It will be seen, by the following selections, in connection with what we gave yesterday, that there is not the most distant hopes of a l'eace in Europe. The articles now given are translated for, and inserted in the Argus, or London reviewed in Paris—a paper always pregnant with abule of the British government.

PARIS, Sept. 23.

The Prussian General Ruchel, who is represented as the head of the war party in Prussia, is a Silesian Gentleman, of rather less than 50 years of age, and is throughout. in general looked on as having a certain theoretical acquaintance with the military art, the application of which is fometimes attended with difficulty in the field of battle, witness what happened to General Mack, and to many other samous Generals in ibeary. Mr. Ruchel has been unable to acquire any practical experience, fince the Pruffian army has made no real campaign, for thele 21 years palt, i. e. fince the year | Latract of a letter received in Philadelphia from 1778.

Private letters have been received at Berlin from Breslau, which state, " that orders had been given to the husbandmen in Silesia, to sinish harvest as soon as possible, since Foreign Troops might foon crofs Prussian Silesia."

Notwithstanding these vague rumours and the late military motions, all good patriots at Berlin Hill preserve the hope that peace will not be dillurbed. Many however talk of nothing but War, and the military preparations are undoubtedly as serious as they were last winter. An extensive promotion of officers has taken place.

It is confidently afferted, that all the corps of the Dutch army have received orders to hold themselves in readiness to march to the camp of Zeist.
