LEGISLATURE OF MARYLAND

SKETCH OF PROCEEDINGS.

HOUSE OF DELEGATES.

FRIDAY, Nov. 14.

Mr. Little appeared in the House. Mr. Bruce Selby, a delegate returned from Montgomery county, appeared, and after being qualified, took his seat.

A petition from the President and Directors of the Mechanics' Bank in the city of Baltimore, praying to be incorporated, was referred to Messrs. Disquith, Winder, Mun. Robert Stewart, Charles Hodges, Little and Bond, to consider and report thereon.

A petition from Thomas Poter, of Harford county, praying a law may pass authorizing the levy court of said county to levy a sum of money as a compensation to him for building a jail therein, was referred to Messrs. Street, Brown and Bond.

A petition from Gabriel J. Mattingly, of St. Mary's county, praying a law may pass confirming his title to a parcel of land conveyed to him by his wife, was referred to Messrs. Hebb, Chapman, William H. Brown, Fushy and Jackson.

Mr. Smoot delivered the following report:

The committee to whom was referred the petition of Thomas Jackson and Henry Haskins, of Dorchester county, report, that they have taken the same into consideration, and find, that on the 20th day of August, 1799, that the aforesaid Thomas Jackson and Henry Haskins did pass their bond to the state of Maryland for a lot of land, No. 6, supposed to contain two hundred and eleven and one quarter acres; and by the examination of the examiner-general of the certificate of survey, there are two and three quarters acres less than the quantity bonded for. Therefore, Resolved, That the treasurer of the Western Shore create the bond of Thomas Jackson and Henry Haskins with the net amount of four and three quarter acres of land, at ten dollars per acre, with interest from the date of said bond.

A petition from Richard G. Hardesty, of Prince George's county, praying a special act of insolvency, was referred to Messrs. Woodward, Hodges, Callis, Emeron and Sudler.

The bill authorizing a lottery for raising a sum of money for the use and benefit of the Charitable Marine Society of the city of Baltimore, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the Senate by the clerk.

A resolution relative to the appointment of a senator for the Eastern Shore, to supply the vacancy of R. W. L. Esq. who resigned, was read.

Mr. Jump, from the committee, delivers to the Speaker, a bill, entitled "An act to prevent the going at large of swine in the village of Hillsborough, in Caroline county, and for other purposes therein mentioned; which was read the first time, and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Sudler delivered a report on the petition of Stephen Yos, which was read.

Mr. Blake delivered a report on the petition of Edward Reynolds, which was read.

Messrs. Harryman and Davis have leave of absence.

The House of Delegates have appointed Messrs. Kerr, Pearce, Sudler, McInerney and Martin, and the Senate, Messrs. Partridge, Dorsey, Gibson and McElderry, to form a committee of both Houses to compare and examine all bills from time to time during this session, as soon as they shall severally be engrossed.

Adjourned till to-morrow morning.

SATURDAY, November 15.

Leave was given to bring in a bill entitled an act to establish a tribunal for the administration of justice in chancery cases on the Eastern Shore, and repeal such parts of the constitution and form of government as are incompatible therewith. Ordered, That Messrs. Smoot, Chapman, Dickinson, Denny and Winder, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

The bill for the benefit of William, Mary, Elizabeth, Levin and Britanica Murphy of Dorchester county, was read and sent to the senate by the clerk.

Ordered, That the mode of receiving messages from the senate as now practised, be discontinued, and that in future it shall not be necessary to announce a message from that branch of the legislature, when brought by the clerk, and the question put will the house now give the same a second reading.

Resolved in the affirmative, and carried. Mr. Anquith delivered a bill, entitled, "an act to incorporate the STOCKHOLDERS in the MECHANIC'S BANK OF BALTIMORE," which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill authorizing the securities of Samuel Condon, late sheriff of Cecil county, to complete the collections of said sheriff, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

A petition from Francis Fairbrother of Anne-Arundel county, stating that he had been wounded in the army, and praying some assistance from the state, was referred to Messrs. Williams, Belt, Gale, Winder and Stewart.

Mr. H. Brown delivered a bill, entitled an additional supplement to the act entitled "an act to ascertain allowance to jurymen and witnesses of the general court, and the several county and orphans' courts in this state, which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill authorizing a lottery to raise a sum of money for the purpose of building a mill in Worcester county, was

read the second time, and the question put, shall the said bill pass.

Resolved in the affirmative, which was sent by the clerk to the senate.

On the second reading of the supplement to the act "entitled, an act for the amendment of the law in certain cases." The question was put, that the title thereof be stricken out, resolved in the affirmative. On motion, the question was then put, that the words "an act authorizing the justices of the Orphans Courts to take sheriffs bonds" be inserted in lieu of the words stricken out. Resolved in the affirmative.

On progression, the question was put, that the words "and the bond when taken shall be lodged with the clerk of the county court of the county in which the same may have been taken and shall by him be recorded among the records of the county, and upon such bond, or any office copy thereof, suit or suits may be instituted against the obligor or obligors" be added to the said bill. Resolved in the affirmative.

