ROBERT BOWIE, GOVERNOR OF MARYLAND. A PROCLAMATION.

TATHEREAS the General Assembly of Ma-VV ryland d.d, by an act, passed at November session, eighteen hundred and five, entitled. An act to reduce into one the several acts of assimily respecting elections, and to regulate said elections, direct, that the governor and council, after having received the returns. of the elections of members to represent this state in the congress of the United States, should enumerate and ascertain the number of votes given for cach and every person voted for as a member to congress aforesail respectively, and shall thereupon declare, by proclamation, signed by the governor, the name of the person or persons duly elected in each respective district: We, in pursuance of the directions of a e said act, do, by this our proclamatio, deciare, that by the returns made to us it appears, that John Campbell, Esquire, was elected for the first district; Archibald Van-Horn, Esquire, was elected for the second district; Philip Barton Key, Esquire, was elected for the third district; Loger Nelson, Esquire, was elected for the fourth district; Nicholas Ruxton Moore, and William M'Greery.
