REPORT.

In obedience to the directions of the act supplementary to the act, intituled " An act to establish the Treasury Department," the Secretary of the Treasury respectfully submits the following REPURT AND ESTIMATES:

REVENUE AND RECEIPTS.

The nett revenue ariting from duties on merchandile and temage which accrued Juning the year 1804, amounted after deducting that portion which arose from the additional cuties, constituting the Mediteranean fund to \$12,673,458

And that which accrued during the year 1805, amounted, after making a fimilar deduction, (as will appear by the statement (A) to

It is afcertained that the nett revenue which has accrued during the three first quarters of the year 1806, exceeds that of the corresponding quarters of the year 1805; and that branch of the revenue may, exclusively of the Mediterranean fund, be safely estimated for the present at thirteen millions of deliars.

The statement (1) exhibits in detail the several species of merchandize, and other sources, from which that revenue was collected, during the year 1805.

It appears by the statement (C) that the fales of the public lands, have, during the year ending on the 30th September, 1826, exceeded, 473.020 acres. The actual payments by purchasers have, during that period, amounted to 850,000 dollars, of which fum near 700,000 dollars have been paid in specie, and the residue in stock of the public debt. The specie receipts from that source may, after deducting charges and the nive per cent. referred for roads, be estimated for the enfuing year at five hundred thousand dollars.

The receipts ariting from the permanent revenue of the United States, may therefore, without including the arrears of direct tax and internal revenues, the duties on postage and other incidental branches, be computed for the year 1807, at thirteen millions and five hundred thouland dellars 13,500,000

And the payments into the Treatury, during the same year, on account of the temprintry duties, constituting the Mediterranean fund, are estimated at one million of

The balance in the Treatury amounted, on the 30th day of September, 1895, to dellar 4,538,664 a cents, and on the 30th day of September, 1806, to dollars 54,6,969 17 cent. PUBLIC DEBT.

THE annexed note of the preceedings of the commissioners of the Sinking Fund. marked (E) slews that a confiderable partion of the annual apprepriation of 8 minuous of dellar, was a plicable this year to the cliniburlement or purchases of the dimestic debt: No more that 17.51 deliars and Trecents, were obsered at market price, and accordingly purchased. And making the total of principal of the public debt, reimbursed from the 11t of April 1801, to the last of January 1806, more than 24.000,000 dollars.

During the same there have also been paid to G. Britain, in satisfaction and discharge of the money which the U. S. might have been liable to pay in pursuance of the provitions of the fixth article of the treaty of 1794, two millions fix hundred and fixty-four thousand dollars; and to the holders of bills drawn by the minister of the U.S. at Paris, an account of American claims assumed by the convention with France, a sum exceeding three millions and sifty thousand dotlars; neither of which fum is included in the preceding flatement of debt redeeme

As the only part of the puclic debt which the U.S. have a right to reimburle during the year 1807, confills of the annual reimburlement of the 6 per cent. & deferred Ricks, estimated at 1,540,707 dollars; and of the four and half per cent. stock, amounting to 173,000 dollars, it will not be practicable, unless purchases can be effected within the limitations prescribd by law, to apply during that year, the whole of the annual appropriation of eight millions of dollars. The unexpended balance, together with the appropriation of the year 1808, will enable the U. S. to reimburse, on the 1st of January, 1809, the whole of the eight per cent. stock which is irredeemable before that day.

But in order that Congress may have a clear view of the situation of the public debt, after the year 1808, and be enabled to decide on the propriety of making surther legislative provision for that object, it appears necessary to state diftinally: Ill The operations which will take place in relation to the debt during the year 1807 and 1803. 2d. The annual payments on account of the public debt, will, during the same period, amount, as has been alrealy stated, to 4,600,000 dollars. All the other expences of the United States, whether domestic or foreign, of a civil nature, or for the support the exiting military and naval establishments, do not at present exceed 3,500,000. dollars. The total annual expenditure, alloving four hundred thousand dollars a year for contingencies, may increme be estimated after the year 1808, at eight millions and a half; wuich deducted from a revenue of fourteen millions, will leave a net annual surplus of live millions and a half of dol'ats.

The qualti n now renares, whether a portion of that furplus would not be most advantageously employed in haltening the reduction of the debt? Whether some mode may not be devised to provide, within a short period, for the total and complete resimbatioment, and thereby release the public revenue from every incumbance? It is can only be effected by a modification of the debt affented to by the public creditors; and a convertion of the old fix per cent. deferred, and three per cent. stocks, on terms murually beneficial, into a common fix per cent. Mock, re teemable within a limit ditine, has appeared the most simple and eligible, if not the milt practicable planth tean be adopted. For its details, a reference is respectfully made to a letter written in January last, to the chairman of the committee of ways and means, a copy of which, marked (F) is annexed. It will only be necessary to state, that if such a plan should be sanctioned by Congrets, and accepted by the creditors, those feveral species of debt, nmounting on the 1st of January, 1809, to famething more than forty-fix millions of dolines, would be converted into a fix per cent. stock, amounting to less than forty midi ins of doll s; which the continued annual appropriation of eight millions of dollars, would (belides paying the interest on the Louisiana debt) reimbarle within a period of lefs than feven years, or before the end of the year 1815, as will appear by the table marked (11).

The total annual expenditure for those seven years, would then, allowing still 3.500,000 dollars for current expenses, and 400,000 dollars for contingencies, amount to fomething less than twelve millions of dollars; which, deducted from a revenue of fourteen millions of dollars, would fill leave, after the year 1808, a clear furplus of more than two millions of dollars, applicable to fuch new objects of general improvement or national defence, as the legislature might direct, and existing circumstances require. And after the year 1810, no other incumbrance would remain on the revenue, than the interest and reimbursement of the Louisiana Bock, the last payment of which in the year 1821, would complete the final extinguillment of the public debt.
