LONDON, Sept. 12-13.

Mr. Fox, to the great joy of his numerous friends, continued much better yesterday, as will be seen by the following bulletin: Thursday, Sept. 11, 12 o'clock at night

Messrs. Basilico and Smith left town, for Paris, early yesterday morning. We find by our Deal letter, that they actually took with them the Turtle, of which there was so much talk in the newspapers

This morning, about half past eleven o'clock, arrived from London, Messrs. Basilico and Smith, messengers, who waited on Admiral Hallway, and then embarked on board the Speculator lugger

Paris journals to the 8th inst. inclusive, have been received. The extracts which we have given from the Moniteur will be read with interest. Notice has at length been taken in that journal of the refusal of Alexander to ratify M. D'Oubril's treaty

This amounts to a direct acknowledgment, that the influence of the British government on the affairs of the continent, is not reduced to that state of insignificance which the Moniteur had been for some time proclaiming with so much confidence

We were the first to inform the public, and we have more than once stated the fact, that D'Oubril was imposed upon by a falsehood, and, under an erroneous impression, he did sign what the French have called a treaty

All this has taken place since the negotiations of peace commenced, and yet we find people affecting to wonder at the delays which have taken place in its completion. Are not the grounds entirely changed? Is the interest, the influence, and preponderance of a power, which counts all means lawful to gain its ends, alone to be consulted on such an occasion?

The attempt was made more than once, but it failed. We know that before Mr. Shaw, who brought dispatches from Lord Lauderdale, which were received on Sunday, left Paris, his Lordship had sent for passports to quit France, and that in consequence Talleyrand begged to have another interview

His Lordship, and Suite, were packing up for their removal; but when the

last messenger, Parsons, who arrived yesterday, left Paris, the negotiations had been again resumed. This furnishes some proof that the French Cabinet has lowered somewhat in the demands, and holds out a stronger ground than before existed for entertaining a hope that the present Negotiations may yet terminate in Peace

INTERCEPTED LETTERS.

General Berthier Chief of the Staff, to General Requier.

His majesty received, by M. Jamin, the details of the landing of the enemy, and of the dispositions which you had made. His majesty is extremely vexed, and still more surprised at the conduct of the troops, which has rendered your well-judged dispositions unavailing

His majesty sends 1200 men to reinforce General Verdier, with instructions, a copy of which is transmitted to you. He orders the troops to defend above Cassano, which is a central point, and in the possession of which, they will be able to direct their march wherever their presence may be necessary

I have the honour to salute you, Monsieur General, with the most marked consideration.

I have withstood, as well as I was able, the whole rebel population of the Province, which has attacked me near Cosenza, from the 1st to the 9th current. I have received information by his majesty's aid-de-camp Jamin, of your engagement, and your retreat upon Cotrone

On arriving at Pollicoro, I found an officer of the Staff, who was charged with the annexed dispatches for you, by which I learn that some reinforcements are to be sent to you

I expect that when his majesty learns our real situation, he will be desirous to relieve us from the embarrassing circumstances in which we are placed. The relation of all that has occurred to me being too voluminous to be conveyed to you at this moment, I have written to the Staff, intending to transmit it to
