LONDON, S. p. 7. Extract of a dispatch from Major General Sir John Stuart, to Hugh Elliot, Esq. dated Messina, 3d August, 1806. Having occasion to send an express to my aid de Camp, captain Bulkely, at Palermo, I avail myself of the opportunity to acquaint you with another fortunate result of our auspicious day at Maida. Cotrone, with all its stores, magazines, &c. and 600 troops (now prisoners) capitulated on Wednesday evening last to the land and naval forces of his Britannic Majesty under Lieutenant Colonel Leob, of the 78th regiment, and Captain Hoste, of His Majesty's frigate Amphion, who were assisted in their operations against that place, and upon the adjacent coasts, by the gun boats of his Sicilian Majesty. Three hundred prisoners, who prove to be survivors of the wounded after the action of the 4th ult. are already arrived in this port. General Regnier, who had endeavoured to hold his position, under much embarrassment for some time past, between Cotrone and Catanzaro, has retreated precipitately towards Tarento; and it was reported, when the transport left Cotrone, that he had been attacked by the masses, and had lost 6 or 700 of his flying people. I am now to congratulate you on the total evacuation of Calabria Ultra, in which single province, previous to the action of the 4th, we have every certainty that the enemy had a distributed force of at least 5000 men; of these, when general Regnier quitted his position near Cotrone, certainly not 3000 remained. The losses of the French in Upper Calabria have also borne a proportion. A great deal of heavy ordnance, lately transported by the French to Cotrone, besides what was found mounted on the Castle, amounting in the whole, to about 40 pieces, have fallen into our hands. We have received a letter from our correspondent at St. Petersburg, of one day later than the dispatches transmitted to government. It states that news had just reached that capital of a complete victory gained by the Russian army over the Persians, in which the latter were almost all killed or taken prisoners. It appears that the Russian officers had for some days previous to the battle, been exciting their troops to take a dreadful revenge for the murder of Prince Zianoff, and their efforts were crowned with success. This victory was considered of so much importance, that when the post came away preparation were making to illuminate the Russian capital. Yesterday we received a letter from Hamburg, of one day later date than the contents of the last Hamburg mail. It has furnished us with the subsequent interesting variety of facts. Notwithstanding the important preparations of the Prussian government, it is confidently asserted at Hamburg, that both the King of Prussia and the Emperor of Austria have acknowledged the Renshaw convention, the Kings of Naples and Holland, and all the changes that Bonaparte has made, or is about to make, in the Germanic Empire. The Prussian troops under gen. Blucher have taken a concentrated position which extends from Liene to Ticklenburgh. The explanations demanded by the Emperor Alexander, relative to the treaty signed by D'Oubril, have been sent to Paris by a Knight of Malta, who lately passed through Berlin with the utmost expedition. There appears to be no foundation for the report that the French have agreed to cede Istria and Venetian Dalmatia to the emperor Francis. The Prussians are building a bridge-re-doubt near Hoyas, on the Weser. The warlike operations of Austria, though conducted with such astonishing reserve, have been vigorous beyond example. There is not a single regiment but what is at present filled beyond its complement, and a considerable Austrian force has lately encamped below Passau. An idea of the extraordinary activity of the Prussian Government may be formed from the circumstances of from twenty to thirty Estates being dispatched daily to different parts of the kingdom, as well as to Foreign Courts. Immediately on the accommodation between Sweden and Prussia 2000 additional workmen were employed upon the fortifications of Stralsund, who are to continue their operations till that place is rendered impregnable. Baron Jacobi, immediately on his arrival at Berlin, was ordered to hold himself in readiness to repair to Vienna, as Ambassador Extraordinary from the court of Prussia. A courier from St. Petersburg arrived a few days since at Vienna, with a letter from Alexander to Francis II. who immediately had a conference with the ministers of State, at which court Colloredo the new President of the council of War, assisted. Bonaparte is said to have already made some incroachments on the Etrurian dominions; in favour of the Prince of Lucas. The environs of Frankfort Wirzburg, Schweinfurt, and all parts of Swabia, are overwhelmed with French troops and artillery. Great movements prevail among the troops in the Landgraviate of Heise Cassel, where the Landgrave is returned to the Capital from Carlsbad. In Hanover all the young men able to bear arms are forcibly enlisted to serve in the Prussian army.
