

"Cottons are considerably affected by the political state of things. The sales in last month amount to about 7000 bags, whilst the import exceeds 18000 bags. The reluctance of buyers at present to take any quantity of consequence, thus occasions the stock to accumulate here;—but it is well known that the flock is trudging in the hands of the dealers and spinners. The flock is heavy at the Demerara, Lisbon and Sea Islands, and pretty ample in Upplands, with some New Orleans. The last week has been very dull, and prices have continued going rather lower, but it is not expected that there will be further material decline, and if this idea becomes established, buyers will probably come forward more freely. It seems as if the aggregate import of 1850 will prove somewhat short of last year.

"Our stocks have been well supplied with country and Irish wheats, which in consequence are rather lower; but prime foreign wheat for making is scarce, and wanted; fine American white wheat in good condition is worth 12½ a cwt ad per cwt, and we quote generally 11½ gd a cwt for good American; a parcel lately arrived from New-York was sold a few days since at the latter price. Superfine sweet flour, free from the garlic or oily flavor very generally found in cargoes from Virginia, is taken regularly at 4½ ad 6d a cwt ad per barrel.—Exportation with respect to our grain market seems rather to lean to the idea of prices being full as high in March or April as at present, as the 3rd ad new wheats were brought into consumption in quantity, early this season; but there is a peculiar uncertainty attending this subject.

"Querantine Bark continues dull. The usual tons of first quality may be quoted 15d a cwt per cwt; but extra fine quality is worth 20d a cwt per cwt, and such being scarce would command a pretty ready sale.

"As usual at this season, there has been little inquiry for coffee of late, and any trifling speculative demand seems now altogether suspended, in consequence of the recent disastrous events that have taken place on the Continent; the annexed quotations therefore may be considered merely as nominal, and only referring to the latest partial sales. In the present extraordinary state of affairs in Germany and other countries in which coffee is usually exported, it is difficult to say how the article may rule; but these are moderate war prices, and our stock being by no means heavy, we may expect some improvement in spring; which indeed our intercourse with the Continent will be more circumscribed than has been before experienced.

"Our quotations for Havanna sugars may be considered also as nearly nominal, the present export vent being exceedingly limited, and indeed now likely to be altogether suspended during the winter months; we have only, therefore to observe, that they are moderate, and as the quantity on hand is not large, such prices may reasonably be expected to remain stable—Havana is still, and doubtful, what their prices will be maintained.—Spanish Indigo continues to go on pretty freely at these prices; but it is said large supplies of East India may be expected next year, in which case this article may become precarious.

"We continue to receive considerable supplies of Cigargany, and the demand being diminished, the market remains heavy.—The general value for the world's remains dull, and the speculative demand that appeared for Logwood (per British ship) for the use in October having failed, that article has again declined. Jamaica and Cuba Tonic (per British ship) for home consumption are ready; pale, but our stock of Peruvian Wood is ample, and there is no moving with that fast; even at our reduced quotation. La Goya fruit, R.R. Malaga Wine is scarce and wanted, at 3d ad 4d per ton, but the market is greatly overstocked with other species. Diversions imported per American ship are not imported, and are being affected by the flagrancy in export articles, owing to the state of the Continent, and the season of the year.

"The success of the French in Prussia have operated very ill for Square Timber, which has again rather improved. A cargo of Pine obtained yesterday 2½ d being 1d higher than a similar parcel was sold ten days before. The stock of Square Timber he is very considerable, and prices are likely to remain high, also of Larchwood.—The market is still heavily stocked with European Deals, but American Plank is purchased more freely at this moment than of late. Good Southern Staves obtain a pretty ready sale, and Red Oak and Ash go off at our quotations, at which we have held with these few days.

"We have received nearly 7000 bbls. of Tar, in the last month, viz. 3000 from America, and 2000 from the Continent of Europe; but the article is steady, and a parcel from New-York obtained 2½ ad 2d per cwt. The import of Turpentine in the fall month amounts to 4577 lbs., and the article is exceedingly dull—an inferior parcel was sold the other day at 10s. and a fair parcel at 11s. 6d. per cwt.

"Good qualities of Tobacco for our home manufacture go off but low, and middling descriptions, of which the flock principally consists, are dull."
