CORN EXCHANGE, September 8. We had a good supply of Wheat for this morning's market, and as there can now be no apprehension of the want of Bread Corn, prices have declined 3s. and 4s. per quarter in the sales of fine samples, and more on those of second and ordinary quality. We still remain short of Barley, with an increase in price, and shall do till the new crop finds its way to our stands. Peas of the various kinds continue dear, but they are not higher than last week. Beans of each sort, are rather declining in value; and Oats, of which we have large arrivals, are likewise cheuper. Fine Flour has fallen back to 70s. per sack, and Rape Seed is considerably lower.

FRANKFORT, August 20.

That negociations between Prussia & Sweden have commenced is confirmed. Some propositions on the part of Russia are also spoken of, in consequence of which, all the obstacles to a good understanding will probably be removed.

The military preparations of the Prussian Cabinet have not yet ceased; but we are convinced that these have no re-Tation either to war or peace, as their sole object is the new possessions and Extension of territory. On this head we can quote a private letter from Berlin, in which the writer expressed himself thus: - Prussia seems to feel the inevitable necessity of drawing closer the bands of union by which, she is connected with the North of Germany. As it is the object of the Prussian Cabinet (which every thing tends to confirm to support or rather extend its influence over the neighbouring states, there is an unavoidable necessity for giving effect to its measures; this alone can ensure the issue of the sentiments of those persons who look upon these preparations as connected with Northern Consedratition, of which the king of Prussia may become the head, are well founded, and probably those only are supported by fact; but nothing is so ridiculous as to fall in with the ideas of some English politicians, in supposing. that these preparations of Prussia are intended against France. On the contrary, it is positively known, that the best understanding subsists between both, powers. The cordiality with hich the Feast of St.: Napoleon was celebrated at Berin by M. LaForest and the principal part of the Prussian ministers and generals, offers a fresh proof of this assertion." Aug. 24.
