Wilkinson produced a memorial, which he read to the said convention as handed to him, sheet by sheet, by judge Sebastian—and that the said memorial never was read, or handed into the clerk's table of the said convention.

Your committee further report as their opinion, that whilst judge Sebastian was in the exercise of his office in this state, and drawing his annual salary therefrom, he was employed in carrying on with the agents of the Spanish government, an illicit, unjustifiable, and highly criminal intercourse, subversive of every duty he owed to the constituted authority of our country, and highly derogatory to the character of Kentucky.

And the same being read, was unanimously agreed to.

The great interest which the public mind takes in the incidents of Burr's conspiracy has frequently induced us to publish various extracts and abstracts of letters from the Western country, which often bore a suspicious appearance, and frequently seemed more the offspring of personal hatred and individual malice, than to have been dictated by the spirit of truth. In several of these letters, men high in the confidence of the nation have been accused of being connected with Burr, and assisting him in his disorganizing schemes. Among others, Gen. Wilkinson and Daniel Clarke, Esq. have been repeatedly mentioned. An article respecting their connection with Burr was copied into yesterday's American from the Aurora, preceded by an introductory remark, that public opinion ought to be suspended until authentic information comes to hand. It would give us pain to wound the feelings or injure the reputation of innocent men; and therefore we take leave to say that the article from the Aurora, respecting Messrs. Wilkinson and Clarke, and headed "facts" by the Editor of the Aurora,

are not facts within our knowledge; and as such we did not reprint them; but published them more to shew the current reports of the day than to stigmatize men who, for aught we know, are as pure and undefiled of conspiracy or treason as their accusers.

We fear, indeed, that there are persons wicked enough to seize the opportunity afforded by Burr's machinations, to ruin their political and personal antagonists;—that there are those who write letters and circulate reports, implicating innocent men in the schemes of Burr in order to destroy them. It is needless to say how atrociously diabolical such conduct is. Those who pursue it deserve as severe condemnation as the men who are really engaged in the conspiracy. For ourselves we can say, that we have been, in all our publications, only actuated by a sincere love of country and a strong desire to preserve the integrity of the Union—and to our readers we must again remark in our language of yesterday— "the public ought to suspend their opinion until AUTHENTIC information comes to hand."
