Latest Foreign News. Further extracts from French papers, per ship Richard, capt. Rogers. Paris dates to Sept. 26. It will be seen, by the following selections, in connection with what we gave yesterday, that there is not the most distant hopes of a Peace in Europe.

PARIS, Sept. 23. The Prussian General Ruchel, who is represented as the head of the war party in Prussia, is a Silesian Gentleman, of rather less than 50 years of age, and is in general looked on as having a certain theoretical acquaintance with the military art...

The pieces presented for the grand prize of architecture will be exhibited to the public on this day, the 21st, 22d and 23d inst. in the Gallery of Architecture, palace of the fine Arts (formerly College of the four Nations)...

The military commission established, the 18th, by Marshal Massena, in its first sitting condemned thirty-seven brigands, convicted of assassination and taken with arms in their hands. Thirty-five received sentence of death and were executed.

We learn from the Abruzzos, that 10,000 Frenchmen have entered them, part of whom are repairing to Apulia. Several rich Lords, who had retired from their country and had abandoned their fortunes to save their liberty, are now returning to their families, assured of enjoying tranquility, under a just and tutelar government.

Letters from Trielli, of the latter end of Aug. announce, that the English Consul in that city communicated upon charge, the official intelligence that an English fleet had failed from Malta with intention to blockade the ports of Venice, and that the merchants of Trielli were expected conformable to this notice, to suspend all their commercial relations with that place.

Private letters have been received at Berlin from Breslau, which state, "that orders had been given to the husbandmen in Silesia, to finish harvest as soon as possible, since Foreign Troops might soon cross Prussian Silesia."

It is confidently asserted, that all the corps of the Dutch army have received orders to hold themselves in readiness to march to the camp of Zeist.

The Juno, Crowell; Mermaid, Buck; and Polly, Bangs, from Baltimore, have arrived at Bolton. The schooner Intrepid, Riggs, from Baltimore for Curacao, was broken on the 2d Nov. in lat. 24, long. 67, out 7 days, all well.

A commission has been lately appointed to take cognizance of the St. Domingo business, and make a report on it to the emperor; and to this commission I have given a statement of four columns.

By this public instrument, he it made known to all whom the same doth or may concern, that I, John L. Ramage, Consul of the United States of America for the Island of Cuba, resident at Havana, do hereby certify, that on the day of the date hereof before me personally came and appeared Thomas B. Bennett, m'ler, Thomas Lynch, mate, and Giles Williams, seaman, of and belonging to the schooner Agenria, of Baltimore...

That on the twenty-fifth, at sunset, the British Frigate Haddock, Lieutenant Foley, commander, with a pilot boat schooner, her prize, all came to anchor, and at half past eleven P. M. the said Foley sent a boat along-side, and an officer came on board and demanded her papers; that at this time he the said Thomas B. Bennett was not on board; that in about a quarter of an hour he came on board and objected to the showing his papers, as they had been regularly examined by a British brig of sixteen guns, then lying at anchor near them; that upon this the said John Foley came on board and advised the said Thomas B. Bennett very grossly, snatched a pistol at him, and knocked him down several times.

That the said Bennett stated, that if a proper officer had come on board at first, he should have no objection to showing his papers; but the said Foley, was then very much intoxicated, and ordered his men to search for the crew, who came aft to get their provisions; and the said Foley having led to Henry Lara's (second mate's) possession, first struck him, and then ordered him and three others, to wit, Edward Williams, Giles Williams, and Joseph Fraley into the boat, without paying any attention to precautions; that at 1 A. M. the boat returned and delivered up the said Giles Williams and Joseph Fraley; and at day-light they discovered the said schooner under way, upon which they immediately made sail for her, in hopes to get the other man released; but the winds being light they could not succeed in their attempt to get up with her, and at 9 A. M. she was almost lost to view, and finding their endeavors fruitless, they at 10 o'clock about and stood in for the place they had been at anchor; that they again came to anchor there, and at 5 P. M. got under way; and on the thirteenth, in consequence of the impudent aforesaid, being short of hands, they put into this port. And the said Thomas B. Bennett did further depose, that the persons thus implicated are citizens of the United States, had protection, and were also certified as such by the collector of the port of Baltimore, on the list of the crew of said vessel; which he, the deponent, also exhibited to the said Foley.

And the deponent further saith, that there were several other vessels which he, the said Foley, under the assumed name of John Haddock, also boarded at the same time, and abused the captains and crews in an infamous manner. The said Thomas B. Bennett therefore doth, and I, the said vice-consul do, by these presents, most publicly and solemnly protest, as well against the said Foley, for the impudent and improper conduct aforesaid, as against all other matters and causes whereby or by means whereof any damage, loss or injury has been, or shall or may hereafter appear to be sustained in the premises, and for all costs and charges attending the same, to the end that the same be submitted unto, suffered and borne by those to whom of right it shall appertain, to be adjudged and recovered in time and place convenient.

Done and protested at Havana aforesaid, THOMAS B. BENNETT, THOMAS LYNCH, his mate, GILES WILLIAMS, seaman.
