Schrs Nimrod, of Baltimore; and Ann, of Alexandria, were left at Curacao 23 days since. The brig Hannah, of Newport, from Bordeaux for Baltimore, was spoken in lat. 44, long 25, 14 days out: she had lost her sails & sprung her foremast.

The brig Antelope, Gray, 17 days from Baltimore, for St. Thomas, was spoken on the 14th October, in lat. 28, long 65. The ship Cores, Webber, arrived at Charleston in 5 days from this port.

The Regulator, Sears, and Harriot, Russel, hence, have arrived at Richmond. The hon. D. M. Erskine, with his Lady and family arrived at Philadelphia on Friday last.

A fire broke out on Friday morning in Philadelphia, in a building attached to Dr. Hunter's laboratory, containing a large quantity of saltpetre and other valuable articles. The buildings in which the fire originated, together with two contiguous dwelling houses, were entirely consumed.

LATER FROM FRANCE.

Since our last we have received, via N. York Paris dates to the 25th September inclusive. The report of Bonaparte's having left Paris, as stated in the American of Saturday, remains unconfirmed. Preparations were continued over the whole of the European continent for a re-commencement of war, and the papers breathe a spirit of hostility.

In the translations we have made, says the Mercantile Advertiser (which, with the following brief extract, comprise the most prominent features of the intelligence) we have given a preference to the celebrated treaty between France and Russia, which the emperor Alexander refused to ratify. Other articles of minor consequence are on hand and shall appear hereafter.

When the treaty of D'Orbail was received at St. Petersburg, the emperor summoned a council of state, expressly for the purpose of submitting to their judgment this act of pacification. The treaty being compared with the instructions, it appeared to the council that M. D'Orbail had not only deviated from his orders, but that he had acted in direct opposition to the letter and spirit of the mission with which he had been charged.

The consequence has been, that France, Holland, Russia, Prussia, Sweden, and the confederation of the Rhine, are actively employed in measures for a renewal of hostilities with a vigor perhaps unprecedented even in the annals of modern warfare.

Nor is Austria an idle looker on. The force she maintains, of which the Archduke Charles is generalissimo, is composed of 8 field-martials, 31 generals of cavalry, 117 lieutenant-generals, 271 major-generals, 64 regiments of infantry of the line, 56 other regiments of different descriptions, besides corps of bombardiers, miners, &c.

All the corps of the national army of Holland have received orders to hold themselves in readiness to march to the camp at Zeist, at a moment's notice. Recruiting is vigorously carrying on in all the provinces of Saxaria.

The camp at Meudon had not broken up on the 25th September. Such a measure was expedient to take place daily; and it is given as a report in one of our Paris papers, that the soldiers who compose this camp received on the 17th leave of absence for the last time previous to their marching towards Germany. The regiments of foot composing the emperor's body-guard had left Paris in light waggons for the Rhine, where an immense army was assembling, and it was expected would reach that river in a few days. Their post at the palace of the Thuilleries was filled by the dragons of the empire.

Extract of a letter received at Philadelphia, dated St. Thomas, 25th October. "No doubt, ere you receive this, you will have heard of the capture of a number of Baltimore vessels, bound to this port from Italy, and carried into Tortola. The ship Furaw and schooner, Medusa and Nonuch, belonging to Mr. Kennedy, of Baltimore, captured off the mouth of this harbor, have been released by compromise. Mr. Kennedy was on board the Lutaw at the time of the capture. He has given the captors 40,000 dollars to give up the property. The compromise was effected with the advice and approbation of Mr. Lisle, of Tortola, who is agent for the principal part of the Insurance Companies in the United States. There are some other vessels whose fate has not yet been decided, viz. Ich's Gen. Eaton, Beauty Rolla, and Rebecca, all of Baltimore.

The following Philadelphia vessels are there. Erig Grace-Ann-Green, Savin; Commodore; Erney, Meade; Ich's Governor; Kean, Acton; and Ann-Eliza, Calligan. Also, brig Charlebon Packet, Abbot, from Cayenne, dismantled, since condemned. Notwithstanding the rigorous blockade kept up by the British squadron, the French privateer Jeune Adelle, of 14 guns, from Guadeloupe, came in here on the 21st, with the frigates Jalou and Venus were at anchor off the harbor. She had Danish colors hoisted, until she got under the protection of the fort, and then hoisted the French national flag, to the no small astonishment of all present.

