

From London papers to the 27th of October. The following was received by the Hamburg mail:

BERLIN, Oct. 14. Prince Louis of Prussia is no more; he died like a hero; he lost his life on the 11th, at the passage of the Orléans, by two bullets, aimed at the star of his order. His sword has been brought to the king, but his body is in the possession of the French. His brother, prince Augustus, has sent to demand it of them, but it is not known whether they will give it up. Prince Hohenlohe having sent him word to hold out as long as he could, he fought for 6 hours against more than 20,000 French, though he had but 6000 men. The Prussians lost 1500 men in this affair. The loss of the French, it is said, is more considerable. The soldiers are in despair at having lost their prince, and will fight with fury in the next action. It is believed there was a general engagement yesterday; if there was, it was doubtless a bloody one, for the Prussians are exasperated to the utmost.

Another letter... same date. The action in which prince Louis fell, took place between Rudolstadt and Saalfeld. He had orders to defend this bridge, but not to attack, as the prince of Hohenlohe intended to turn the enemy. Prince Louis did not wait, but made the attack. He received a musket-ball through his heart. Count Nostitz, one of his three adjutants, saw him ready to fall from his horse, and hastened to him, when he received a second ball, and immediately fell to the ground. He breathed with difficulty for about a minute, and then expired. Count Nostitz, alighted from his horse, and endeavored to defend the body, fighting like a hero, but was severely wounded, and is now at Weimar.

At the departure of the Estafete, which has arrived here from the army, a great battle was hourly expected.

The late prince Louis was the son of prince Augustus Ferdinand, the brother of Frederick the Great. He was born November 18, 1772, and was a lieutenant-general in the army.

BRUNSWICK, Oct. 14. Hostilities between France and Prussia began on the 10th and 11th, by an action which took place in the environs of Schleitz. Though the accounts we have received are contradictory, they agree, however, in stating that the Prussians, by the brisk attack of the enemy, at first lost some men, and their brave general, prince Louis; but afterwards, the corps of prince Hohenlohe gained a signal advantage over that of marshal Bernadotte. The French appear to have intended to penetrate through the Prussian army, and divide it.

LONDON, Oct. 24. We have seen a letter from an officer on board the Pompee, dated Messina, 13th September, which enables us to state, that the reports that scribbled to the British arms another victory over the French in Calabria, on the 26 August, are erroneous. It appears, that to the 14th September no fresh debarkation of our troops had been effected on the Continent. Our correspondent mentions that an expedition was then preparing at Messina, and that some of the corps were on ship-board; but adds, that the object in view was rather to alarm the coast, and embarrass the enemy, than to effect a permanent footing in the country. We are in the belief that at the date of this letter, there were not any British troops in Calabria; and that, so far from the Calabrese having obtained a decisive victory over the French, they are not in a condition to take the field as an army; in small, unconnected corps, they may distress the enemy, interrupt his supplies, and cut off any weak parties that may venture from the main body, but we are not warranted in anticipating, from their operations, any result of more importance.

VIRGINIA LEGISLATURE.
The House of Delegates have been engaged during the two last days, upon two subjects of some importance. The one the Kentucky amendment to the federal constitution. The other a resolution, concerning the administration of the U. States.

On the first question the House of Delegates, have not yet come to any decision.

The second question produced much discussion and some warmth. We shall at present submit no more than the general results before our readers; referring a more expanded notice of this debate for a subsequent paper.

On Friday, the 12th instant, J. H. Blake, laid the following resolution before the house: Resolved, That the General Assembly of Virginia have an entire confidence in no wife diminished, but increased, in the patriotism of the views and wisdom of the conduct of the President of the United States—and that the present administration merits and ought to receive the most cordial support of this assembly.

A motion being made and carried, the preceding resolution was referred to a select committee, consisting of Messrs. Baker, Brooke, Nelson, Prunty, Smyth, (of Wythe) Semple, C. B. Harrison, Miller, (of Powhatan) Blake, Love, R. bertson, B. Harrison, and McHenry, (of Washington).

On Thursday last, Mr. Baker chairman of the committee, presented the following substitute to the original resolution.

Resolved, That the General Assembly have the highest confidence in the wisdom, frankness and patriotism of the President of the United States.

A motion was made by Mr. Kinney to postpone this resolution to the 31st of March; which motion was supported by Messrs. Kinney, Archer, Murdaugh and Strother; and opposed by Messrs. Smith (of King & Queen) Baker, I. outlee (of Henrico) and Robertson.

The question of postponement was lost, Ayes 25, Nays 131. When the question recurring upon the report of the committee it was carried, Ayes 138, Nays 19.

Yesterday Mr. Robertson offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Legislature of Virginia continue to view with the highest approbation, the firm, just and liberal policy, which characterizes the conduct of the Government of the U. S. towards foreign nations.

A motion was made to postpone this resolution, till the 31st of March; which was supported by Messrs. Miller (Powhatan) and Kinney; and opposed by Messrs. Baker, Robertson, Singleton, Smith (King and Queen) and Foulche (Henrico). This motion being lost; Ayes 30, Nays 126, the question recurring upon the original resolution. Messrs. Nelson and Lindlay having delivered their respective sentiments, the question was put and carried, Ayes 122—Nays 35.

On yesterday too, the Legislature proceeded by joint ballot to the election of a Brigadier-General to supply the vacancy occasioned in the 13th brigade, by the death of General John Lower; the ball was found to be:

For Andrew Moore, Esq. 124
Col. J. reckenridge, 52
Scattered 9.

Of course Mr. Moore (at present in the Senate of the United States from this state) was elected.

We have the pleasure to state that the several uniformed volunteer corps composing the republican Militia legion, cavalry, artillery, light infantry, and light infantry corps, have unanimously tendered their services to the President of the United States, to be employed on any service which may be required for the maintenance of the liberties of the United States, the integrity of its territory, the repelling of invasion from abroad, and the suppression of treason at home, or for bringing to condign punishment in support of the union, conspirators or traitors.

A Duel took place yesterday (Dec. 15) near this town, between Mr. Alexander S. Hoop and Dr. James H. Blake, both of the House of Delegates. We hear that Dr. B. was wounded in the neck, but the wound is not considered as dangerous.

The following resolution was reported and adopted in the house of assembly of Jamaica, on the 22d of October last:

That it be recommended to the house to appoint a select committee to enquire into the proceedings which have lately taken place in the parliament of the united kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, for an abolition of the slave trade; and if on such an enquiry, it shall appear expedient, that the committee do prepare an humble representation and petition to our most gracious sovereign, setting forth the inevitable calamities which will be brought upon this country by cutting off or abridging the supply of laborers, on the faith of which this island has been settled; and praying his majesty's paternal interposition to maintain and protect, by his royal power and authority, his faithful subjects, the inhabitants of this colony, in the enjoyment of their established birth rights, as held and transmitted to them by their ancestors.
