By the New York papers we find that the latest London dates, brought by the Protection, are only to the evening of the 10th September, at which time Mr. Fox still survived; but the accounts of his situation are gloomy in the extreme, as will be perceived by the accounts we publish to-day.

He was. at Chiswick yesterday, from which he did not return till eleven o'clock last night. Should Mr. Fox survive this day, Mr. Basilico will set off this night.
