A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS it has been stated to me by the petition of a number of respectable persons, inhabitants of Prince-George's county, that a murder has been committed on the person of CHARLES NEVITT, junior, late of Prince-George's county, by a certain negro man, slave of Esail Soper, called WALL, who has since absconded and fled from justice: And whereas it is the duty of the executive to guard as much as may be against the commission of such enormities, and to bring such offenders against the laws and peace of society to justice, I have therefore thought proper to issue this proclamation, and do, by and with the advice and consent of the council, offer a reward of ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS to any person or persons who shall apprehend and secure the said negro WALL in any goal in the United States, so that he be brought to justice.
