On arriving at the palace, Christophe was indignacily retuled an audience with the Emperor. La this dilemina, he determined, with at the countel of the Emperor, to march to the relief of Fort Dauphin. He had nardry reached this place when he was overtaken by Dellalines, when a teene of great rage and violence enfuca.
