TO THOMAS JEFFERSON, ESQ. PRESIDENT

OF THE UNITED STATES.

SIR, AT a time when the American people from diffant and remote parts of the union are appreaching you through the channels of public addresses, it is perhaps matter for self-:eproach to us, your neighbors as well as fellow-country. men, that we thould thus long have withheld the expression of our lentiments and wishes upon the subject of your past administration and of the ensuing presidential election.

Upon this occasion we are involuntarily led into a flight review of the political history of our country; and thus our attention is natural. ly drawn to that publi : act of an early period of your life which, alone, would have ranked you among the mest prominent patriots of a glorious revolution :- and in tracing the progress of events, from that to the present day, we feel a conflant admiration excited by the uniform tenor of you aclions. But we must particularly flate our satissaction at the dissipation of those alaims and apprehentions with which your first elevation to your present eignified flation agitated one part of the community :- that our anticipations of the general tystem of your sublequent public meatures have been fully realited: -and that its happy eleds, under the direction of a Divine Providence, are evident in our prof-

perity both at home and abroad. The pursuits of private life would doubless, after the expiration of the present term, be most agreeable to'voo. There your active, and enlightened mind would, perhaps, find the best fichl for its speculative operations. There your feelings, amidift the pleasing circumstances incident to fuch a fituation, would indulge themselves in seasting on the resection that you had spent it greatest portion of your life in the fervice of your country and humanity. But, fir, the American people ask from you still a further sacrifice. The constitutional period of our presidential election-a period high y interett ing to millions, is about to recur. Eminently entitled as you aiready are to our gratitude and thanks for many arduous and important fervices, we could, upon ordinary principles, have no further claim upon you :- but in the present cale, trulling that you feel as you ought the fall force of the obligation resting on every indivichal to devote his life and talents to his country, we have a confidence that you will not retire from public employment. Permit us to relinguish and resume the labors of a public life, according to the dictates of the public will;furely it cannot be otherwise to continue uninserruptedly engaged in them, under the facred fandion of that will,—Apart from other confiderations, you well know that the application of the human powers to the purpoles of Phi Janthropy and benevolence is, at all times, a pieafing and uleful task: and that application is always most effectual and extensive when anade by, or under the auspices of those who have a diffinguished influence in regulating the

The sch'r Mary-Ann, Harrison, which sailed a few days ago, for an American port, put back yesterday, owing to sickness prevailing am ngst the crew.

On Saturday arrived, the American sch'r Concord, from Gerracou, bound to Baltimore, with a cargo of coffee, hides and indigo, detained of Cape Tiburon by his majerty's ship Nediator, captain Wise .- The Concord sailed from Curracoa on the 26th uit. Three days previous to her sailing, a flag of truce arrived from Barbadoes, requirirg the Governor to surrender, which was refused, in consequence of which, the Island is strictly blockaded; flour which sold at eight dollars per barrel, rose immediately to fitteen, and we are informed, so great is the misery and dissatisfaction of the inhabitants, that we have little doubt but they will soon surrender to the British -The Concord saw three frigates cruising off Curracoa, which are supposed to be the Latona, Arethusa, and Anson, which sailed some time ago. The following day she saw six ships to windward, but did not learn whether they were enemies or not. The Concord left the Mediator cruising near Cape Tiburon, all well.

THE underfigned, His Catholic Majesty's Conful for the state of Maryland, makes known to all whom it does or may concern, that by an official communication he has received from the Intendant General of the Island of Cuba. dated Havanna, 2d January, 1807, inclosing his late decree of 24th December, 1806, he is instructed to notify in the most public manner, all merchants and others interested, that altho the Intendant's former decree of 3d July, 1805, (which requires the invoices and manifests of all goods imported from neutral ports into those of the Island of Cuba, should be duly certified by the Consuls or Vice Consuls of His Catholic Majesty) has not been generally observed; in order to do away every pretext, and have no room for supposing a relaxation therein because a strict compliance therewith has unaccountably been i- some instances dispensed with: And that faid regulations should not be considered as arbitrary, oppressive or novel, but as an essential and politive determination emanating from the general government; the Intendant aforefaid to infure 1's firid observance in future has now decreed that " from and after the hill day of March next, all hipments made in neutral ports, for any of the ports of the Island of Cuba arriving after faid first day of March. must be provided with flatements or invoices, containing an individual and detailed relation of the number, weight, measure, quality and value of the goods or effects confituting the cargo of fuch ships; and making particular mention of the port of faid Island to which they are bound; which invoices must absolutely be duly certified by the Confuls or Vice Confuls of His Catholic Majesty residing therein; and are to be depolited at the telpective cullous houses of the ports of faid Mand; with this citcumflance, that whatever goods, wares, or merchandile found on board any vellel, not accompanied with its correspondent invoice certified by the Conful as aforefaid or otherwise included and particularly expressed therein.