The bill being read throughout, the question was put, shall the said bill pass. Resolved in the affirmative.

A petition from Sophia Davis, of Worcester county, praying that Sulannah Davis her mother, may be supported out of the poor house, was referred to Messrs. Sturgis, Keene and White.

The clerk of the senate delivered a message on the establishment of county schools; which was read.

A petition from Anthony Fox of Anne-Arundel county, praying to be placed on the pension list, was referred to Messrs. Williams, Belt, Gale, Dickinson and Winder to consider and report thereon.

Adjourned until Monday morning 9 o'clock.

DISTURBANCES IN HAYTI.

A letter from Alexandria, dated on Thursday, last, states, that information had been received of a change having taken place in the government of Hayti.

The particulars which led to this revolution in the Black empire, are not stated. As far as we can learn, it appears, that Fort Dauphin, not being in a great state of preparation, was attacked by a party of Spaniards who took possession of the place, and put the inhabitants to death. Intelligence of this event had reached the ears of Christophe, Duval's principal general. He immediately dispatched a messenger with the news to the Emperor, and followed himself with all possible expedition. On arriving at the palace, Christophe was indignantly rebuffed an audience with the Emperor. In this dilemma, he determined, with the counsel of the Emperor, to march to the relief of Fort Dauphin. He had hardly reached this place when he was overtaken by Dessalines, when a scene of great rage and violence ensued.

Two Generals, La Braave and Capace, were instantly ordered to be shot. In the confusion which followed, Dessalines received a deadly blow, from whose hand is not understood. Christophe, it is added, was declared Emperor.

The Alexandria papers of Friday and Saturday are silent on the above subject, a circumstance which considerably diminishes the credibility of the report. We are informed, that both Capace and Braave, were the distinguished favorites of Dessalines, and had received of him every mark of distinction and confidence. It is therefore probable, if the report be true, that they were sacrificed in one of the moments of savage ferocity to which this inexorable tyrant was liable.

Latest from the Westward. A Naches paper of the 14th ult. received by Tuesday's mail says:

"The detachment of troops from this territory, destined to Natchitoches, all except Farrar's company of dragoons are on their return: having received orders from Gen. Wilkinson to that effect; the Spanish troops having all retired beyond the Sabine."

Extract of a letter from an officer, dated Natchitoches, October 5, 1865.

"Immediately after General Wilkinson's arrival here, Col. Cushing, Chief of the Frontier of Texas at Natchitoches. The Col. returned on the 2d instant, and the greater part of the militia which had arrived are now discharged. Yet every kind of preparation is making for a movement, and it is said the regular troops will march towards the Sabine in four or five days. Harass with the Spanish force has recrossed the Sabine, and taken post at the lowest ford on the route to Natchitoches. It is affirmed and believed that the Spanish commander has positive orders to defend the ground to the Arroyo Junda, seven miles from this place, and from all his measures and movements, it would appear that Gen. Wilkinson is as determined, to assert our jurisdiction to the left bank of the Sabine. We may therefore look for a conflict in which our general appears assured of triumph with his regular troops and Farrar's dragoons, or he would not have sent home the militia; & thus he spares the public treasure, and spares the bodies of his countrymen, leaving the unprincipled bander and political miscreants, who envy what they cannot emulate, to exult in the tanned cheeks of their infamous devices to black his character.

FOR THE AMERICAN.

I have observed a petition in circulation, for the division of Baltimore county, (I presume, from the city.) This petition, I apprehend, has been set on foot by gentlemen who are better versed in propositions than calculations; and who, under the warm influence of self-interest, have precipitately taken the interest of Baltimore county by the wrong end. I have no idea of the calculations made, nor do I conceive how the result could prove advantageous to the general weal. The partial idea of some, I suppose, is, that the court-house would be at or near Reisterstown. I would therefore ask, who within eight or ten miles of Baltimore, would like to be dragged to that village to court? Baltimore is a place of that commercial nature, that all who have sense enough to be a jurymen, or credit enough to be a witness, can always arrange their business so as to verify the old proverb, and kill two birds with one stone. However, if nothing else but a new county would satisfy new-minded people, I conceive, that if the north end of Baltimore and the eastern end of Frederick (both being long counties) were left out and made into a separate county, it would add much more to the general convenience, and ease Westminster the county town; for certain it is, that those people have a long way to go to court, as Westminster is 35 miles from Baltimore, and the same distance from Fredericktown. I do not pretend to say, how far either of those measures ought to meet the general approbation, at present; but I am clearly of opinion, that whenever a change of that kind must take place, the latter would tend much more to the general convenience of all parties; and I trust that the members both of Baltimore and Frederick counties, after viewing the great distance people have to go to their courts from the extreme parts of those counties, will agree with me in opinion.

"THE DILEMMA" REVERSED.

