SHIPWRECK. Cast away on the beach at Cape Hatteras on the 25th ult. the brig John and James, of Charleston captain Garmun, master. Sailed from Boston on Tuesday, 21st Oct. bound to Charleston, cargo rum, chocolate, butter, &c. Passengers, Mr. & Mrs. Claude, Mestrs. Bigsby, Dothrop, Waldoe, Manfon, and O. Sullivan. Upon leaving the roads of Hantasket, light winds from N. N. W. but gradually increased until we reached the Vineyard, when it came on fresh from N. N. E. and to continued. On Thursday took the sun, (weather remarkably pleafant) and found ourselves in the latitude of N. York; towards evening became a little hazy; and on Friday too cloudy to get an observation, weather notwithstanding tolerably pleafant with a moderate fea: at 120'clock on Friday night the moon appeared, and every prospect, as was supposed for fair weather; but to our altonishment and horror on Saturday morning, at about half past five o'clock, we were roused from our births by a violent sea pouring through our fky lights—among the paffengers a scene of consulion was the natural relult-but our sears were partially hullied by the mate's (whole watch it was) informing us, upon his being questioned by the captain, that we had only shipped a sea. All was now quiet; but alas! only for a moment, for we instantly selt too sensibly, that our first fears were right; and that we were on some shore or shoal. The first report from the seamen was, that we were on the flioals of Cape Hatterus: but to our joy, if such a sensation could enter ed tishorse and with a haded whip, the bolom of man at fuch a distressing period, we found ourselves within a few yards of the beach. Thus were we by the ever watchful care of an Almighty God, finatehed from a watery grave, and once more sately landed. Several of the inhabitants of the island were upon the shore; their intentions appeared friendly, and we cherished the hope that we flould by their affiliance be enabled to pursue our journey. The first day we waited patiently, under assurance from Mr. Baum, that by the second morning our baggage should be on board a small vessel we had charged to carry us to Edenton : from whence we under-Hood we could procure an immediate conveyance by land or water, to Charleston. The next day passed as the preceding. We then began to fulpeel what we esterwards found to be the keep us with him while there was to Ship Riling Sun, Pation, Erig Three Brothers, Pitch,

Port of Baltimore. CLEARED, Leghorn Guadaloure

Philacklphia, Nov. 17. Arrived, schr' Hazzard, fr. m Barracoz, in said suhr, came passengers, capt. Croudbill, and M. Sheppard of Alexandria, and Nr. Dilhorn of Philadelphia. Capt. Croudhill was taken in the brig Washington, on the 13th Sept. on his passage from Alexandria to Jamaica; when taken, Cape Francois, bore S. by E. distant 10 leagues, the vessel that captured him was called the Dolphin, a schr' commanded by sine howman, of 5 carriage guns and 100 men, fitted out from the city of St. Domingo by general Ferrand, and is called a national vessel, when capt. Croudhill was brought to by the said schr' they boarded him, and with drawn daggers drove the captain and the whole of his crew without enquiry or ceremony into the boat, with what they had on, and not permitting them to take an article of cloathing with them, they then mannedthe brig with what they called a prizemaster (a villian) and 11 men, and ordered her as they said for the city of St. Domingo .capt. Croudhill and his ship's company was kept on board the privateer which arrived in Barracoa on the 16th, 3 days after the capture, where they were turned ashore, naked and friendless, without even the assistance of a conful. On the 25th Sept. 12 days after the capture, this villianous prize-master with his piratical crew came to Barracoa, in the two boats to join the privateer, they having finally lost the vessel and cargo on some part of the Laicos, the particulars of which we could not 'earn.

What is still more ag ravating in this piratical captain, r. Dilling who was a prisoner on board and understands the French language, reports as follows:

That while the sch'r was running up with the brig, and at the distance of two leagues, it was determined by the captain of the privateer to make a prize of her, in crisequence of which when he sent the prize-master and crew on board, he signed his name on blank paper for the villain to fill up his own instructions—thus has captain Croudhill lost his fine new brig and cargo, of which he was a considerable part owner himself, loaded with Flour, Indian Corn and bread, and in a fair and legal commerce.

r. Dilling, who was supercargo of the schoone. Come-by Chance, was captured about three hours before, by the same vessel, and treated nearly in the same manner : the schoone. was companied by captain Gamble, and bound from Philadelphia to St. Jago de-Cuba; she was sent to Barracca, where they plundered her of every article of the vessel, and had also made a considerable breach on the cargo before her trial, which was to take place in St.
