Upon the condemnation of the schooner Eclipse of Baltimore, in Kingston, Jamaica, the whole of the crew, confisting of twenty were pressed and put on board a frigate which was to fail on a cruize the following merning; this was done on a presumption that Mr. Lennox the American agent, could not claim them as American citizens, being engaged in an illegal trade.

Mr. Lennox, however, upon gaining intelligence of the above, made an immediate application and remonstrance to the admiral, who ordered the crew on board the guard ship for examination, when seventeen of the twent; being proved to be Americans were immediate delivered to him; of the remaining three, tw. were recognised as deserters from his majesty ship Fishguard, and the remaining one proved to be an Englishman: thus by the prompt and decisive conduct of Mr. Lennox, have seventeen American citizens been releafed trom British bondage, and restored to their country.