A London paper of September 19, says—"Sir Home Popham has written letters from Buenos Ayres, to the Mayor and Corporation of Birmingham and other principal commercial cities, in which he points out the importance of this conquest to the trade of Great Britain: He says the city of Buenos Ayres, alone contains 70,000 inhabitants. The staples of the country are indigo, tobacco, vicenta, wool, cotton, tiger, & seal skins, figs, dried tongues, beef & hams, saffron, cinnamon, cocoa, hemp, hides tallow, gum, gold, silver, and precious stones. Of the articles of hides, there are exported every year, upwards of 400,000."

Accounts have been received in London of a most terrible accident having happened at Malta. On the 18th of July (some of the letters say on the 15th) a magazine, containing nearly 400 barrels of gunpowder and a number of shells, grenades and other combustibles, blew up and caused incredible mischief. Upwards of 1400 inhabitants are reported to have been killed or dreadfully mangled, a number of houses were destroyed, and some damage done to the ships in the harbour. The following is a copy of one of the letters that have been received: "MALTA July 18—(Private letter.)

"I now come to relate to you an event of the most melancholy description, and almost unparalleled in regard to the dreadful and miserable consequences. It happened this morning. A magazine took fire, and blew up with an explosion scarcely ever known to be equalled; by it 370 barrels of gunpowder, and above 1600 shells and grenades, were blown up. Such an immense quantity as 10,000 lbs. of gunpowder must occasion the most dreadful havoc and destruction. The houses adjacent in every direction were blown immediately into ruins—and how shocking it was to the inhabitants you may easily conceive, as there was no chance of escaping. The buildings are all of stone, of an immense thickness. It is calculated that one thousand persons have either perished or are dreadfully maimed. The principal sufferers are the Maltese, who chiefly lived near the place—One man has lost his wife and six children—others nearly the same; and whole families are buried together. Those who escaped momentary death perhaps, are shockingly disfigured and maimed, and crawling about in a miserable condition: Fourteen artillerymen, who were in the magazine, were of course blown to atoms. The band of a regiment (the 39th) were just playing "God save the King" near the place—two men were killed on the spot; the whole remainder were much wounded. The guards on duty were killed. The magazine is situated on the side of the water opposite to the city of Valetta; it is called Barnola. Stones were thrown over to us, some to the distance of two miles. It was situated close to the water side, and the bed of the sea was so shook by it, that it rose up and overflowed the banks. Two vessels (small ones) were sunk. Immense stones were thrown up which fell into the water; others on the ships and rigging: one I saw which fell on a vessel just arrived, weighed an hundred weight. The guard ship, the Madras man of war, moored some distance from the disastrous place: but a stone fell on the quarter deck, and broke the thigh of the gunner, who had lately arrived. A Mr. Woodhouse here, who, with his brother, has a great wine-making concern in Sicily, has lost two hundred and 50 pipes of it, worth nearly 7000l—they were at some distance from the place; but the shock was so great that the casks burst.

"In short, it is a scene of misery which no language can describe. The churches are filled with the dead. A friend of mine just come from the ruins, says, that he was walking over them when he lighted on the head of a woman. Her whole body was crushed flat; and although it is only a few hours since the general calamity took place, her body, owing to the intense heat, was entirely putrified. Nothing farther has yet been ascertained.

"By the ship Richard, arrived here yesterday, 42 days from Nantz, I have received letters from my partners there (De la Roche and Co.) to the 1st of October, which mention that all hopes of peace were at an end, & that the French armies were marching towards Prussia. Lord Lauderdale on the 25th Sept. was still in Paris, detained by sickness. The consequence of all this has been a rise in the price of colonial produce, which were getting scarce and in demand.

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It is supposed, however, that the men were employed in cutting away the fuses from the shells, or by some means a spark arose. The merchants here have begun a subscription of twenty pounds each, for the relief of the poor sufferers. A whole town, I may say, is destroyed.

"The accident happened this morning about a quarter past six o'clock. Tacy say there are now buried in the ruins one thousand barrels of gunpowder that are in danger: but I trust in God it is untrue, were that to blow up it would bring all Malta in ruins. May the Almighty avert such another distress!"

Armstrong, from Charleston; Acan, Nye, from New-York;—At Bordeaux, Phoenix, from Portland; Ocean, Harrison, from New-Orleans; Virginia, Coffin, from St. Sebastian; American, Acker, Swaine, from do.—At Certe, Sept 11, schooner Charity, Culling, from Bolton, via Alicante.

DIED at New-York, on the 11th inst. Mrs. Jones, the Actress. It is but a few weeks since her husband died at Charleston.—They had been for some time separated; and it is said the intelligence of his death afflicted her so deeply as to accelerate her dissolution.
