illustrate our remark:

not expressly contradicted. A sew words will

1. It is not true that "our ministers proposed

to furrender our claims," even in the seuse intended by Decius. Granting that " their ultimate payment was to be affumed by the United States," it was not therefore " fairly equivalent to a l'urrender of them." Will Decius pretend that our claim upon the French government No. 56, Cumberland Row. was "relinquished," by the convention of 1803. although it assumed the payment of 20 millions of francs by the government of the United States? The arrangement in both cases would have ben precifely the same. The value of Louisiana was estimated at 60 millions of francs, of which 11,250,000 dollars only were to be paid to the French republic; the remaining 20 millions of francs being referved to the American claimants. In the fame manner, the value of the Floridas would have been estimated at fome particular fum, from which would have been dedusted the amount of American claims; and the balance would have been paid in money or in flock to Spain. In both cales, the amount of American claims would have been deducted from the price of the purchase. In both, "The claimant." would have been more conveniently provided for;" for they would have looked to their own treasury for payment, instead of the coffers of Spain: Our own government would have advanced the amount of the claim, but would have received re-payment in the value of the land.

> 2. Decius has strangely confounded his own 'inferences with facts; and mere probabilities with positive affertions. In his nirft number, he afferts that " our minitie's had propoted to establish the Colorado as the wellern boundary of Louisiana." In his last, he enquires whether it is " not probable? from certain circumstances, that they had made fuch a propolition. Now what are those circumitances? "In their correspondence with the Spanish ministry, our minitlers" may more " flated, that ther had exceeded their inffrugions" But Dezius may have miranderstood the words of our ministers. Decius may have mite instrued that my sterious language and even there bargaining expedients of policy which are so common in diplomatic concerns. Decius has f egotton to state the e nditions, which we required on the part of Spain, and in the le conditions may be found an explanation of the difference which exists in our statements. Our ministers may bare as much exceeded their infliructions by p oponing to establish the Colo ado as the western boundary. without tripulating the conditions on which that concession was to have been made, as if they had proposed it without receiving the smallest infirmments.

It is true, that such a proposition would not have exceeded the infirmations of our ministers, if the, have taken care to accompany it with the proper conditions. Our ministers " were authorifed to relinquith so much to the Westward as they could obtain to the Lastward of the Mistisippi." and thu, successive facrifices were the first day of December next, at nine o'clock | marked out, of which even the Colorado was not to be the last - Had then our ministers advanced any other propositions then these, they would have certainly overlooked their inffructions; but what other reasons have we for such a belief, than the ipre dixit of Decius? It is true that Decins " has no where posi-

tirely asserted" that the Louiliana treaty was arrenated; and yet Decius had afferted his behef, that such was the fact. - But Declus merely suggests, that " the treaty was signed, subsequents le to the date expressed on the face of it." The suggestion is equally probable, that the date expreffed upon the tace of it, was the very same as the day of signify it. But this is not the true point at issue. Decius suggested, that the Louiliana treaty was an elaced, for the purpofe of "obviating" the objections, which the Britith ministry might please to make to it. Grantin then that the present explanation of Decius is correct; that a few days did intervene between the making and the figning of the convention; it does not therefore follow that this thort interval of a few days was intended to provide against any apparent breach of neurality. The true reason was to allow time enough to transcribe the onvention in that splendid manner, which diffinguithes all Bonaparie's treatics. It was a mele matter of form; and no diplomatic trick to evade a fancied breach of neutrality. I ut this last was the sense, in which Decius expressed and intended it., How far it was proper to advance such an infinuation against his government, upon such desicient'eyidence as he seemingly posselles, it is lest to his ingenuity to determine.

3d and 4th. We agree with Decius, that " the mediages" may be left to "fpeak for themselves." It he public message led the nation to breathe a spirited language, it was not because they believed a war with Spain was necessary, but because they wished to manifest to her that we would not, if necessary, decline in If the private message did not excite the same sentiments among the people, it was only because it was not laid before them.':

5. Is Decius correct in afferting, that " seeceral of the test informed members, who had voted for the majority, declared that Mr. Monroe's dispatches" had produced such an "important effect" upon their minds ? Decius seems not very scrupulous in bringing the members of Congress into notice; why then does he hesitate to delignate the names of those new converts to his doctrine? Why was not this "important ested" manisested in the Senate, before whom thele dispatches were duly exhibited? It is impossible to believe, that Decius could have meant any thing more by the word "information" than facts; but what were the facts displayed in these dispatches? Does not Decius well know, that they contained nothing but " opinions?" Would even the opinions of Dr. Franklin under such eireumstances, have sufficed to controul the decisions of Congress ? Is it not a fact, that there is no "documented" communication between our ministers at Paris and London; and that the only channel lays be tween Paris and Washington; and Washington and London?

6th. "The veracity of Mr. Randolphis in no wife implicated' by our affertions. We know not what communications passed between Mr. Randolph and the Secretary of the Treasury .---But Decius has lest two other sacts of equal importance in equal obscurity. He has neither condescended to inform us, whether the "two members" of Congress obtained their information from the cautious Secretary of the Treatury a nor whether Mr. Randolph did " amicably confult the President on the truth of these vague insinuations." Had such a' communication existed, the thunders of Mr. R. could never bave
