yet been given that measures with France are changed. The events consequent upon the refusal of the French treaty in Russia are not yet reported, and the previous state of the Empire was not accommodated for speedy hostilities. We have very confused accounts from Austria. The only circumstance deserving to be noticed, is that a diet was soon to be held in Hungary. The new relations of Austria, and the encreasing importance of Hungary to this part of Germany, must render this diet of great politicard consequence. Upon a comparison of the different accounts from France and England, we are satisfied that the French have had serious troubles from the country of Calabria, in Italy. It seems confessed that the discontents were indeed general, and that with the utmost difficulty could the French maintain themselves in the country, till the late approach of the French army under Massena. The events of past history will give us some great lessons respecting the changes which have been wrought in the fare of the French arms in Italy, by singular means. (Salem Reg.

The great need the Spaniards have of their troops in South America, or liges a belief that they will not make their line of defence much Linger. And that if they can keep where they now are, they will not attempt to advance upon territory claimed by the United States. But it is apparent that notimed measures do obtain in Louisiane.
