By yesterday's Scythian Mail, we received a letter from our attentive correspondent at No. 11, furnishing us with the following important Intelligence, which we conceive will place the result of the Negotiation at Paris beyond a doubt, and prepare the public mind for the reception of what is indicated—a renewal of an European continental War.

By the ship William Penn, Watfon, in 40 days from Nantz, we have received Paris papers to the 20th Sept. Captain Watfon states that the baggage of Lord Lauderdale was packed up, and he would leave Paris in a few days. Bonaparte, at the head of his guards, had left Paris and marched for the North.

By our Paris papers, we observe that Lord Grenville had been so ill as to be unable to attend to public business. [Translated for the Ledger.] Paris, September 19. The day before yesterday, in the morning, a great number of squadrons of chaffeurs, and horse grenadiers, with a detachment of flying artillery of the imperial guard, defiled from the boulevards, and took it is said the rout for Belgium, these troops were remarkable for their fine appearance, and the military ardor which they exhibited, repentment and impatience for war, were painted in the countenances of the officers and soldiers. The gazetteers in the north of Germany, for the last six weeks, have not ceased to place before us, the marches of the Russian, Prussian and Swedish armies, which they think are to form an allied army; they appear to forget that France has more than 500,000 soldiers to sustain the glory of her arms, and to avenge the faith of treaties. M. Kotzebue, who recalls so happily, and so proposes all the events of the memorable seven years war, is advised to count the victories of the French armies, in a war of three months only. He should reflect on the imprudence of lighting a flame that will not be easily extinguished, and that no force can oppose with impunity, the first captain of his age, and the most warlike army in the world, who is about to enter the fields of their former glory. These brave men who moved with so much rapidity from the borders of the channel
