Various erroneous statements respecting the expiration of the British treaty newspapers, we think it may be useful to repeat what we observed on a former occ. ssion, that according to the li. i ation expressed in the 28th article, it expired on the first of October, 1803, except as to the ten first articles, unich are permaneut. All the articles except those ten and the 12th article, were limited to a term of twelve years from the date of the ratification; but the 12th article (which was only partially ratified) was ! preliminary or other articles of peace, and it was provided that if in the intermediate time no new arrangements on the subject tween the two nations, the whole treaty except the ten first articles should expire with the 12th article. No such arrangements howe er were substituted, an I the condition taking effect, all the articles, except the ten first, ceased two years after, signing of the preliminaries of the late general peace, that is to say, they ceased on the first of Ortober, 1803. It may not be, amiss to add that this construction has been acquiesced in by the Prig Betsey, Davis, British government.
