> It has been intimated to us, in a confidential way, that during the last sojourn of Mr. Burr in this city, the interviews between him and Frujo were daily and prolonged to an unusual length-and that bags of gold on one occasion and of silver repeatedly were del vered to Mr. Burr. Our attention has been called to another circumstance also. For a considerable tine last winter there appeared in a daily paper in this city, an advertisement for fire arms of the Charleville calibre, or the same calibre as the United States arms.

We find, in the Landon popers just received, that the English government was fitting out an expedition against Vera Cruz. Could there be any connexion between the design of Mr. Buir, upon this place, and that of the English expedition?

There are two places of the name of Vera Cruz, (sld and new) the old Vera Cruz is the place where Cortez landed in 1518, and about 20 miles northward of the new, which is also a seaport,

both in the kingdom of Mexico, province of Tlascala; the latter is the place of most importance, it having been and continuing to be the entrepot of the Spanish commerce and the treature between new and old Spain. At Acapulco on the opposite shore of the Ishmus in the fouth sea, the memorable Golleons which pals from the Philippine islands to the Mexican coast, depofit their cargoes here, and exchange quickfilver, indigo, and bullion, for the spices of oriental Archipelago and the products of China; whence they are carried over land to Vera Cruz, and thence they are conveyed to Spain. This place was celebrated for its wealth in the time of the Buccaneers by whom it was repeatedly plundered. Its defence in a military view are teeble, and the force there is imall and ill disciplined. The harbor is a very fine one, the fortress of St. John D'Alva situated on a rocky illand is its principal but a very incompetent desence. This port is not quite 200 miles from the city of Mexico, from which it lies E. S. E. and about, 100 from the capital of the province of Tlatcala, which is called Pueblo delos anglos. At Vera Cruz there is held an annual fair, at the period of the arrival of the vellels from ol. Spain, which a creditable traveller represents as one of the moit splendid exhibitions of wealth that is to be feen in the universe: the sair continues several weeks.

Vera Cruz by a coalting route may be about 8 or 900 miles from the mouth of the Mitsilsippi. The craft constructing under the under the direction of Mr. Burr, are of the kind called periagua (vulgarly perty-augre und peerogue) to draw littie water, aud weil calculated for a coalling trip; there appears to be however two descriptions of these vessels which ply at Paulus Hook ferry, with powerful leeboards; but their length is considerably greater than the boats on the Hudson.

Some of them are fliarp keeled, with an elevated and peaked prow; also very long, and all capable of rowing 20 or 30 oars. Some of them conitructing on the Ohio thirty miles below l'ittlburgh, have a canvafs covering from the stern to the beam, sufficient to protect those within from the inclemency of the weather. The vessels are built of good materials and fit for severe service; and men of competency fay they are well calculated for the gulf of Mexico, which is skirted by a continued series oft and bank, within a few miles of the thore, upon which the furt breaks and deaves a tranquil navigation for light craft along the shore.

[Cur readers will recollect, that Lord Howick informed the Lord Mayor of London, that his Lordship was to leave Paris the 7th October.]-That it was reported at Rotterdam, that a conference was to take place between the Emperor Napoleon, the King of Prussia, and King Louis, of Holland, before hostilities were reserted to-[If this report be true, as we suspect it is, the issue of the conserence may be-predicted-Frederick II. will consent to cede Wellphalia, and the country of Marck to "brother Louis;" as an indemnification for the trouble the Emperor has been at ;the three Monarchs will then shake hands; -and Napoleon, and Talleyrand, will return to Paris, to ripen new projects of aggrandizement.-And all this may be, notwithstanding the late warlike appearances in Profia. - She has been in the practice of appearing in earnest when only in jest; while Bonapane is always in earnest, and despises boy's play.]-That the imperial and royal meeting was to be on the 8th October ; and that King Louis sat out sem the Hague. the 5th, probably to repair to the place of meeting.
