

both sides thereon, admitted the said claim, pronounced the said ship and the sugars laden on board of her, to belong as claimed, and by interlocutory decree directed the same to be restored to the claimant for the use of the owners and proprietors thereof; and by further interlocutory directed the claimant to produce further proof within three months, with respect to 9250 dollars in specie, mentioned in exhibits No's 26, 27 and 28.

HARTFORD, (Con.) Feb. 5.
Owing to the heavy rain on Saturday last and the evening following, the ice in the Little River, (so called) which passes thro' this town was carried off, which swept away most of the bridges on that stream; the two principal bridges had lately been re-built; the one in this city cost nearly Three Thousand Dollars. A very excellent bridge at Foguotock, on Farmington river, and a bridge in Simsbury, on the same stream, were informed, are carried off; some of the Mills on that stream are said to have been much damaged. We are told that damage to a great amount has been done by the rain and ice in East-Hartford, and in the neighborhood of that place: Mr. John Warburton, is said to have had his grist mill, dam, and bridge, all destroyed—Mr. John Mather's powder mill and dam entirely destroyed;—Mr. Buckland's dam destroyed, mills damaged, and grain &c. carried away;—a dam owned by Messrs. Hudson and Goodwin, partly carried away, and one of their paper mills very materially damaged, and some property in the mill destroyed. Mr. Pitkin, Mr. M'Kee, Mr. Cheeny, and others have suffered in the destruction of their dams, mills, &c. We have no doubt but that the country round us has suffered very severely in the loss of mills, bridges, &c.

New-York—In Council of Revision.
January 27th, 1807.
The council object to the bill, entitled, "an act relative to the punishment of certain crimes," as improper to become a law of this state.

1. Because, by the 2d section of the bill, the infliction of the punishment of whipping is authorized, which, instead of operating as a corrective, is calculated to degrade offenders, and by destroying their sense of shame, rendering them incorrigible.

2. Because, the power of adjudging an offender to be whipped, is, by the bill, vested in a special session, which proceeds without the intervention of a jury, and from that circumstance, as well as from the organization of those courts, is peculiarly exposed to be abused and wrested to oppressive purposes.

3. Because, the fourth section of the said bill does not distinguish between the setting fire to a dwelling-house, by which life, as well as property, may be endangered, and the burning an out-house; and yet, a variety of circumstances, unavoidably occurring, may create a great disparity in the crimes; and then death, the most terrific sanction in the criminal code, may be legally inflicted for offences not jeopardizing or affecting the life of individuals, whereby the relative proportion between crimes and punishments, will be destroyed.

NEW-YORK, Feb. 7.
Solomon C. Southwick, who was lately removed from the clerkship of the House of Assembly has been chosen by the Clintonian majority in the Senate, Clerk of that branch of the Legislature.

We have seen and read the new constitution of Hayti, including the report made to the constituent assembly on the 27th Dec. By this constitution, the government is divided into a popular branch, to be called the Constituent Assembly, and a Senate, (to consist of 24 members), which is to be elected by the Constituent Assembly. The executive is to have the title of president: it is to have the command of the army, and the power of nominating the officers of justice. He is chosen for four years. The report says—"It is by the division of power that the Americans have become numerous and flourishing, in such rapid progression, that the annals of no nation on earth can offer a similar example."

WASHINGTON CITY, February 6.
Mr. Lee yesterday moved the supreme court of the U. S. for writs of Habeas Corpus in the cases of Messrs. Alexander, Bollman and Swartwout. The court assigned this day for the consideration of the motion. The argument, as understood, will, in the first instance be directed to the solution of the abstract question, whether the supreme court has, in any case, power to issue a writ of Habeas Corpus.
Extract of a letter, dated Louisville, Jan. 9, 1807.

"We received information last evening, on which I think we can rely, that Col. Burr's party was to make their principal rendezvous at the Iron Works on the 2d of this month, and there is no doubt now left, but his intentions are the Spanish settlement at and in the neighborhood of Baton Rouge on the Mississippi, and that if his intentions ever had been a conquest of Mexico, the exertions of our government have for the present diverted him to a secondary object."

Two days previous to capt. M's sailing, was published by order of the governor, the king and council's act, prohibiting for 12 months the importation of all kinds of merchandise from neutral ports, except amber, stock, fish, and flour, and the prohibition of all kinds of colony produce in return for those articles, except rum and molasses. By this act no power is left with the governor as respects necessity of the colony, as has always been the case. This publication raised the price of rum and molasses, and depreciated the price of sugar. Rum at the present price, cannot be exported from thence to America, without the loss of 25 per cent. and it will in all probability be higher. The planters will feel the effect of this act very much as they depend on America for their provisions, and in return pay them sugar, rum, coffee, molasses, &c.—This act was put forth in force—the ship Grace, of New-York, arrived the day before the publication, and partly entered but not getting through the governor's office, and British custom-house, was detained from entering, except the fish and lumber, and a guard of marines kept on deck to see there was nothing carried from the ship. It is generally supposed the planters would petition to the king to open the port to neutrals as usual; but it would take nearly twelve months for the petition to go home, be debated upon, and return out to the colony.

Captain Leach, from Trinidad, left brig —, Titcomb, of Portland, had just arrived. The Argo, from Calcutta for Salem, left the Vineyard in co. with capt. L. and was seen about 3 leagues to the westward of the Race, at 4 o'clock on Saturday afternoon: it is presumed she has not been able to get in; several guns were heard in the bay on Saturday evening.

It is reported that the Argo got on Cohasset rocks, but was got off without material injury, and anchored near Boston light-house yesterday.

Baltimore, 7th February, 1807.
THE undersigned, His Catholic Majesty's Consul for the late of Maryland, makes known to all whom it does or may concern, that by an official communication he has received from the Intendant General of the Island of Cuba, dated Havana, 2d January, 1807, including his late decree of 24th Decem. 1806, he is intrusted to notify in the most public manner, all merchants and others interested, that although the Intendant's former decree of 3d July, 1805, (which requires the invoices and manifests of all goods imported from neutral ports into those of the Island of Cuba, should be duly certified by the Consuls or Vice Consuls of His Catholic Majesty) has not been generally observed; in order to do away every pretext, and have no room for supposing a relaxation therein because a strict compliance therewith has unaccountably been in some instances dispensed with: And that said regulations should not be considered as arbitrary, oppressive or novel, but as an essential and positive determination emanating from the general government; the Intendant aforesaid to enforce his strict observance in future has now decreed that "from and after the 1st day of March next, all shipments made in neutral ports, for any of the ports of the Island of Cuba arriving after said first day of March, must be provided with statements or invoices, containing an individual and detailed relation of the number, weight, measure, quality and value of the goods or effects constituting the cargo of such ships; and making particular mention of the port of said Island to which they are bound: which invoices must absolutely be duly certified by the Consuls or Vice Consuls of His Catholic Majesty residing therein; and are to be deposited at the respective consular-houses of the ports of said Island; with this circumstance, that whatever goods, wares, or merchandise found on board any vessel, not accompanied with its correspondent invoice certified by the Consul as aforesaid or otherwise included and particularly expressed therein, shall be seized and confiscated without appeal."
A duplicate of the invoice and manifest will be required in order to remain in this office, and as the originals are intended to remain in the customs another copy will necessarily be forwarded by the shippers to their correspondents in the ports of said Island.
