Extract of a letter, dated Washington, January 19, 1867.

Young Swartout is on his way to Baltimore under guard, and Doctor Bollman has arrived under the care of Lieut. Wilson, at Charleston. Swartout delivered to General Wilkinson, the original letter from Burr, disclosing his plan, and Bollman presented him on his arrival at New Orleans, with the copy thereof; those two gentlemen were the principal agents; they have completely and fully disclosed the names of the principal conspirators now at large at Orleans, and who cannot be touched. The traitors are every where; one (known) has been here two days, and has returned to New York. Why is this? Because the Habeas Corpus act is not suspended.

Liberty of the Press.—Men well acquainted with this term, have explained it (and they say their explanation is true) to mean the freedom of issuing works, at pleasure, from the press, in truth and decency, without being compelled first to obtain permission from a Censor.

But modern ricklers for this liberty carry their ideas a little further.—

One printer attacks the government, abuses the chief magistrate, decries republicanism—and calls that the liberty of the press.

Another denounces every man who differs from him in politics—calling them Jacobins, fools, &c.—and terms that the liberty of the press.

A third reviles the mercantile part of the community—endeavoring to persuade farmers and mechanics that commerce is destructive of their interests; thus striving to divide the community into discordant parts—and declares that the liberty of the press.

A fourth suspects a man of treason, and avows his suspicion to be true—asserting that to be the very essence of the liberty of the press.

A fifth endeavors to intimidate the administration by doleful prognostications of the invasion of the country by Bonaparte, and attempts to frighten unwarlike persons by prophesying ruin, speedy and certain, to the country—calling that the liberty of the press.

A sixth blusters at the British, making deadly (wordy) war upon them at all seasons and without intermission—even whilst a treaty is negotiating—terming that the liberty of the press.

Whilst others pursue a course at once mendacious and intolerant—writing down characters as sportsmen hunt foxes—for amusement—and swear that, above all, is the true liberty of the press.

But who is there that believes these doctrines? Who is there that does not see that the press ought to be governed by the same rules of honor as the tongue? That no gentleman should utter through the medium of the press expressions derogatory to the character of another, that he would not dare to say to his face?

The liberty and licentiousness of the press are as different as the antipodes are distant. The one allows of free and rational enquiry and discussion of all subjects interesting to the human species—the other assumes the privilege of blackguarding private character—of sowing dissensions among individuals of the same society—of accusing public men, in the most frantic manner, of crimes of the deepest dye. If, in the exercise of this latter privilege a printer gets his head broke or is prosecuted, he roars out that the liberty of the press is invaded!

Was not Benjamin Franklin corrected, when he observed that the licentiousness of the press ought always to be accompanied by the liberty of the cudgel?

"See Worlds on Worlds compose one Universe!"

"We have received the first number of the 'Atlantic World,' a new paper, published by John Wood, at the City of Washington. He has commenced an attack upon Gen. Wilkinson, and protests most manfully in favor of the innocence of Col. Burr. This seems to corroborate the suggestion which appeared in our paper a few days ago, touching Burr's attempts on the fidelity of the commander in chief of the American army, which stated that there was reason to believe Burr influenced Wood's attack on Gen. Wilkinson, in order to favor him, and render him ripe for treason. Shortly after Gen. Eaton's explicit disclosure of Burr's propositions to him, and the various other facts disclosed relative to the conspiracy, it is impossible not to believe Burr's guilt. What

daring effrontery must this Wood, then, have to perch himself under the very nose of the national executive and legislature, and dare to defend a man who is universally believed to be engaged in a treasonable conspiracy? Wood promises to disclose all the information he possesses on the subject; and which is the ground of his defence of Burr. Let us once see his *Expose*, and then we can judge of his correctness.

Query.—Has Wood been sent to Washington by Col. Burr to defend him? Such a procedure would not be out of character for Cataline II.

The editor of the "Western World" says that Judge Innes gave in his testimony to the committee of inquiry appointed on Sebastian's case, at two different times—first, in the forenoon—and then in the afternoon: That it was at the last time of giving testimony that he unfolded the concern which he had in the correspondence with the Spaniards. Mr. Street adds that Judge Innes *cried* when he made his confessions.

Egyptian Barley.—Mr. Snowler, of Reevesby, in Lincolnshire, England, three years ago, planted 25 grains of Egyptian barley; the second year's produce was 10 bushel from which, last year, he reaped 40 quarters, a part of which, he lately sold at Spilsby for five guineas per quarter.

A machine has been constructed by an ingenious farmer at Newry in Cunnigham (Ireland) which with the assistance of a horse & two men, will in seven hours thresh upwards of 1500 stooks of barley or wheat, and stooks of straw in a day. The expense of the apparatus does not amount to more than six guineas.

The *Marine* at Portland, was forcibly entered in the night between Saturday and Sunday last, and two thousand dollars, in gold and silver stolen from thence. 500 dollars reward is offered by the President of said Bank, for the detection of the thief or thieves, and the security of the money.

New-Orleans, Nov. 17.

The Captain of the above brig states that the report which was in circulation in this city a few days since, that he had fired at the U. States' Ketch *Atna*, when on her voyage to this port, is entirely without foundation. On the contrary, he declares that he was brought to by the commander of the *Atna*, and treated politely.

Nov. 18.—The ship *Lewis William*, Capt. Brien, which arrived at this port on Saturday last, from Haanburgh, brought upwards of 100 passengers—the most of these are mechanics—cabinet-makers, shoemakers, tailors, blacksmiths, bricklayers, &c. &c.

On Wednesday last, Major MOSES PORTER arrived in this city with upwards of 40 artificers, from the garrison of Nachitoches, who are at present engaged in fortifying and repairing the forts and breast works for the reception of the troops—800 of which are expected here in the course of the present week.

Lieut. KONEY who left this place a short time since, with two companies of infantry, returned with them here on Friday evening last.—They lay only five days at the fort of Nachitoches, when they received orders to return.

The boat of the Argonaut was ordered along side of the cutter, with the brig's papers—on her return, the boat filled and sunk, and it was with difficulty the people in her were saved. Captain Folger, then boarded the cutter, said he was in distress for provisions, but they answered that they had no food, and stood off. The treatment which captain F. received, he states as inhuman and abusive.

The brig Georgia, Jocelin, 8 days from Savannah, sailed in co. ship Martha Washington, of Gloucester, for London. Left brig Amazon, Copp, 12 days from New York, ready to take in.
