The hon. D. M. Erskine, with his Lady and family arrived at Philadelphia on Friday last.

A Fire broke out on Friday morning in Philadelphia, in a building attached to Dr. Hunter's laboratory, containing a large quantity of sait-petre and other valuable articles. The buildings in which the fire originated, together with two contiguous dwelling houses, were entirely consumed.

LATER FROM FRANCE.

Since our last we have received, via N. York Paris dates to the 25th September inclusive. The report of Bonaparte's having left Paris, as. stated in the American of Saturday, remains unconfirmed. Preparations were continued over the whole of the i propean continent for a recommencement of war, and the papers breathe a spirit of hestility.

In the translations we have made, fays the Mercantile Advertifer (which, with the following brief, extract, comprise the most prominent features of the intelligence) we have given a preference to the celebrated treaty between France and Russia, which the emperor Alexander refuted to ratify. Other articles of minor, consequence are on hand and shall appear

When the treaty of D'Oubril was received at St. Pete: fourg, the emperar fummoned a council of flate, expressly for the purpose of fubmitting to their judgment this act of pacification. The treaty being compared with the instructions, it appeared to the council that M. D'Oubril had not only deviated from his orders, but that he had afted in direct opposition to the letter and spirit of the mission with which he had been charged. The imperial council, inspired by one common sentiment for the honor of their country, agreed with his majefty that this act cught not to obtain the supreme ratification. Notice thereof was immediately lent by the emperor to the French government, at the same time expressing a disposition to renew the

negociations upon other bales. The consequence has been, that France, Holland, Russia, Prussia, Sweden, and the confederation of the Rhine, are actively employed in measures for a renewal of hottilities with a vigor perhaps unprecedented even in the annals

of modern wariare. Nor is Austria an idle looker on. The force the maintains, of which the Archduke Charles is generalishmo, is composed of 8 field-marfinals, 31 generals of cavalry, 117 lieutenant generals, 271 major-generals, 64 regiments of infantry of the line, 56 other regiments of ditferent descriptions, besides corps of bombar-

diers, miners, &c. All the corps of the national army of Holland have received orders to hold themselves in readiness to march to the camp at Zeist, at a

moment's notice. Recruiting is vigorously carrying on in all

the provinces of Lavaria. The camp at Meudon had not broken up on the 25th September. Such a measure was expected to take place daily; and it is given as a report in one of our Paris papers, that the soldiers who compose this camp received on the 17th leave of ablence for the latt time previous to their marching towards Germany. The regiments of foot composing the emperor's body-guard had left Paris in light waggons for the Rhine, where an immense army was assembling, and it was expected would reach that river in a sew, days. Their post at the palace of the Thuilleries was filled by the dragoons of the emprels.

Intelligence from St. Petersburg announces the expected speedy departure of several armed vessels and frigates for Corfu.

The English, it is said, have debarked, heof whom were entirely destroyed.

The infurgents on the frontiers of Turkey continue to obtain advantages over the Cttoman army. Czerni-George had encamped before Eelgrade on the 27th of August.

Letters from Madrid, of the 8th August, mention, that the king had given r ders for an army of 40,000 men to hold themselves in readiness to march. It is thought this order was in confequence of the entrance of the

English into the Tagus. A gentleman who came passenger in the Richard is the bearer of dispatches from the American minister at Paris to the secretary of state, and an elegant medal, a present from his imperial majetly to the president of the United States.

Lord Lauderdale was at Paris the 25th of

September.

A Paris paper fays - Haydn, the great musician, died about the 1st of September.

It was the prevailing opinion at Paris, on the 25th of September, and at Nantz on the 1st of October, that there would be no peace with England; and that the whole of Europe would immediately be again involved in a war.

It was whispered, in confidential circles at Paris, that Bonaparte had determined to compliment the Queen of Ltruria, with the kingdom of Portugal.

On the 14th of September, Jerome Bonaparte, with meen pomp and parade, and amidit the shouts of a Parician mob, was created a Prince of the Empire.

The king of Sweden, as appears from an article dated Altona, September 2, after railing for a few days the blockade of the Prussan ports, ordered them to be blockaded anew. An article, dated Peilin, August 30, says, It is rumored that all our differences with England are on the point of being terminated.

Extract of a letter, dated New-York, Nov. 15. " By the ship Richard, arrived here yesterday, 42 days from Nantz, I have received letters from my partners there (De la Roche and Ca) to the 1st of October, which mention

that all hopes of peace were at an end, & that the French armies were marching towards Prussia. Lord Lauderdale on the 25th Sept. was still in Paris, tletained by sickness. The consequence of all this has been a rise in the prices of colonial produce, which were getting scarce and in demand.

Extract of a letter received at Philadelphia, dated St. Thomas, 25th October.

