On Monday the 6th inst. on the last day of the ssizes at Niagara, he took an opportuni ty, in an argument from the bar, to abuse in terms of very great invective, the memory of the late governor, and the characters of several of his most respected triends. This was passed lever by the

N'r. Dickson, also a counsellor at law, was engaged in the same cause with Mr. Weeks, and followed him in support of the question before the court Before concluding, however, he thought it his bounden duty, as a gentleman and a lawyer, to enter his strongest protest against such declamation, saying, "that he conceived it originated in perfonal malice and malevelence, and that were he a judge on the bench, he would not permit fuch language to pal's without censure. Extract of a letter from Londonderry to the Editor of the U. S Gazette.

18th Sept. 1806. " The revenue department here is all in bustle. Smuggling has arrived to such a pitch that the ship Eliza, of Baltimore, began to unload her tobacco, without waiting for our custom house forms, under the very muzzles of the suns of a government cutter. The revenue captain, with equal deliberation looked on for some tim, but as soon as the smugglers were fully loaded, he manned his two boats & seized the quantity of a few hogsneads, done up in parceis o. an hundred weight, and catled mats, for the convenience of carrying it off expenitionsly when landed. The ship had what is here termed " the broad R clapp'd upon her '-m other words she was seized in the name of the king, unloaded, and now lies waiting her trial.

One of your Philadelphia ships, has also got herself into a scrape. It seems, there was to and on board the Brothers, Bray, master, two small packages, presents from Mr. Gray of Philadelphia, to his father in this country. These were seized, broke open, and found to contain a few pounds of tes, and a set of china -both prohibited articles. This was represented to the board in Dublin, with the intavorable observation "that American ships of late nad been in the ha it of so doing. " No answer on this case has arrived the' near a fortnight has clapsed. In this state the ship lies, without making preparations for a return, and will, I tear, loose many passengers.
