

BY AUTHORITR.

AN ACT

To alter the time of holding the circuit and district courts in the district of North-Carolina.

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That instead of the times heretofore established by law; for the sessions of the circuit court for the district of North Carolina, the said courts shall hereaster commence and be holden on the twelfth day of May, and the twelsth day of November, in each year, any thing contained in any former act or acts to the contrary notwithstanding. And all actions, suits, process. pleadings, and other proceedings of what nature or kind soever, civil or criminal, commenced or to be commence in the said court, and all recognizances returnable to the said court, on the twentieth day of June next, shall be continued, returned to, and have day; in the session to be holden by this act, and the same proceedings shall be had thereon as heretofore, and shall have all the effect, power, and virtue as if the alteration had never been made : Provided nevertheless, That when the twelfth day of Muy, or the twelfth day of November shall happen on Sunday, the next succeeding day shall be the first juridical day of the term.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the district courts of the United States, for the district of North Carolina, shall. after the passing of this act, commence and he holden on the following days, instead of the times heretofore established by law, that is to say; at Wilmington. in and for the district of Cape Fear, or the first. Mondays in Februery, Jun and October; at Newbern, in and for the district of Pamplico, on the Friday next
