**Latest Foreign Intelligence.**  
Received via New York.  
London, September 22.  
Lyell, the messenger, embarked yesterday  
morning at Deal, for Calais, with dispatches  
in answer to those brought by the French  
funds, which were very flat yesterday morning;  
at the opening, it fell towards the close of the  
day, upon the report that Hullo had arrived  
with further dispatches from Lord Lauderdale.  
The rumor is untrue—no messenger has arrived  
since Smith's. It is reported that Lyell has en-  
tered out orders for the return of Lord Lau-  
derdale.

The expedition had not failed from Plymouth  
on Tuesday evening, though the wind was not  
so unfavorable as had been reported. It was reported  
at Plymouth, that it was to wait for the Atlas  
and the transports from Portsmouth, and then  
fall all together. It is utterly impossible for us  
to find an excuse for the delay, which has taken  
place in these expeditions to sea.

**Arrest of captain Whilly.**  
Capt. Whilly of the Leander, has returned  
from the American Station, under arrest, in that  
ship; and a court-martial is to be held to deter-  
mine upon him, for being upon the American  
station, which made it necessary, by these  
means, the truth of these proceedings, which  
have given to much uneasiness to both countries,  
will be indubitably destroyed.

It is said that the delay of the fleet has been  
recalled from the government of the land. His  
grace was sent at the special desire of Mr.  
Pope; and his recall is another instance of the  
declining interest of the Government.  
We are extremely happy to announce the safe  
arrival of the valuable French fleet. The  
Droits has been arrived at Plymouth last  
night, with an amount of their late arrival in  
the Channel, making a total of 32,000 men  
and two frigates, and a number of upwards of 300  
sail.

A vessel arrived on Sunday at Greenock from  
Lisbon, where she left the 1st of August, with  
the fall of the low and a gale. Her loading  
was being done at a wharf near Bellin Castle.  
It is not true that she had drawn out the Portu-  
guese men of war, and was flying them; one  
Portuguese ship of the line, however, had fallen  
for Algiers.

At length, after many delays, and orders  
and counter orders, the expedition for Sicily  
has sailed. It sailed on Wednesday, in 42  
transport ships, under the command of vice-admiral  
Duckworth, in the Royal George, and at 3 1/2  
P.M. was between the Iron Head and the Dud-  
man, with a fair wind, and in the evening, and  
was expected to be clear of the Channel to-  
morrow morning. The transports with the 25th,  
28th, and 35th regiments, consisting of 5000  
British troops, and several hundred French troops,  
where, it is said, to be used to reconquer the

The Atlas will sail with them as soon as they ar-  
rive.  
Ten fall of transports, which fell from  
the side of White on Sunday last, put back to  
Portsmouth yesterday, having been recalled.  
The town was inundated yesterday with rum-  
ors. It was said that a messenger had ar-  
rived from Paris with the intelligence of the  
surrender between France and Prussia having  
been adjourned. It was said too that the dif-  
ference between this country and Prussia had  
also been settled; and it was inferred that Lord  
Lauderdale's negotiation would terminate fa-  
vorably. As a proof that government were of  
that opinion, it was alleged that a telegraphic  
order had been sent to the expedition.  
The telegraph had been sent upon the funds.

No messenger has arrived from Paris since  
Mr. Smith, and we have already seen what  
credit is due to the rumor of the falling of the  
expedition having been commended. It is  
now doubted whether Bonaparte had left Paris.  
The messenger, Mr. Smith, is said to have  
brought the intelligence, that Bonaparte, we know,  
was expected at the Hague last Wednesday.

It was again reported yesterday, at the  
close of the market at the Stock Exchange,  
that a messenger had arrived from Paris with  
intelligence that the difference between France  
and Prussia had been adjourned. It was also  
reported that a telegraphic order had been sent  
to reconquer the falling of the expedition.  
These rumors had the effect they were intended  
to produce, that of raising the funds a little, as  
on Wednesday; but it is certain that no messenger  
had arrived.

**DEAL, September 24.**  
A messenger arrived here from London in a post  
chaise and four, and embarked immediately  
on board the Spectator, for Calais or  
London, whichever port he could find most  
convenient. The object of his mission is variously  
accounted for, but it is generally believed here,  
that this courier is the bearer of the orders for  
the return of Lord Lauderdale.