"No doubt, ere you receive this, you will have heard of the capture of a number of Ealtimore veilels, bound to this port from 'ayti, and carried into Tortola. The thip Eutaw and schooners Medusa and Nonsuch, belonging to Nr. Rennedy, of L'altimore, captured off the mouth of this harbor, have been released by compromise. Bir. Kennedy was on beard the Eutaw at the time of the capture. He has gi-, ven the captors 40,000 dollars to give up the property. The compromise was essedted with | Marine articles from French papers from the advice and approbation of Nr. Litle, of Tortola, who is agent for the principal part of the Insurance Companies in the United States. There are some other vessels whose fate has not yet been decided, viz. sch'rs Gen. Eaton, Beauty Rolla, and Rebecca, all of Baltimore.

"The following Philadelphia vellels are there. Erig Grace-Ann-Green, Savin: Commodore arney, Meade; sch'rs Governor M'Kean, Acton; and Ann-Eliza, Castigan. Also, brig Charleston Packet, Abbot, from Cayenne, difmasted, fince condemned.

" Nothwithstanding the rigorous blockade kept up by the ritith squadron, the French privateer Jeune Adelle, of 14 gens, from Guadaloupe, came in here on the 21th, whilft the frigates Jalon and Venus were at anchor off the harber. She had Danith colors heified, until the got under the protection of the fort, and then holified the reach national flag, to the no. finall aftonishment of all present."

A London paper of September 19, say -- " Sir Home Popham has written letters from Burnes Arris, to the Mayor and Corporation of Birming am and other principal commercial cities, in which he points out the importance of this conquest to the trade of Great Britain: He says the city of Burnes Ayres, alone contains 70,000 inhabitants. The staples of the country are indigo, tobacco, vincenta, wool, cotton, tiger, & seal : kins, fige, dried tongues, beet & hams, saffron cocninelle, coco., hemp, hides tallow, gum, gold, silver, and precious stones. Of the articles of hides, there are exported every year, upwards of 400 000."

Accounts have been received in London of a most terrible acident having happened at Malia. On the 18th of July (some of the letters say on the 151) a magazine, containing nearly 400 barrels of gunpowder and a number of shells, grenades and other combustibles, bl. w up and caused incredible mischiel. Upwards of 1400 inhabitants are reported to have been killed or dreadfully m gled, a number of houses were destroyed, and some damage cone to the ships in the harbour. The following is a copy of one of the letters that have been received:

"MALTA July 18 - (Private letter.) " I now come to relate to you an event of the most melancholy description, and almost unparalleled in regard to the dreadful and miserable consequences. It happened this morning. A magazin tock fire, and blew up with an explosion scarcely ever known to be equalled; by it 370 barrels of gunpowder, and above 1600 shelis and grenades, were blown up. Such an imm use quantity as 10 000 lbs. of gunpowder must occasion the most dreadful havoc and destruction. houses adjacent in every direction were blown immediately into ruius—and how shocking it was to the inhabitan's you may easily conceive, as there was no c hance of escaping. The bui lings are all of stone, of an immense thickness. It is calculated that one thousand persons have either perished or are dreadfully maimed. Theorincipal sufferers are the Maltese, who chiefly lived near the place-One man tween Terracina and Gaeta, about 500 men, all ' has lost his wife and six childern-others nearly the same; and w ole families are buried together. Those who escaped momentary death perhaps, are shockingly disfigured and maimed;" and crawling about in a miserable condition: Fourtzen artill.rymen, who were in the magazine, were of course blown to atoms--- The band of a regiment (the 39th) were just playing "God save the King" near the place---two men were killed on the spot the whole remainder were much wounded. The guards on duty were killed. The magazine is situated on the side of the water opposite to the city of Valetta; it is called Barmola. Stones where thrown over to us, some to the distance of two miles. It was situated closé to the water side, and the bed of the sea was so shook by it, that it rose up and overflowed the banks. Two vessels (small ones) were sunk. Immense stones were thrown up which fell into the water; others on the ships and rigging; one I saw which fell on a vessel just arrived, weighed an hundred weight. The guard ship, the Madras man of war, moored some distance from the disastrous place : but a stone fell on the quarter deck, and broke the thigh of the gunner, who had lately arrived. A.Mr. Woodhouse here, who, with his brother, has a great wine making concern in Sicily, has lost two hundred and 50 pipes of it, worth nearly 70001 —they were at some distance from the place; but the shock was so great

> that the casks burst, "In short, it is a scene of misery which no language can describe. The churches are filled with the dead. A friend of mine just come from the ruins; says, that he was walking over them when he lighted on the head of a women. Her whole body was crushed flat; and although it is only a few hours since the general calamity took place, her body, owing to the intense heat, was emirely putified.-Nothing farther has yet been ascertained.


