday, any one of which ought to have silenced the false reports of Mr. Fox's dissolution yesterday morning. At 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon we had further information that he was still alive. A messenger arrived at that hour at his house in Stable Yard, with orders for some articles wanted for his use. An account was at the same time received, stating that he was very low, but composed. Still however, the reports of his death were repeated with increased confidence, by the ignorant, the credulous, and the designing. In the fact of his death, they were, indeed, all agreed; they only differed in the time. Some said it took place at five in the morning, others at ten. At eight o'clock, however, a bulletin, dated Chiswick, 7 o'clock in the evening, of which the following is a copy was received by one of his particular friends in town:  
"Mr. Fox is still very ill, but his pulse is rather stronger than yesterday."  
"D. CLINE."

Notwithstanding these repeated assurances of his being still alive, the rumour of his death had not ceased the whole of yesterday and last night. Lord Robert Spencer left town at seven o'clock last evening, for Chiswick; Lord Holland and Viscount Howe were also there, and proposed to remain during the night. Mr. Sheridan came to town in the morning, and was unremitting in his enquiries during the day. At 10 o'clock last night he went to Devonshire House, and from thence to Chiswick, from which place he returned at 5 o'clock this morning. These proofs of the attachment of Mr. Fox's friends, shew the imminent danger in which they considered him.  
"Ever since Mr. Fox became alarmingly ill, an express we understand has been daily sent, with an account of his situation, to his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, for his tour. The ordinary express was sent off yesterday morning, and another was dispatched, last night, at twelve o'clock. The alarming state of Mr. Fox, it is thought, will induce His Royal Highness to discontinue his tour, and return to town immediately. We do not find that any bulletins or written medical reports of Mr. Fox's state, were received in town this morning from Chiswick. Our verbal accounts up to 12 o'clock state, that he had a very bad night, but was still alive."

It was Mr. Smith the messenger, and not Mr. Beallico, as may be seen in this account, who was dispatched to Lord Lauderdale, after the council broke up, which sat upon the last dispatches received from France.

**WASHINGTON, October 19.**  
The latest information from the warward is contained in letters from Governor Claiborne, dated the 15th of September. At that time Governor Claiborne was about seventy miles from Natchitoches, occupied in organizing the militia on whose part there appeared to be a general readiness to furnish, even among the French inhabitants. No chance was taken in the situation of the troops on either side. Governor Erarré was still dangerously ill; his forces had been considerably diminished by disease, and
