Nelson, Esquire, was elected for the fourth district; Zicholas Proxton Moore, and William M'Creery, Esquires, were elected for the fifth district; John Mongomery, Esquire, was elected for the sixth district; Edward Lloyd, Esquire, was elected for the seventh district, and Charies Goldsberough, Esquire, was elected for the eighth district. under the seal of the state of Maryland, this twenty-fifth day of October, in the year of our Lord one theusand eight hundred and six.