"The treaty between the United States and Great Britain signed at London on the 19th Nov. 1794 provides" Article 18, That the articles shall be permanent and the subsequent articles except the 12th shall be limited in duration to twelve years, to be computed from the day on which the ratification of this treaty shall be exchanged; but SUBJECT TO THIS CONDITION—That whereas the said twelfth article will expire by the limitations therein contained at the end of two years from the signing the preliminary articles of peace which shall terminate the [then] present war in which his majesty is engaged, it is agreed that proper measures shall be taken by bringing the subject matter of that article into amicable treaty and discussion so early before the expiration of the said term as that new arrangements on that head may be perfected, and ready to take place. If it should unfortunately happen that his majesty and the United States should not be able to agree on such new arrangements, in that case the articles of this treaty except the first ten shall then cease and expire together. Now—The article relating to a non importation is not among the first ten. No new arrangements have been made which operate a continuance of the treaty. The force—There is no existing article contravening the law passed the 18th April, 1866, prohibiting the importation of certain articles from Great Britain and her territories.

We can state from good information, says a New-York paper, that the trade which the British government has granted licenses for with the Haytiens, does not permit it to extend to any intercourse with the British colonies, but only as

carriers from Hayti to the continent of Europe, after the produce is bonded in Great-Britain.

A statistical account, published at Stockholm, states the population of Sweden, not including Pomerania, to have amounted, in 1801, to three millions, one hundred and thirteen persons. In this enumeration, there were 12,068 persons of noble birth, 16,434 ecclesiastics, 1,275 merchants, 17,233 shop-keepers, 2,605 manufacturers, 87,934 handicraftsmen, 16,652 sailors, 2,12,998 peasants, 7,26 students, 154,734 military troops of every kind. The population of Stockholm amounted at the same period to 73,497 inhabitants. [Fuldaia.] About half that of the United States, at the present moment.

The ship Barker, 20 days from Barbados, arrived at Holmes Hole on the 8th inst. The schooner Packy, of Hilo, well was driven ashore at Barbouces, in a violent gale on the night of the 6th October, and with her cargo of rum and molasses, totally lost. Every vessel in the bay expected every moment to share the same fate; several parted their cables, but were prevented going ashore by a breeze from the land.

The ship New Guide, captain Hall, in 22 days from Liverpool, was below last evening when this paper was put to press. The passengers came up in the pilot boat Thorne, but brought no newspapers or letters. They inform us that she sailed on the 28th of September, and was on board London papers to the 26th. We shall probably receive these papers in the course of this morning. In the meanwhile we can assure the readers of the Mercantile Advertiser that no political movement of consequence had taken place since the date of our former advice. The death of Mr. Fox has occasioned some new arrangements in the British ministry: Lord Howick succeeds that illustrious statesman as minister for foreign affairs; and Mr. Thomas Grenville fills the office of First Lord of the Admiralty, resigned vacant by his lordship's promotion. No other changes have come to our knowledge.

Of Lord Lauderdale the London papers cannot afford us any information: we know he was in Paris on the 25th of September. But the passengers in the New Guide mention that a sailing opinion in England has been given, not the result of information.

FIRE—Last evening about 6 o'clock a fire broke out at Brooklyn, near the Ferry in Mr. Suydam's stable, in the rear of the main street, which communicated to two or three other stables and three or four dwelling houses, all of which were consumed before the fire was got under. We were not able to learn who were the sufferers, or what amount of damage was done.

A gale of wind from the south-east, one of the most severe that has been experienced for several years, commenced here early on Saturday morning, accompanied with rain, and continued with very little intermission throughout the day. We are apprehensive that considerable damage has been done along the coast, though no particulars have yet come to our knowledge. The ship New-Guide, H H, from Liverpool came to anchor within the Bay on Saturday morning where she dragged her anchors and was obliged to make a harbor in the Cove, back of the Hook.

On Saturday last, the Circuit Court of the U. States for this district, held in pursuance of Washington and Peters, rose after a session of five weeks. During this a most important civil and criminal business has been dispatched, and the court before it rose went completely through the docket, not leaving the smallest motion which was brought before it unacted upon.

We still remain in the greatest uncertainty respecting the intended operations of Europe, and the final success of the negotiation at Paris.—Attention is particularly directed towards Prussia, and the many conjectures have at length operated some expectations of some new measures among the northern powers. As the situation of Prussia has been singular, and its present policy very different from that which marked the origin of its power, it has occasioned many reflections which have differed as politicians have estimated the power of France, and the balance of power in Europe. The reputation of Prussia still is confessed, and its measures may still be considered as important in Europe. A late English writer upon the relative state of Great-Britain and France, upon the death of Mr. Pitt, has given the following view of Prussia: "A prodigious military force, finances well administered, a treasury overflowing, garrisons and fortifications in the highest order, a sovereign beloved by his people, a cabinet cautious and politic, circumspect and vigilant, all the advantages are indisputably to be conceded to Prussia."
